- *A stoppage of flow of a body fluid.*
- *A period or state of inactivity or equilibrium.*
- *Civil strife.*

<b>accidie</b>	Spiritual or mental sloth; apathy.
<b><u>apathy</u></b>	An absence of emotion or enthusiasm. <i>Widespread <b>apathy</b> among students.</i>
<b>blocking</b>	The action or fact of blocking or obstructing someone or something. <i>The issue led to the disruption of classes and the <b>blocking</b> of the Kakata highway by angry students.</i>
<b>dormancy</b>	A state of quiet (but possibly temporary) inaction. <i>The insects are able to enter prolonged states of <b>dormancy</b> allowing them to resist freezing.</i>
<b>dullness</b>	The quality of not perceiving things distinctly. <i>The <b>dullness</b> of the colours.</i>
<b>enervation</b>	A feeling of being drained of energy or vitality; fatigue. <i>A sense of <b>enervation</b>.</i>

<b>idleness</b>	Laziness; indolence. <i>We suffered a period of enforced <b>idleness</b>.</i>
<b><u>inaction</u></b>	The state of being inactive. <i>Future generations will condemn us for <b>inaction</b>.</i>
<b>inactiveness</b>	The state of being inactive.
<b>inactivity</b>	The state of being inactive. <i>People are frustrated with government <b>inactivity</b>.</i>
<b>indolence</b>	Inactivity resulting from a dislike of work. <i>My failure is probably due to my own <b>indolence</b>.</i>
<b>inertness</b>	The tendency of a body to maintain its state of rest or uniform motion unless acted upon by an external force.
<b>languor</b>	An oppressive stillness of the air. <i>The afternoon was hot quiet and heavy with <b>languor</b>.</i>
<b>laziness</b>	Relaxed and easy activity. <i>The <b>laziness</b> of the day helped her to relax.</i>
<b><u>lethargy</u></b>	Weakness characterized by a lack of vitality or energy. <i>There was an air of <b>lethargy</b> about him.</i>
<b>listlessness</b>	Inactivity resulting from lethargy and lack of vigor or energy.
<b><u>malaise</u></b>	Physical discomfort (as mild sickness or depression). <i>A general air of <b>malaise</b>.</i>
<b><u>obstruction</u></b>	The physical condition of blocking or filling a passage with an obstruction. <i>He was charged with <b>obstruction</b> of a police officer in the execution of his duty.</i>
<b>passivity</b>	The trait of remaining inactive; a lack of initiative. <i>The perceived <b>passivity</b> of the populace is deceptive.</i>
<b><u>sloth</u></b>	A slow-moving tropical American mammal that hangs upside down from the branches of trees using its long limbs and hooked claws. <i>The pair had been attacked by a <b>sloth</b> of bears.</i>
<b>slothfulness</b>	A disinclination to work or exert yourself.
<b>sluggishness</b>	The pace of things that move relatively slowly. <i>The general appearance of <b>sluggishness</b> alarmed his friends.</i>
<b><u>stagnation</u></b>	The state of not flowing or moving. <i>Blocked drains resulting in water <b>stagnation</b>.</i>
<b>torpidity</b>	Inactivity resulting from lethargy and lack of vigor or energy.
<b>torpor</b>	A state of physical or mental inactivity; lethargy. <i>He fell into a deep <b>torpor</b>.</i>

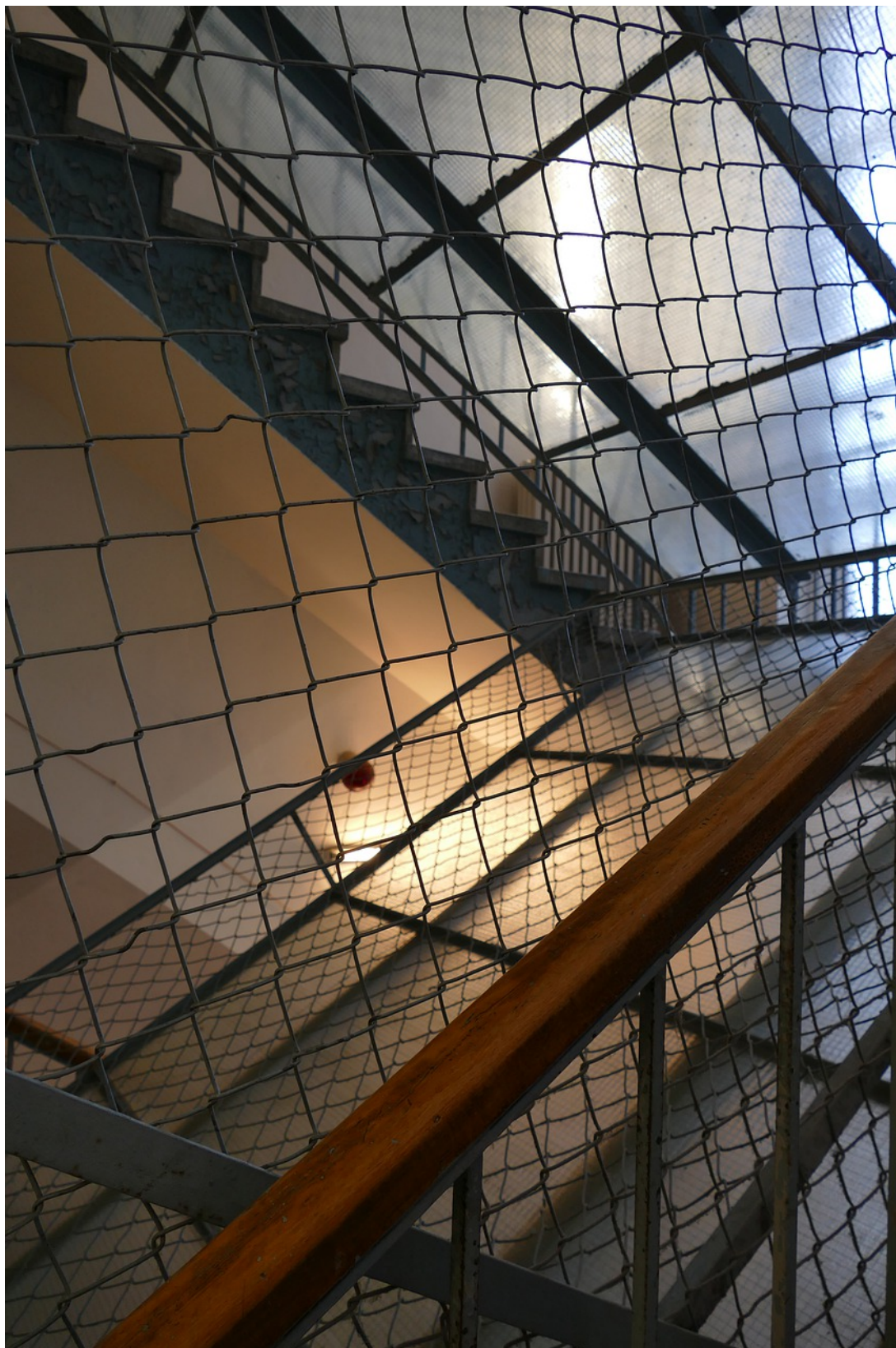

## Associations of "Stasis" (30 Words)

<b>abeyance</b>	The position of being without, or of waiting for, an owner or claimant. <i>Matters were held in <b>abeyance</b> pending further enquiries.</i>
<u><b>cease</b></u>	Cease is a noun only in the phrase without cease end. <i>The hostilities <b>ceased</b> and normal life was resumed.</i>
<u><b>cessation</b></u>	A stopping. <i>A <b>cessation</b> of the thunder.</i>
<u><b>deadlock</b></u>	Secure a door with a deadlock. <i>Ashton broke the <b>deadlock</b> with a penalty after 15 minutes.</i>
<b>desist</b>	Stop doing something; cease or abstain. <i>Each pledged to <b>desist</b> from acts of sabotage.</i>
<u><b>discontinue</b></u>	Cease taking (a newspaper or periodical) or paying (a subscription). <i>Their current top of the range running shoe is being <b>discontinued</b>.</i>
<b>discontinuity</b>	Lack of connection or continuity. <i>There is no significant <b>discontinuity</b> between modern and primitive societies.</i>
<b>dormancy</b>	The state in which a disease causes no symptoms but is not cured and is liable to recur. <i><b>Dormancy</b> allows woody plants to survive these unfavourable conditions.</i>
<u><b>dormant</b></u>	(of a plant or bud) alive but not actively growing. <i><b>Dormant</b> butterflies.</i>
<u><b>drowsy</b></u>	Showing lack of attention or boredom. <i>A <b>drowsy</b> suburb called Surrey Hills.</i>
<u><b>halt</b></u>	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>During the <b>halt</b> he got some lunch.</i>
<b>halting</b>	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>Uttered a few <b>halting</b> words of sorrow.</i>
<u><b>hiatus</b></u>	An interruption in the intensity or amount of something. <i>There was a brief <b>hiatus</b> in the war with France.</i>
<b>hibernation</b>	The act of retiring into inactivity. <i>Grizzly bears gorge on seeds to prepare for <b>hibernation</b>.</i>
<b>intermission</b>	A time interval during which there is a temporary cessation of something. <i>He was granted an <b>intermission</b> in his studies.</i>
<b>interruption</b>	The action of interrupting or being interrupted. <i>A chance to study without <b>interruption</b>.</i>

<b>momentarily</b>	For an instant or moment. <i>My husband will be here to pick me up <b>momentarily</b>.</i>
<b>pause</b>	Interrupt temporarily an activity before continuing. <i>She <b>paused</b> at a loss for words.</i>
<b>preside</b>	Act as president. <i>Johnson has <b>presided</b> over eight matches since Beck's dismissal.</i>
<b>quiescence</b>	Inactivity or dormancy. <i>This method has been shown to induce sleep like <b>quiescence</b> in adult animals.</i>
<b>reawaken</b>	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>His departure <b>reawakened</b> deep divisions within the party.</i>
<b>recess</b>	Make a recess in. <i>The lights are going to be <b>recessed</b> into the ceiling.</i>
<b>refrain</b>	Resist doing something. <i>He <b>refrained</b> from hitting him back.</i>
<b>relaxation</b>	The loss of tension in a part of the body, especially in a muscle when it ceases to contract. <i>The <b>relaxation</b> of requirements.</i>
<b>respite</b>	Grant a respite to someone especially a person condemned to death. <i>The execution was only <b>respited</b> a few months.</i>
<b>rest</b>	Be at rest. <i>The field should be grazed or <b>rested</b>.</i>
<b>stanch</b>	Stop the flow of a liquid.
<b>standstill</b>	A situation in which no progress can be made or no advancement is possible. <i>The traffic came to a <b>standstill</b>.</i>
<b>suspension</b>	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>The investigation led to the <b>suspension</b> of several officers.</i>
<b>waken</b>	Stop sleeping. <i>She <b>wakened</b> the child and dressed her.</i>
