### Definitions of "Stabilize" as a verb

- *Make or become unlikely to change, fail, or decline.*
- *Become stable or more stable.*
- *Make or become unlikely to give way or overturn.*
- *Support or hold steady and make steadfast, with or as if with a brace.*
- *Make stable and keep from fluctuating or put into an equilibrium.*



## Synonyms of "Stabilize" as a verb (15 Words)

### brace

Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace.

**Brace** your elbows while working on the potter s wheel.

### cement

Cover or coat with cement.

Wooden posts were **cemented** into the ground.

### **enhance**

Make better or more attractive.

This will **enhance** your enjoyment.

### fortify

Provide (a place) with defensive works as protection against attack.

The girl was **fortified** by her religious faith.

### harden

Cause to accept or become hardened to habituate.

She **hardened** her heart.

### **make secure**

Constitute the essence of.

### **make stable**

Have a bowel movement.

### **make stronger**

Calculate as being.

**reinforce**

Strengthen (a military force) with additional personnel or equipment.  
*The next few months **reinforced** my opinion of Vince as a man of his word.*

**secure**

Seek to guarantee repayment of (a loan) by having a right to take possession of an asset in the event of non-payment.  
*Pins **secure** the handle to the main body.*

**stabilise**

Make stable and keep from fluctuating or put into an equilibrium.

**steady**

Make steady.  
*I took a deep breath to **steady** my nerves.*

**stiffen**

Become stiff or stiffer.  
*The regime's resistance **stiffened**.*

**strengthen**

Make or become stronger.  
*The wind won't **strengthen** until after dark.*

**tighten**

Make or become tight or tighter.  
*Central government has **tightened** control over local authority spending.*





## Usage Examples of "Stabilize" as a verb

- *His condition appears to have stabilized.*
- *Stabilize prices.*
- *The drug stabilized her blood pressure.*
- *The craft was stabilized by throwing out the remaining ballast.*
- *The economy stabilized.*
- *An emergency program designed to stabilize the economy.*



## Associations of "Stabilize" (30 Words)

<b>algae</b>	Primitive chlorophyll-containing mainly aquatic eukaryotic organisms lacking true stems and roots and leaves.
<b>balanced</b>	Keeping or showing a balance; in good proportions. A <b>balanced</b> personality.
<b>bivalve</b>	(of a mollusc or other aquatic invertebrate) having a hinged double shell.

<b>carapace</b>	Hard outer covering or case of certain organisms such as arthropods and turtles. <i>I don't blame him for building a <b>carapace</b> around his true self.</i>
<b>clam</b>	Flesh of either hard shell or soft shell clams. <i>The beaches are ideal for beachcombing <b>clamming</b> and observing wildlife.</i>
<b>conch</b>	A conch shell blown like a trumpet to produce a hollow sounding musical note often depicted as played by Tritons.
<b>coral</b>	The pinkish red colour of red coral. <i><b>Coral</b> beads.</i>
<b>crab</b>	Fish for crabs. <i>George <b>crabbed</b> the plane into the wind.</i>
<b>crayfish</b>	Small freshwater decapod crustacean that resembles a lobster.
<b>crustacean</b>	Relating to or denoting crustaceans.
<b>crustaceous</b>	Relating to or denoting crustaceans. <i>Africa is a theme close to my otherwise <b>crustaceous</b> heart.</i>
<b>decapod</b>	Relating to or denoting decapods.
<b>freshwater</b>	Of or found in fresh water; not of the sea. <i><b>Freshwater</b> and marine fish.</i>
<b>guppy</b>	A small live-bearing freshwater fish widely kept in aquaria. Native to tropical America, it has been introduced elsewhere to control mosquito larvae.
<b>keep</b>	Store or keep customarily. <i>The guidance system <b>keeps</b> the machine on course.</i>
<b>lobster</b>	A deep red colour typical of a cooked lobster. <i>She ordered <b>lobster</b> and a glass of white wine.</i>
<b>maintain</b>	Maintain by writing regular records. <i>Agricultural prices will have to be <b>maintained</b>.</i>
<b>marine</b>	A member of the United States Marine Corps. <i>A contingent of 2 000 <b>marines</b>.</i>
<b>mollusc</b>	Invertebrate having a soft unsegmented body usually enclosed in a shell.
<b>mollusk</b>	Invertebrate having a soft unsegmented body usually enclosed in a shell.
<b>octopus</b>	Tentacles of octopus prepared as food.
<b>oyster</b>	Gather oysters dig oysters. <i>As a kid he crabbed and <b>oystered</b> for fun.</i>
<b>scallop</b>	Fish for scallops. <i>The spaces between the frets are <b>scalloped</b> out to form concavities.</i>

<b>seafood</b>	Edible fish (broadly including freshwater fish) or shellfish or roe etc. <i>Local <b>seafood</b>.</i>
<b>seahorse</b>	Small fish with horse-like heads bent sharply downward and curled tails; swim in upright position.
<b>shell</b>	Bombard with shells. <i>He was a <b>shell</b> of the man he had been previously.</i>
<b>shellfish</b>	Shellfish as food. <i>They plied me with enormous platters of fresh <b>shellfish</b>.</i>
<b>shrimp</b>	Fish for shrimp. <i>At Trebetherick you paddle on Daymer Bay or <b>shrimp</b> off Gully.</i>
<b>stabilization</b>	The act of making something (as a vessel or aircraft) less likely to overturn. <i>He worked for price <b>stabilization</b> for farm products.</i>
<b>starfish</b>	A marine echinoderm (invertebrate) with five or more radiating arms. The undersides of the arms bear tube feet for locomotion and, in predatory species, for opening the shells of molluscs.
