### Definitions of "Standpoint" as a noun

- *The position from which someone is able to view a scene or an object.*
- *An attitude to a particular issue.*



## Synonyms of "Standpoint" as a noun (15 Words)

### angle

Angle iron or a similar constructional material made of another metal.  
*The supporting frame is usually of aluminium **angle** bolted together.*

### **attitude**

The orientation of an aircraft or spacecraft, relative to the direction of travel.

*I asked the waiter for a clean fork and all I got was **attitude**.*

### **frame of mind**

One of the ten divisions into which bowling is divided.

### **opinion**

A message expressing a belief about something; the expression of a belief that is held with confidence but not substantiated by positive knowledge or proof.

*He asked for a poll of public **opinion**.*

### outlook

The prospect for the future.

*He had a practical **outlook** on life.*

<b>perspective</b>	The art of representing three-dimensional objects on a two-dimensional surface so as to give the right impression of their height, width, depth, and position in relation to each other. <i>Most guidebook history is written from the editor's <b>perspective</b>.</i>
<b>point of view</b>	An isolated fact that is considered separately from the whole.
<b>position</b>	An opinion that is held in opposition to another in an argument or dispute. <i>He looks best in central midfield his own preferred <b>position</b>.</i>
<b>slant</b>	Degree of deviation from a horizontal plane. <i>Cut flower stems on the <b>slant</b>.</i>
<b>stance</b>	A rationalized mental attitude. <i>She altered her <b>stance</b> resting all her weight on one leg.</i>
<b>stand</b>	The position where a thing or person stands. <i>This was not the moment to make a <b>stand</b> for independence.</i>
<b>vantage point</b>	The quality of having a superior or more favorable position.
<b>view</b>	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>Matisse's <b>view</b> of Collioure.</i>
<b>viewpoint</b>	A person's opinion or point of view. <i>I do try to put over our <b>viewpoint</b>.</i>
<b>way of thinking</b>	Doing as one pleases or chooses.

<b>jaundiced</b>	Affected by jaundice, in particular unnaturally yellow in complexion. <i>Takes a <b>jaundiced</b> view of societies and clubs.</i>
<b><u>mentality</u></b>	The characteristic way of thinking of a person or group. <i>I had inherited not only my father's blood but his bourgeois <b>mentality</b> as well.</i>
<b>mindset</b>	A habitual or characteristic mental attitude that determines how you will interpret and respond to situations. <i>The region seems stuck in a medieval <b>mindset</b>.</i>
<b>objectively</b>	In a way that is not dependent on the mind for existence; actually. <i>The physical world we think of as <b>objectively</b> true.</i>
<b>opinion</b>	A personal belief or judgment that is not founded on proof or certainty. <i><b>Opinions</b> are usually written by a single judge.</i>
<b><u>outlook</u></b>	A view. <i>He had a practical <b>outlook</b> on life.</i>
<b>panorama</b>	A picture or photograph containing a wide view. <i>The tower offers a wonderful <b>panorama</b> of Prague.</i>
<b><u>personally</u></b>	Concerning the speaker. <i>He never forgave his father holding him <b>personally</b> responsible for this betrayal.</i>
<b>perspective</b>	A particular attitude towards or way of regarding something; a point of view. <i>A trick of <b>perspective</b>.</i>
<b>perspicacity</b>	The quality of having a ready insight into things; shrewdness. <i>The <b>perspicacity</b> of her remarks.</i>
<b>point</b>	A fielder at the point position. <i>He held me up at the <b>point</b> of a gun.</i>
<b>preconception</b>	A preconceived idea or prejudice. <i>He did not even try to confirm his <b>preconceptions</b>.</i>

<b>predetermine</b>	Establish or decide in advance. <i>Closed questions almost <b>predetermine</b> the response given.</i>
<b>prepossess</b>	To cause (a person) to be preoccupied with or by a feeling, notion, etc.; to preoccupy with or by; to imbue, inspire, or affect strongly beforehand. <i>A <b>prepossessing</b> appearance.</i>
<b>prospect</b>	An extensive view of landscape. <i>Clients deemed likely <b>prospects</b> for active party membership.</i>
<b>regard</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>Give him my kind <b>regards</b>.</i>
<b>sociology</b>	The study and classification of human societies.
<b>suasion</b>	Persuasion as opposed to force or compulsion. <i>The clearing banks found the use of both moral <b>suasion</b> and direct controls particularly irksome.</i>
<b>tableau</b>	A group of models or motionless figures representing a scene from a story or from history a tableau vivant. <i>In the first act the action is presented in a series of <b>tableaux</b>.</i>
<b>values</b>	Beliefs of a person or social group in which they have an emotional investment (either for or against something). <i>He has very conservatives <b>values</b>.</i>
<b>view</b>	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>The end of the tunnel came into <b>view</b>.</i>
<b><u>vista</u></b>	The visual percept of a region. <i><b>Vistas</b> of freedom seemed to open ahead of him.</i>
