amazing	Inspiring awe or admiration or wonder. She makes the most <b>amazing</b> cakes.
<u>astonishing</u>	Extremely surprising or impressive; amazing. An <b>astonishing</b> achievement.
<u>shocking</u>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation- Thackeray. <i>Shocking</i> behaviour.
<u>staggering</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>Suffered a <b>staggering</b> defeat.</i>
stunning	Causing or capable of causing bewilderment or shock or insensibility. A <b>stunning</b> detonation with volumes of black smoke.
<u>surprising</u>	Causing surprise or wonder or amazement. The report shows a <b>surprising</b> lack of hard factual data.
<u>unexpected</u>	Not expected or anticipated. <i>He seemed to have a knack for saying the <b>unexpected</b>.</i>





# Associations of "Startling" (30 Words)

admirable	Arousing or deserving respect and approval. <i>Trains ran with <b>admirable</b> precision.</i>
<u>amaze</u>	Be a mystery or bewildering to. He has been <b>amaze</b> d by the quality of the employees at the bank.
amazing	Causing great surprise or wonder; astonishing. She does an <b>amazing</b> amount of work.
astonish	Surprise or impress (someone) greatly. You never fail to <b>astonish</b> me.
<u>astonishing</u>	Surprising greatly. Such an enormous response was <b>astonishing</b> .



astound	Affect with wonder. Her bluntness <b>astound</b> ed him.
<u>astounding</u>	Bewildering or striking dumb with wonder. The summit offers <b>astounding</b> views.
awesome	Extremely impressive or daunting; inspiring awe. <i>The band is truly <b>awesome</b></i> .
curiously	In a strange and unusual way. Neighbours peered <b>curiously</b> through windows at me.
<u>daze</u>	A state of stunned confusion or bewilderment. She was <b>daze</b> d by his revelations.
<u>discovery</u>	The act of discovering something. The <b>discovery</b> of the body.
impress	Impress positively. Nobody <b>impress</b> ed on me the need to save.
<u>inconceivable</u>	Totally unlikely. They behaved with <b>inconceivable</b> cruelty.
incredible	Difficult to believe; extraordinary. <i>The book s plot is simply <b>incredible</b></i> .
incredibly	To a great degree; extremely. <i>Incredibly</i> she survived the crash.
<u>marvelous</u>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. A <b>marvelous</b> collection of rare books.
prodigious	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. <i>Her memory was <b>prodigious</b>.</i>
<u>revelation</u>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>Revelations</i> about his personal life.
serendipity	Good luck in making unexpected and fortunate discoveries. A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b> .
shattering	Very shocking or upsetting. The <b>shattering</b> tones of the enormous carillon.
shock	Subject to electrical shocks. The old car needed a new set of <b>shock</b> s.
<u>shocking</u>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation- Thackeray. <i>The most shocking book of its time.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	Deeply shocking; astonishing. Suffered a <b>staggering</b> defeat.



stupefy	Make dull or stupid or muddle with drunkenness or infatuation. The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her.
surprised	Feeling or showing surprise. <i>Surprised</i> that he remembered my name.
<u>surprising</u>	Causing surprise or wonder or amazement. A <b>surprising</b> sequence of events.
<u>surprisingly</u>	In an amazing manner; to everyone's surprise. <i>The move was <b>surprisingly</b> easy.</i>
<u>unexpected</u>	Not expected or regarded as likely to happen. <i>He seemed to have a knack for saying the <b>unexpected</b>.</i>
unexpectedly	In a way that was not expected. <i>He died <b>unexpectedly</b> of a heart attack.</i>
wonderful	Extraordinarily good or great ; used especially as intensifiers. They all think she s <b>wonderful</b> .
