<b>supporter</b>	A support for the genitals worn by men engaging in strenuous exercise. <i>All their <b>supporters</b> came out for the game.</i>
<b>upholder</b>	Someone who upholds or maintains. <i>Firm <b>upholders</b> of tradition.</i>
<b>votary</b>	One bound by vows to a religion or life of worship or service. <i>The cultured <b>votary</b> of science.</i>

<b>firm</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>A <b>firm</b> contract.</i>
<b>hardy</b>	Able to survive under unfavorable weather conditions. <i>A favourite flowering shrub for early spring vigorous and <b>hardy</b>.</i>
<b><u>hefty</u></b>	Large and heavy. <i>A <b>hefty</b> dictionary.</i>
<b>herculean</b>	Extremely difficult; requiring the strength of a Hercules. <i>A <b>herculean</b> task.</i>

<b>loyal</b>	Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause. <i><b>Loyal</b> friends stood by him.</i>
<b>mighty</b>	(of an action) performed with or requiring great strength. <i><b>Mighty</b> beasts.</i>
<b>muscular</b>	Having a robust muscular body build characterized by predominance of structures bone and muscle and connective tissue developed from the embryonic mesodermal layer. <i>The <b>muscular</b> and passionate Fifth Symphony.</i>
<b>powerful</b>	Of a person possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. <i><b>Powerful</b> arms.</i>
<b>powerfully built</b>	Having great power or force or potency or effect.
<b>redoubtable</b>	Worthy of respect or honor. <i>He was a <b>redoubtable</b> debater.</i>

<b>rugged</b>	(of clothing, equipment, etc.) strongly made and capable of withstanding rough handling. <i>The binoculars are compact lightweight and <b>rugged</b>.</i>
<b>solid</b>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>A <b>solid</b> line across the page.</i>
<b>stable</b>	Firm and dependable; subject to little fluctuation. <i>A <b>stable</b> ladder.</i>
<b>staunch</b>	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <i>A <b>staunch</b> Catholic.</i>
<b>steadfast</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i><b>Steadfast</b> resolve.</i>
<b>steady</b>	Regular, even, and continuous in development, frequency, or intensity. <i>She tried to keep her voice <b>steady</b>.</i>
<b>stocky</b>	Having a short and solid form or stature. <i><b>Stocky</b> legs.</i>

<b>stout</b>	Dependable. <i>Men are portly and women are <b>stout</b>.</i>

<b>hardy</b>	English novelist and poet (1840-1928). <i>A favourite flowering shrub for early spring vigorous and <b>hardy</b>.</i>
<b>hero</b>	Someone who fights for a cause. <i>The <b>hero</b> of the range is the daily face peel.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i><b>Heroic</b> undertakings.</i>

<b>husky</b>	Muscular and heavily built. <i>Makes all the instruments sound powerful but <b>husky</b>.</i>
<b><u>intrepid</u></b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Intrepid</b> pioneers.</i>

<b><u>valor</u></b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for <b>valor</b>.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Having or showing valor. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b><u>vigorous</u></b>	Strong and active physically or mentally- W.H.Hudson. <i>A tall <b>vigorous</b> and muscular man.</i>
