abate	Become less in amount or intensity. <i>The storm abated.</i>
declension	The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>This declension involves only two endings a nominative and an oblique.</i>
declivity	A downward slope or bend. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He decreased his staff.</i>
decrement	The ratio of the amplitudes in successive cycles of a damped oscillation. <i>The instruction decrements the accumulator by one.</i>
demoralize	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>She hastened her daughter's steps lest she be demoralized by beholding the free manners of these mad English.</i>
descend	(of sound) become lower in pitch. <i>Groups of visiting supporters descended on a local pub.</i>
descending	Coming down or downward. <i>The categories are listed in descending order of usefulness.</i>
descent	The descendants of one individual. <i>A descent on the Channel ports.</i>
diminish	Cause to seem less impressive or valuable. <i>The trial has aged and diminished him.</i>
dismay	Fill with apprehension or alarm; cause to be unpleasantly surprised. <i>They were dismayed by the U turn in policy.</i>
downgrade	Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. <i>Some jobs had gradually been downgraded from skilled to semi skilled.</i>

downturn	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>The market took a downturn.</i>
downward	Moving or leading towards a lower place or level. <i>He lay face downward.</i>
drop	An act of dropping supplies or troops by parachute. <i>Warders standing on planks invariably flanked the prisoners on the drop.</i>
falling	Decreasing in number, amount, intensity, or quality. <i>Falling attendance figures.</i>
flop	With a flopping sound. <i>He landed on the bed with a great flop.</i>
gaze	Look steadily and intently, especially in admiration, surprise, or thought. <i>The male gaze.</i>
low	Of a vowel pronounced with the tongue held low in the mouth open. <i>We were talking low so we wouldn't wake Dean.</i>
lower	Set lower. <i>Lower a rating.</i>
mandible	Either of the upper and lower parts of a bird's beak. <i>The drake is all black except for an orange mark on the upper mandible.</i>
reduction	The act of reducing complexity. <i>Special reductions on knitwear.</i>
shrinkage	Process or result of becoming less or smaller. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade's euphemism for shoplifting.</i>
sink	Cause a ship to sink. <i>They planned to sink a gold mine in Oklahoma.</i>
sit	Adopt or be in a position in which one's weight is supported by one's buttocks rather than one's feet and one's back is upright. <i>I cannot baby sit tonight I have too much homework to do.</i>
submergence	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Politicians may be blamed for submergence of principle.</i>
substrate	The surface or material on or from which an organism lives, grows, or obtains its nourishment. <i>Brachiopods attached to the substrate by a stalk.</i>
under	Under water. <i>An under secretary.</i>
vertically	In a way that involves different levels or stages of a hierarchy or process. <i>Vertically integrated companies.</i>
