## Synonyms of "Stamina" as a noun (17 Words)

<u>determination</u>	The act of determining the properties of something, usually by research or calculation. <i>Those who succeed because of sheer grit and determination</i> .
<u>endurance</u>	The capacity of something to last or to withstand wear and tear. She was close to the limit of her <b>endurance</b> .
energy	A thermodynamic quantity equivalent to the capacity of a physical system to do work the units of energy are joules or ergs. <i>The DOE is responsible for maintaining the energy policy.</i>
fortitude	Strength of mind that enables one to endure adversity with courage. <i>She endured her illness with great fortitude</i> .
indefatigability	Tireless determination.
perseverance	Persistent determination. His <b>perseverance</b> with the technique illustrates his single mindedness.



resilience	An occurrence of rebounding or springing back. The often remarkable <b>resilience</b> of so many British institutions.
resistance	The degree to which a substance or device opposes the passage of an electric current causing energy dissipation By Ohm s law resistance measured in ohms is equal to the voltage divided by the current. <i>They displayed a narrow minded <b>resistance</b> to change.</i>
robustness	The characteristic of being strong enough to withstand intellectual challenge. We can examine the <b>robustness</b> of our results.
staunchness	Loyalty in the face of trouble and difficulty.
staying power	Brace consisting of a heavy rope or wire cable used as a support for a mast or spar.
steadfastness	The quality of being resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i>No side wins without <b>steadfastness</b> in the face of adversity.</i>
strength	The power to induce the taking of a course of action or the embracing of a point of view by means of argument or entreaty. Street protests demonstrated the <b>strength</b> of feeling against the president.
<u>tenacity</u>	Persistent determination. The <b>tenacity</b> of certain myths within the historical record.
tirelessness	Tireless determination.
toughness	The property of being big and strong. They showed great mental <b>toughness</b> to keep going.
vigour	Active strength of body or mind. They set about the new task with <b>vigour</b> .

courage	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>He fought his illness with great courage</i> .
digestive	A food, drink, or medicine that aids or promotes the digestion of food. <i>Digestive disorders.</i>
durability	Permanence by virtue of the power to resist stress or force. They advertised the <b>durability</b> of their products.



<u>endurance</u>	Denoting or relating to a race or other sporting event that takes place over a long distance or otherwise demands great physical stamina. <i>The marathon tests a runner s endurance.</i>
energy	The federal department responsible for maintaining a national energy policy of the United States created in 1977. <i>Changes in the levels of vitamins can affect <b>energy</b> and well being.</i>
fitness	Fitness to traverse the seas. Disease and lack of <b>fitness</b> are closely related.
fortitude	Courage in pain or adversity. She endured her illness with great <b>fortitude</b> .
	Given to merry frolicking. <i>Frolicsome</i> students celebrated their graduation with parties and practical <i>jokes</i> .
<u>invigorate</u>	Give strength or energy to. The shower had <b>invigorate</b> d her.
leverage	Provide with leverage. My spade hit something solid that wouldn t respond to <b>leverage</b> .
manliness	The trait of being manly; having the characteristics of an adult male. Men accustomed to proving their <b>manliness</b> on the streets.
metabolism	The organic processes (in a cell or organism) that are necessary for life. <i>Abnormalities in protein</i> <b>metabolism</b> .
mettle	A person's ability to cope well with difficulties; spirit and resilience. The team showed their true <b>mettle</b> in the second half.
momentum	The impetus and driving force gained by the development of a process or course of events. The car s <b>momentum</b> carried it off the road.
<u>muscular</u>	Having a robust muscular body build characterized by predominance of structures bone and muscle and connective tissue developed from the embryonic mesodermal layer. <i>A muscular boxer.</i>
overtax	Tax excessively. Don t <b>overtax</b> my constituents.
physical	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. Was sloppy about everything but her <b>physical</b> appearance.
<u>physique</u>	Alternative names for the body of a human being. A sturdy muscular <b>physique</b> .
revive	Cause to regain consciousness. She was beginning to <b>revive</b> from her faint.



strength	The extent to which an argument or case is sound or convincing. City were under <b>strength</b> yet put up a creditable performance.
<u>synergy</u>	The working together of two things (muscles or drugs for example) to produce an effect greater than the sum of their individual effects. <i>The synergy between artist and record company.</i>
<u>vibrant</u>	Of sounds that are strong and resonating. <i>His vibrant voice.</i>
vigor	Forceful exertion.
vim	An imaginative lively style (especially style of writing. In his youth he was full of <b>vim</b> and vigour.
<u>virility</u>	(in a man) the quality of having strength, energy, and a strong sex drive; manliness. <i>Great importance is placed on a man s virility</i> .
<u>vitality</u>	(biology) a hypothetical force (not physical or chemical) once thought by Henri Bergson to cause the evolution and development of organisms. <i>The vitality of seeds.</i>
<u>vivacity</u>	Characterized by high spirits and animation. <i>He was struck by her <b>vivacity</b> humour and charm.</i>
