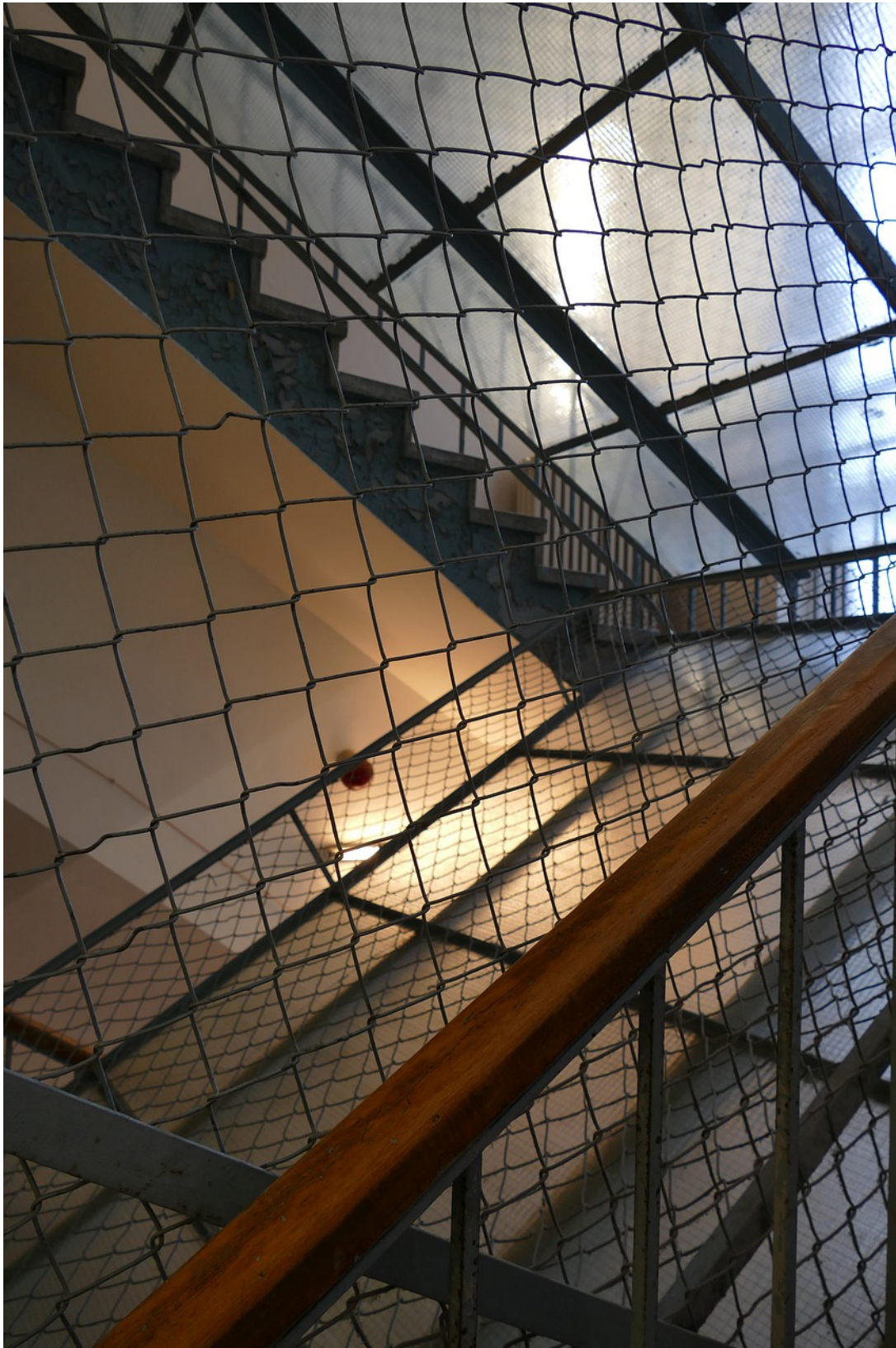
accidie	Spiritual or mental sloth; apathy.
<u>apathy</u>	An absence of emotion or enthusiasm. <i>Widespread apathy among students.</i>
blocking	The action or fact of blocking or obstructing someone or something. <i>The issue led to the disruption of classes and the blocking of the Kakata highway by angry students.</i>
dormancy	A state of quiet (but possibly temporary) inaction. <i>The insects are able to enter prolonged states of dormancy allowing them to resist freezing.</i>
dullness	The quality of not perceiving things distinctly. <i>The dullness of the colours.</i>
enervation	A feeling of being drained of energy or vitality; fatigue. <i>A sense of enervation.</i>

idleness	Laziness; indolence. <i>We suffered a period of enforced idleness.</i>
<u>inaction</u>	The state of being inactive. <i>Future generations will condemn us for inaction.</i>
inactiveness	The state of being inactive.
inactivity	The state of being inactive. <i>People are frustrated with government inactivity.</i>
indolence	Inactivity resulting from a dislike of work. <i>My failure is probably due to my own indolence.</i>
inertness	The tendency of a body to maintain its state of rest or uniform motion unless acted upon by an external force.
languor	An oppressive stillness of the air. <i>The afternoon was hot quiet and heavy with languor.</i>
laziness	Relaxed and easy activity. <i>The laziness of the day helped her to relax.</i>
<u>lethargy</u>	Weakness characterized by a lack of vitality or energy. <i>There was an air of lethargy about him.</i>
listlessness	Inactivity resulting from lethargy and lack of vigor or energy.
<u>malaise</u>	Physical discomfort (as mild sickness or depression). <i>A general air of malaise.</i>
<u>obstruction</u>	The physical condition of blocking or filling a passage with an obstruction. <i>He was charged with obstruction of a police officer in the execution of his duty.</i>
passivity	The trait of remaining inactive; a lack of initiative. <i>The perceived passivity of the populace is deceptive.</i>
<u>sloth</u>	A slow-moving tropical American mammal that hangs upside down from the branches of trees using its long limbs and hooked claws. <i>The pair had been attacked by a sloth of bears.</i>
slothfulness	A disinclination to work or exert yourself.
sluggishness	The pace of things that move relatively slowly. <i>The general appearance of sluggishness alarmed his friends.</i>
<u>stagnation</u>	The state of not flowing or moving. <i>Blocked drains resulting in water stagnation.</i>
torpidity	Inactivity resulting from lethargy and lack of vigor or energy.
torpor	A state of physical or mental inactivity; lethargy. <i>He fell into a deep torpor.</i>

Associations of "Stasis" (30 Words)

abeyance	The position of being without, or of waiting for, an owner or claimant. <i>Matters were held in abeyance pending further enquiries.</i>
cease	Cease is a noun only in the phrase without cease end. <i>The hostilities ceased and normal life was resumed.</i>
cessation	A stopping. <i>A cessation of the thunder.</i>
deadlock	Secure a door with a deadlock. <i>Ashton broke the deadlock with a penalty after 15 minutes.</i>
desist	Stop doing something; cease or abstain. <i>Each pledged to desist from acts of sabotage.</i>
discontinue	Cease taking (a newspaper or periodical) or paying (a subscription). <i>Their current top of the range running shoe is being discontinued.</i>
discontinuity	Lack of connection or continuity. <i>There is no significant discontinuity between modern and primitive societies.</i>
dormancy	The state in which a disease causes no symptoms but is not cured and is liable to recur. <i>Dormancy allows woody plants to survive these unfavourable conditions.</i>
dormant	(of a plant or bud) alive but not actively growing. <i>Dormant butterflies.</i>
drowsy	Showing lack of attention or boredom. <i>A drowsy suburb called Surrey Hills.</i>
halt	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>During the halt he got some lunch.</i>
halting	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>Uttered a few halting words of sorrow.</i>
hiatus	An interruption in the intensity or amount of something. <i>There was a brief hiatus in the war with France.</i>
hibernation	The act of retiring into inactivity. <i>Grizzly bears gorge on seeds to prepare for hibernation.</i>
intermission	A time interval during which there is a temporary cessation of something. <i>He was granted an intermission in his studies.</i>
interruption	The action of interrupting or being interrupted. <i>A chance to study without interruption.</i>

momentarily	For an instant or moment. <i>My husband will be here to pick me up momentarily.</i>
pause	Interrupt temporarily an activity before continuing. <i>She paused at a loss for words.</i>
preside	Act as president. <i>Johnson has presided over eight matches since Beck's dismissal.</i>
quiescence	Inactivity or dormancy. <i>This method has been shown to induce sleep like quiescence in adult animals.</i>
reawaken	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>His departure reawakened deep divisions within the party.</i>
recess	Make a recess in. <i>The lights are going to be recessed into the ceiling.</i>
refrain	Resist doing something. <i>He refrained from hitting him back.</i>
relaxation	The loss of tension in a part of the body, especially in a muscle when it ceases to contract. <i>The relaxation of requirements.</i>
respite	Grant a respite to someone especially a person condemned to death. <i>The execution was only respited a few months.</i>
rest	Be at rest. <i>The field should be grazed or rested.</i>
stanch	Stop the flow of a liquid.
standstill	A situation in which no progress can be made or no advancement is possible. <i>The traffic came to a standstill.</i>
suspension	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>The investigation led to the suspension of several officers.</i>
waken	Stop sleeping. <i>She wakened the child and dressed her.</i>
