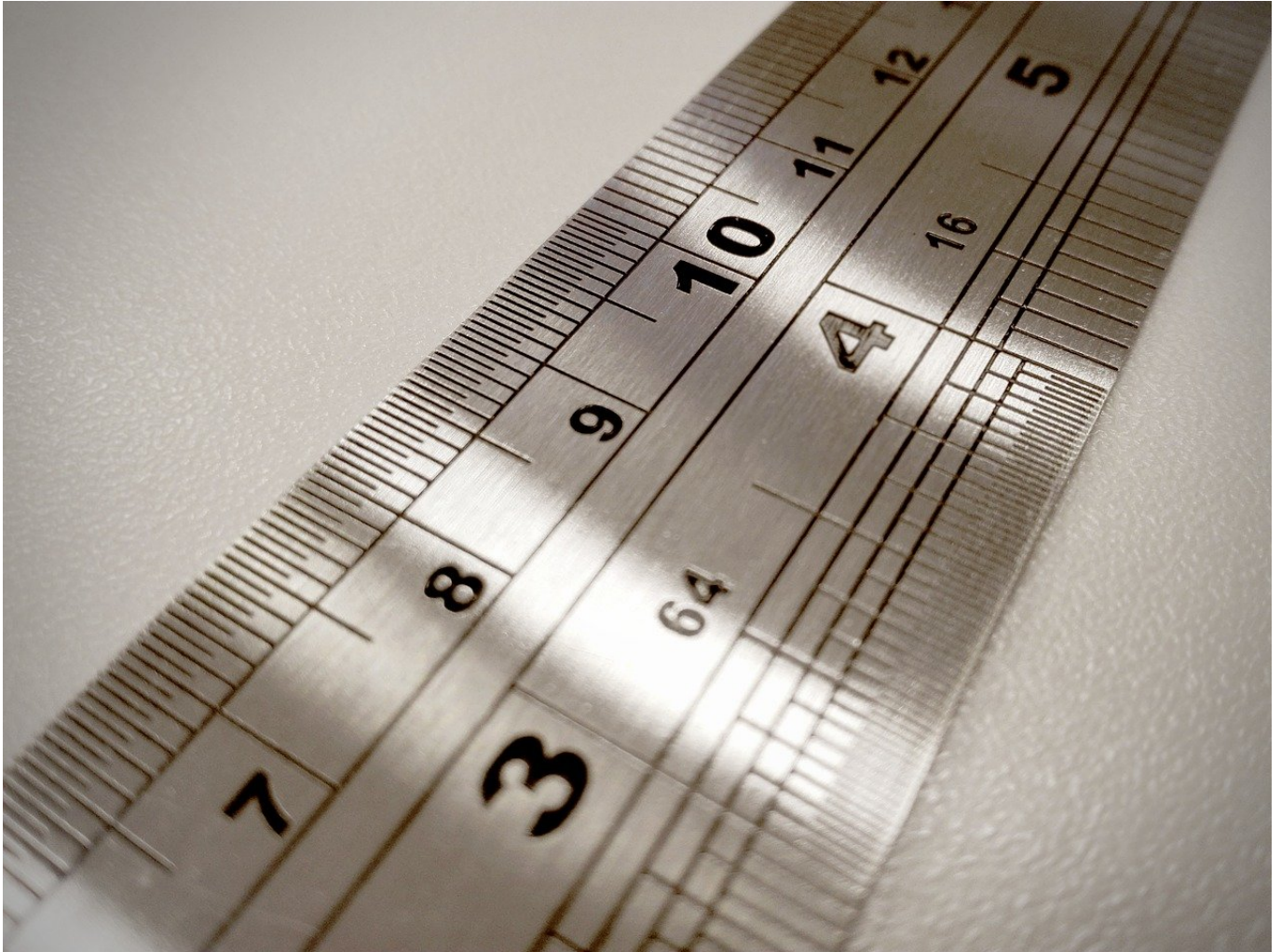

- *Brought into conformity with a standard.*
- *Capable of replacing or changing places with something else; permitting mutual substitution without loss of function or suitability.*



## Synonyms of "Standardized" as an adjective (4 Words)

- exchangeable** Capable of replacing or changing places with something else.
- [interchangeable](#)** Capable of replacing or changing places with something else.  
***Interchangeable*** electric outlets.
- similar** Resembling or similar having the same or some of the same characteristics often used in combination.  
***Similar*** food at ***similar*** prices.
- standardised** Brought into conformity with a standard.

### adultery

Voluntary sexual intercourse between a married person and a person who is not their spouse.

**Adultery** is often cited as grounds for divorce.

### attempt

Make an effort or attempt.

An **attempt** on the unclimbed north east ridge.

### attempted

Tried unsuccessfully.

**Attempted** murder.

### commit

Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee.

She loved a man who was **committed** to another woman.

### consecrate

Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high or sacred purpose.

A life **consecrated** to science.

### consign

Deliver (something) to a person's keeping.

**Consign** your baggage.

<b>criminology</b>	The scientific study of crime and criminals.
<b>data</b>	Things known or assumed as facts, making the basis of reasoning or calculation. <i>Statistical <b>data</b>.</i>
<b>detection</b>	The detection that a signal is being received. <i>The early <b>detection</b> of fetal abnormalities.</i>
<b>devote</b>	Set aside or apart for a specific purpose or use. <i>I wanted to <b>devote</b> more time to my family.</i>
<b>devotee</b>	A strong believer in a particular religion or god. <i><b>Devotees</b> of Krishna.</i>
<b>felony</b>	A crime regarded in the US and many other judicial systems as more serious than a misdemeanour. <i>An accusation of <b>felony</b>.</i>
<b>formalize</b>	Make formal or official. <i>We became able to <b>formalize</b> our thoughts.</i>
<b>genocide</b>	The deliberate killing of a large number of people from a particular nation or ethnic group with the aim of destroying that nation or group. <i>A campaign of <b>genocide</b>.</i>
<b>homicide</b>	A murderer. <i>Knives account for a third of all <b>homicides</b>.</i>
<b>indiscretion</b>	A petty misdeed. <i>He knew himself all too prone to <b>indiscretion</b>.</i>
<b>institutionalize</b>	Cause to be admitted; of persons to an institution. <i>He was <b>institutionalized</b> in a school for the destitute.</i>
<b>malpractice</b>	Professional wrongdoing that results in injury or damage. <i>Investigations into <b>malpractices</b> and abuses of power.</i>
<b>matricide</b>	The murder of your mother. <i>A man suspected of <b>matricide</b>.</i>
<b>mentally</b>	In your mind. <i>Soldiers become physically and <b>mentally</b> exhausted.</i>
<b>offence</b>	The action of attacking someone or something. <i>He made it clear he d taken <b>offence</b>.</i>
<b>patricide</b>	A person who kills their father.
<b>perjury</b>	Criminal offense of making false statements under oath. <i>He claimed two witnesses at his trial had committed <b>perjury</b>.</i>
<b>perpetrate</b>	Carry out or commit (a harmful, illegal, or immoral action). <i><b>Perpetrate</b> a crime.</i>

<b>prevention</b>	The action of stopping something from happening or arising. <i>Money was allocated to study the cause and <b>prevention</b> of influenza.</i>
<b>regicide</b>	Someone who commits regicide the killer of a king.
<b>regret</b>	Express with regret. <i>Please give your grandmother my <b>regrets</b>.</i>
<b>sanatorium</b>	Pejorative terms for an insane asylum.
<b>suicide</b>	A person who commits suicide. <i>She <b>suicided</b> in a very ugly manner.</i>
<b>treatment</b>	Used to indicate that something is done enthusiastically, vigorously, or to an extreme degree. <i>Anti cancer <b>treatments</b>.</i>
