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## Associations of "Stare down" (30 Words)

<b><a href="#">abate</a></b>	Become less in amount or intensity. <i>The storm <b>abated</b>.</i>
<b>declension</b>	The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>This <b>declension</b> involves only two endings a nominative and an oblique.</i>
<b>declivity</b>	A downward slope or bend. <i>A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b>.</i>
<b>decrease</b>	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He <b>decreased</b> his staff.</i>
<b>decrement</b>	The ratio of the amplitudes in successive cycles of a damped oscillation. <i>The instruction <b>decrements</b> the accumulator by one.</i>
<b>demoralize</b>	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>She hastened her daughter's steps lest she be <b>demoralized</b> by beholding the free manners of these mad English.</i>
<b>descend</b>	(of sound) become lower in pitch. <i>Groups of visiting supporters <b>descended</b> on a local pub.</i>
<b>descending</b>	Coming down or downward. <i>The categories are listed in <b>descending</b> order of usefulness.</i>
<b><a href="#">descent</a></b>	The descendants of one individual. <i>A <b>descent</b> on the Channel ports.</i>
<b>diminish</b>	Cause to seem less impressive or valuable. <i>The trial has aged and <b>diminished</b> him.</i>
<b>dismay</b>	Fill with apprehension or alarm; cause to be unpleasantly surprised. <i>They were <b>dismayed</b> by the U turn in policy.</i>
<b>downgrade</b>	Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. <i>Some jobs had gradually been <b>downgraded</b> from skilled to semi skilled.</i>

<b>downturn</b>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>The market took a <b>downturn</b>.</i>
<b>downward</b>	Moving or leading towards a lower place or level. <i>He lay face <b>downward</b>.</i>
<b>drop</b>	An act of dropping supplies or troops by parachute. <i>Warders standing on planks invariably flanked the prisoners on the <b>drop</b>.</i>
<b>falling</b>	Decreasing in number, amount, intensity, or quality. <i><b>Falling</b> attendance figures.</i>
<b>flop</b>	With a flopping sound. <i>He landed on the bed with a great <b>flop</b>.</i>
<b>gaze</b>	Look steadily and intently, especially in admiration, surprise, or thought. <i>The male <b>gaze</b>.</i>
<b>low</b>	Of a vowel pronounced with the tongue held low in the mouth open. <i>We were talking <b>low</b> so we wouldn't wake Dean.</i>
<b>lower</b>	Set lower. <i><b>Lower</b> a rating.</i>
<b>mandible</b>	Either of the upper and lower parts of a bird's beak. <i>The drake is all black except for an orange mark on the upper <b>mandible</b>.</i>
<b>reduction</b>	The act of reducing complexity. <i>Special <b>reductions</b> on knitwear.</i>
<b>shrinkage</b>	Process or result of becoming less or smaller. <i><b>Shrinkage</b> is the retail trade's euphemism for shoplifting.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause a ship to sink. <i>They planned to <b>sink</b> a gold mine in Oklahoma.</i>
<b>sit</b>	Adopt or be in a position in which one's weight is supported by one's buttocks rather than one's feet and one's back is upright. <i>I cannot baby <b>sit</b> tonight I have too much homework to do.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.</i>
<b>substrate</b>	The surface or material on or from which an organism lives, grows, or obtains its nourishment. <i>Brachiopods attached to the <b>substrate</b> by a stalk.</i>
<b>under</b>	Under water. <i>An <b>under</b> secretary.</i>
<b>vertically</b>	In a way that involves different levels or stages of a hierarchy or process. <i><b>Vertically</b> integrated companies.</i>
