Stampede as a Noun

Definitions of "Stampede" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stampede” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *(in North America) a rodeo.*
- *A headlong rush of people on a common impulse.*
- *A wild headlong rush of frightened animals (horses or cattle).*
- *A sudden panicked rush of a number of horses, cattle, or other animals.*
- *A sudden rapid movement or reaction of a mass of people in response to a particular circumstance or stimulus.*



Synonyms of "Stampede" as a noun (6 Words)

charge

The price charged for some article or service.
*Smaller **charges** fired on three minute fuses lit by hand.*

flight

A formation of aircraft in flight.
*I climbed the three **flights** of stairs which led to his office.*

panic

A frenzied hurry to do something.
*He ran to the library in a blind **panic**.*

rout

A decisive defeat.
*The party lost more than half their seats in the **rout**.*

rush

Grasslike plants growing in wet places and having cylindrical often hollow stems.
*There was a **rush** for the door.*

scattering The act of scattering.
*The colossal wastage involved in a random **scattering**.*



Usage Examples of "Stampede" as a noun

- *The herd was fleeing back to the high land in a wild stampede.*
- *A stampede of bargain hunters.*
- *When he shouted `fire' there was a stampede to the exits.*
- *The Calgary Stampede.*



Stampede as a Verb

Definitions of "Stampede" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "stampede" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cause a group or mass of people to act on an impulse or hurriedly and impulsively.*
- *Run away in a stampede.*
- *(of horses, cattle, or other animals) rush wildly in a sudden mass panic.*
- *(of people) move rapidly in a mass.*
- *Cause to run in panic.*

- Act, usually *en masse*, hurriedly or on an impulse.
- Cause (people or animals) to stampede.



Synonyms of "Stampede" as a verb (10 Words)

- bolt** Make or roll into bolts.
***Bolt** the door.*
- career** Move swiftly and in an uncontrolled way.
*The coach **careered** across the road and went through a hedge.*
- charge** File a formal charge against.
*Will you pay cash or **charge** the purchase.*
- dash** Destroy or break.
*The ship was **dashed** upon the rocks.*
- flee** Run away quickly.
*He was forced to **flee** the country.*

- race** Prepare and enter an animal or vehicle for races.
*The vet took blood samples from the horses before they **raced**.*
- run** Run stand or compete for an office or a position.
*He could no longer afford to **run** a car.*
- rush** Cause to move fast or to rush or race.
*To **rush** the bank and fire willy nilly could be disastrous for everyone.*
- sweep** Move with sweeping effortless gliding motions.
*We knew we had to **sweep** these three home games.*
- take flight** Be capable of holding or containing.



Usage Examples of "Stampede" as a verb

- *Don't let them stampede us into anything.*
- *Companies will now stampede to release their latest software.*

- *The children stampeded through the kitchen, playing tag or hide-and-seek.*
- *The nearby sheep stampeded as if they sensed impending danger.*
- *The raiders stampeded 200 mules.*
- *The tavern owners stampeded us into overeating.*
- *Thunderbolts can stampede animals.*
