# Startle as a Verb

#### Definitions of "Startle" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "startle" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm.
- Move or jump suddenly, as if in surprise or alarm.
- To stimulate to action.





## Synonyms of "Startle" as a verb (12 Words)

<u>alarm</u>	Be fitted or protected with an alarm. This door is locked and <b>alarm</b> ed between 11 p m and 6 a m.
frighten	Drive out by frightening. <i>The stranger who hangs around the building <b>frighten</b>s me.</i>
galvanise	Stimulate (muscles) by administering a shock.
<u>galvanize</u>	To stimulate to action. The urgency of his voice <b>galvanize</b> d them into action.
give someone a fright	Guide or direct, as by behavior of persuasion.
give someone a jolt	Convey, as of a compliment, regards, attention, etc.; bestow.



give someone a shock	Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.
jump	Pass over an obstacle or barrier by jumping. The bar is <b>jump</b> ing on Fridays and Saturdays.
make someone jump	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
<u>scare</u>	Become scared. The rapid questions were designed to <b>scare</b> her into blurting out the truth.
start	Give a signal to competitors to start in a race. The blood shed <b>start</b> ed when the partisans launched a surprise attack.
surprise	Cause to be surprised. He <b>surprise</b> d a gang stealing scrap metal.





### Usage Examples of "Startle" as a verb

- She startled when I walked into the room.
- The loud noise startled him awake.
- A sudden sound in the doorway startled her.
- He was startled to see a column of smoke.



# Associations of "Startle" (30 Words)

<u>amaze</u>	Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment. She <b>amaze</b> d doctors by fighting back when her deteriorating condition caused her to suffer heart failure.
amazed	Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock. An <b>amazed</b> audience gave the magician a standing ovation.
astonish	Affect with wonder. It <b>astonish</b> ed her that he was so anxious.



astound	Shock or greatly surprise. Her bluntness <b>astound</b> ed him.
<u>astounding</u>	Surprisingly impressive or notable. An <b>astounding</b> achievement.
<u>awe</u>	Capacity to inspire awe. The famous professor <b>awe</b> d the undergraduates.
daunt	Make (someone) feel intimidated or apprehensive. Some people are <b>daunt</b> ed by technology.
<u>daze</u>	To cause someone to lose clear vision, especially from intense light. <i>His mother s death left him in a daze</i> .
faze	Disturb or disconcert (someone. She was not <b>faze</b> d by his show of anger.
<u>flabbergasted</u>	Greatly surprised or astonished. <i>Flabbergasted</i> fans took to the streets to celebrate the team s big win.
fright	Frighten. She s had a nasty <b>fright</b> .
<u>horrific</u>	Causing horror. <i>Horrific</i> conditions in the mining industry.
impact	Influencing strongly. An asteroid <b>impact</b> ed the earth some 60 million years ago.
intimidate	To compel or deter by or as if by threats. <i>Her boss <b>intimidate</b>s her.</i>
<u>jolt</u>	Give a surprise or shock to (someone) in order to make them act or change. <i>The train jolted into motion.</i>
<u>panic</u>	Feel or cause to feel panic. <i>He caused an economic <b>panic</b> by his sudden resignation.</i>
phobia	An extreme or irrational fear of or aversion to something. Phobic disorder is a general term for all <b>phobia</b> s.
<u>scare</u>	Become scared. The rapid questions were designed to <b>scare</b> her into blurting out the truth.
serendipity	The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b> .
shock	Affect with physiological shock or with an electric shock. They were deeply <b>shock</b> ed by the murder.
<u>shocked</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.



<u>skittish</u>	(of a person) playfully frivolous or unpredictable. My <b>skittish</b> and immature mother.
<u>staggering</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>Suffered a <b>staggering</b> defeat.</i>
stun	Overcome as with astonishment or disbelief. <b>Stun</b> fish.
stupefy	Make senseless or dizzy by or as if by a blow. The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her.
surprise	Cause to be surprised. I was <b>surprise</b> d at his statement.
surprised	Feeling or showing surprise. There was a <b>surprised</b> silence.
terrify	Cause to feel extreme fear. The thought terrifies me.
<u>twitch</u>	Use a twitch to subdue a horse. The dog <b>twitch</b> ed his ears.
