| upholder | Someone who upholds or maintains. <i>Firm upholders of tradition.</i> |
| votary | One bound by vows to a religion or life of worship or service. <i>The cultured votary of science.</i> |

| hardy | Able to survive under unfavorable weather conditions. <i>A favourite flowering shrub for early spring vigorous and hardy.</i> |
| <u>hefty</u> | Large and heavy. <i>A hefty dictionary.</i> |
| herculean | Extremely difficult; requiring the strength of a Hercules. <i>A herculean task.</i> |

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| loyal | Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause. <i>Loyal friends stood by him.</i> |
| mighty | (of an action) performed with or requiring great strength. <i>Mighty beasts.</i> |
| muscular | Having a robust muscular body build characterized by predominance of structures bone and muscle and connective tissue developed from the embryonic mesodermal layer. <i>The muscular and passionate Fifth Symphony.</i> |
| powerful | Of a person possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. <i>Powerful arms.</i> |
| powerfully built | Having great power or force or potency or effect. |
| redoubtable | Worthy of respect or honor. <i>He was a redoubtable debater.</i> |
| reliable | Worthy of reliance or trust. <i>A reliable source of information.</i> |
| resolute | Admirably purposeful, determined, and unwavering. <i>Stood resolute against the enemy.</i> |
| robust | (of wine or food) strong and rich in flavour or smell. <i>The country's political system has continued to be robust in spite of its economic problems.</i> |
| rugged | (of clothing, equipment, etc.) strongly made and capable of withstanding rough handling. <i>The binoculars are compact lightweight and rugged.</i> |
| solid | Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>A solid line across the page.</i> |
| stable | Firm and dependable; subject to little fluctuation. <i>A stable ladder.</i> |
| staunch | Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <i>A staunch Catholic.</i> |
| steadfast | Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>Steadfast resolve.</i> |
| steady | Regular, even, and continuous in development, frequency, or intensity. <i>She tried to keep her voice steady.</i> |
| stocky | Having a short and solid form or stature. <i>Stocky legs.</i> |

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| stout | Dependable. <i>Men are portly and women are stout.</i> |
| stouthearted | Used especially of persons. <i>A stouthearted fellow who had an active career in the army.</i> |
| strapping | Muscular and heavily built. <i>A strapping boy of eighteen.</i> |
| strong | Strong and sure. <i>Despite his strong constitution constant worry and exposure to the elements had worn him down.</i> |
| sturdy | Substantially made or constructed. <i>Sturdy young athletes.</i> |
| substantial | Real and tangible rather than imaginary. <i>Breakfast is a substantial buffet.</i> |
| thickset | Having a short and solid form or stature. <i>A thickset young man.</i> |
| tough | Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i>It was a tough job.</i> |
| trusty | Worthy of trust or belief. <i>Their trusty steeds.</i> |
| unfaltering | Not faltering; steady; resolute. <i>Her unfaltering energy and determination.</i> |
| unhesitating | Characterized by quickness and firmness. <i>Unequivocal and unhesitating condemnation.</i> |
| unswerving | Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. <i>Unswerving allegiance.</i> |
| unwavering | Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering stare.</i> |
| vigorous | (of language) forceful. <i>A tall vigorous and muscular man.</i> |

| hardy | English novelist and poet (1840-1928). <i>A favourite flowering shrub for early spring vigorous and hardy.</i> |
| <u>hero</u> | Someone who fights for a cause. <i>The hero of the range is the daily face peel.</i> |
| <u>heroic</u> | A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>Heroic undertakings.</i> |

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| husky | Muscular and heavily built. <i>Makes all the instruments sound powerful but husky.</i> |
| <u>intrepid</u> | Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Intrepid pioneers.</i> |
| manliness | The traditional male quality of being brave and strong. <i>The author s alleged lack of manliness.</i> |
| <u>manly</u> | In a manful manner; with qualities thought to befit a man. <i>Honest manly sports.</i> |
| <u>masculine</u> | A masculine word or form. <i>The dance presents the world of the masculine its raw energy.</i> |
| plucky | Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited-Judith Crist. <i>The plucky youngster has astounded medical staff.</i> |
| robust | (of wine or food) strong and rich in flavour or smell. <i>A robust claret.</i> |
| stouthearted | Used especially of persons. <i>A stouthearted fellow who had an active career in the army.</i> |
| <u>sturdy</u> | Vertigo in sheep caused by a tapeworm larva encysted in the brain. <i>The townspeople have a sturdy independence.</i> |
| <u>tough</u> | Physically toughened. <i>The hastily prepared steak was tough.</i> |
| unflinching | Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown unflinching determination throughout the campaign.</i> |
| <u>valiant</u> | Having or showing valor. <i>A valiant soldier.</i> |
| <u>valor</u> | The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for valor.</i> |
| valorous | Having or showing valor. <i>Valorous deeds on the field of honour.</i> |
| <u>vigorous</u> | Strong and active physically or mentally- W.H.Hudson. <i>A tall vigorous and muscular man.</i> |
