
## Stable as a Noun

**stalls** A tactic used to mislead or delay.








## **Stable as an Adjective**

#### Definitions of "Stable" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "stable" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Not taking part readily in chemical change.
- Not liable to undergo chemical decomposition, radioactive decay, or other physical change.
- Sane and sensible; not easily upset or disturbed.
- Resistant to change of position or condition.
- Not likely to change or fail; firmly established.
- Maintaining equilibrium.
- (of a patient or their medical condition) not deteriorating in health after an injury or operation.
- (of an object or structure) not likely to give way or overturn; firmly fixed.
- Showing little if any change.
- Firm and dependable; subject to little fluctuation.

reasonable	Able to reason logically. A restaurant serving excellent food at <b>reasonable</b> prices.
right in the head	Most suitable or right for a particular purpose.
safe	Financially safe. She felt <b>safe</b> with him.
sane	Marked by sound judgment. <i>Appears to be completely <b>sane</b></i> .



<u>secure</u>	Free from danger or risk. A more competitive economy will lead to an increase in <b>secure</b> employment.
sensible	Readily perceived; appreciable. The more <b>sensible</b> parts of the skin.
<u>sober</u>	Completely lacking in playfulness. As <b>sober</b> as a judge.
<u>solid</u>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. A sculpture made out of <b>solid</b> rock.
sound	Financially secure and safe. A <b>sound</b> timber.
<u>static</u>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>A</i> <b>static</b> <i>population</i> .
steadfast	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. A <b>steadfast</b> ally.
<u>steady</u>	Not faltering or wavering; controlled. A <b>steady</b> boyfriend.
stout	Euphemisms for `fat. Billy had armed himself with a <b>stout</b> stick.
strong	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>A strong man.</i>
stuck down	Caught or fixed.
<u>sturdy</u>	Strong enough to withstand rough work or treatment. <i>He had a <b>sturdy</b> muscular physique.</i>
<u>substantial</u>	Of or relating to the real nature or essential elements of something. Spirits are shadowy human beings <b>substantial</b> .
<u>sure</u>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>Sure</i> of her friends.
<u>unchanging</u>	Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.
unfaltering	Not faltering; steady; resolute. Her <b>unfaltering</b> energy and determination.



unfluctuating	Not liable to fluctuate or especially to fall.
unswerving	Not changing or becoming weaker; steady or constant. <i>Unswerving</i> allegiance.
unvarying	Unvarying in nature. The <b>unvarying</b> routine of parsonage life.
unwavering	Not showing abrupt variations. <b>Unwavering</b> loyalty.
well balanced	Resulting favorably.
well built	Resulting favorably.
well constructed	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
with both one's feet on the ground	Two considered together; the two.
