
### Staring as an Adjective

arrant	Complete, utter. An <b>arrant</b> fool.
complete	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>His range of skills made him the <b>complete</b> footballer.</i>
consummate	Perfect and complete in every respect; having all necessary qualities. <i>A</i> <b>consummate</b> artist.
double-dyed	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers.
everlasting	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>An everlasting</i> reminder of this evening.
gross	General or large-scale; not detailed. A revoltingly <b>gross</b> expletive.



perfect	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>Life certainly isn t</i> <b>perfect</b> <i>at the moment.</i>
<u>pure</u>	Being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i>Pure</i> science.
sodding	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. That ringtone drives me round the <b>sodding</b> bend every time I hear it.
<u>stark</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Facing the <b>stark</b> reality of the deadline.</i>
<u>thorough</u>	Performed or written with great care and completeness. The child is being a <b>thorough</b> nuisance.
thoroughgoing	Exemplifying a specified characteristic fully; absolute. A <b>thoroughgoing</b> reform of the whole economy.
<u>unadulterated</u>	Not mixed with impurities. Pure <b>unadulterated</b> jealousy.
<u>utter</u>	Complete. Charlotte stared at her in <b>utter</b> amazement.

# Associations of "Staring" (30 Words)

<u>absolute</u>	Used for emphasis when expressing an opinion. No one dare challenge her <b>absolute</b> authority.
all	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>Became <b>all</b> attention.</i>
arrant	Complete, utter. What <b>arrant</b> nonsense.
articulate	Denoting a brachiopod which has projections and sockets that form a hinge joining the two halves of the shell. <i>The wing is articulated to the thorax.</i>
<u>bleak</u>	Providing no shelter or sustenance. Life in the Aran Islands has always been <b>bleak</b> and difficult.
complete	Complete or carry out. He <b>complete</b> d his PhD in 1993.
entirety	The state of being total and complete. <i>He read the article in its <b>entirety</b>.</i>



enunciate	Express (a proposition, theory, etc.) in clear or definite terms. She <b>enunciate</b> d each word slowly.
<u>gaze</u>	(in literary theory) a particular perspective considered as embodying certain aspects of the relationship between observer and observed. <i>Offices screened from the public gaze</i> .
inerrancy	(Christianity) exemption from error. <i>Biblical <b>inerrancy</b>.</i>
infertile	(of land) unable to sustain crops or vegetation. Barren and <b>infertile</b> soils.
<u>intently</u>	With strained or eager attention. <i>He gazed at her <b>intently</b>.</i>
<u>irrevocably</u>	In a way that cannot be changed, reversed, or recovered. <i>Our environment will be irrevocably damaged.</i>
knavery	Lack of honesty; acts of lying or cheating or stealing.
look	An expression of a feeling or thought by looking. <i>People were looking at him.</i>
perfect	The perfect tense. A <b>perfect</b> stranger.
perfectly	Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been challenged or doubted. <i>The ring fitted <b>perfectly</b>.</i>
pronounce	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. A company whose name no one could <b>pronounce</b> .
<u>recite</u>	Recite in elocution. <i>He <b>recite</b>d passages of Dante.</i>
<u>sheer</u>	Cause to sheer. She giggled with <b>sheer</b> delight.
<u>stare</u>	Look at with fixed eyes. <i>The obituaries <b>stare</b>d out at us.</i>
<u>stark</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>His position is in <b>stark</b> contrast to that of Curran.</i>
thoroughgoing	Involving or attending to every detail or aspect of something. A <b>thoroughgoing</b> villain.
<u>totally</u>	Used to express agreement. A <b>totally</b> new situation.
<u>unadulterated</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <b>Unadulterated</b> whole milk yogurt.



<u>unconditional</u>	Not conditional. <b>Unconditional</b> surrender.
<u>unmitigated</u>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>The tour had been an <b>unmitigated</b> disaster.</i>
unmixed	Not mixed with extraneous elements. <i>Bold <b>unmixed</b> colours.</i>
<u>utter</u>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>Utter nonsense.</i>
vested	Fixed and absolute and without contingency. A <b>vested</b> right.
