- *(of a planet) having no apparent motion in longitude.*
- *Standing still.*
- *Not moving or not intended to be moved.*
- *Not capable of being moved.*
- *Not changing in quantity or condition.*



Synonyms of "Stationary" as an adjective (21 Words)

- changeless** Remaining the same.
***Changeless** truths.*
- consistent** In agreement or consistent or reliable.
*I have decided that the course of conduct which I am following is **consistent** with my sense of responsibility as president in time of war.*
- constant** Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection.
*The **constant** background noise of the city.*
- fixed** Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O'Brien.
*A **fixed** resistor.*
- halted** Disabled in the feet or legs.

immobile	Not moving; motionless. <i>An immobile workforce.</i>
invariable	(of a noun in an inflected language) having the same form in both the singular and the plural, as does <i>relais</i> in French. <i>An invariable rule.</i>
<u>motionless</u>	Not in physical motion. <i>An eagle hung almost motionless close to the ground.</i>
not moving	Arousing or capable of arousing deep emotion- N. Hawthorne.
<u>stable</u>	Not likely to change or fail; firmly established. <i>A stable relationship.</i>
<u>static</u>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>Demand has grown in what was a fairly static market.</i>
<u>steady</u>	(of a person) sensible, reliable, and self-restrained. <i>She tried to keep her voice steady.</i>
still	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>He lay still unable to move.</i>
stock-still	Absolutely still.
stopped	(of a nose) blocked. <i>A stopped or stopped up nose.</i>
<u>unchanged</u>	Not changed; unaltered. <i>The causes that produced them have remained unchanged.</i>
<u>unchanging</u>	Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i>
undeviating	Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. <i>The undeviating loyalty of his wife.</i>
<u>uniform</u>	Denoting a garment forming part of a person's uniform. <i>At regular or uniform intervals.</i>
unmoving	Not moving; still. <i>Claudia sat unmoving behind her desk.</i>
unvarying	Unvarying in nature. <i>The unvarying routine of parsonage life.</i>



Usage Examples of "Stationary" as an adjective

- *The car remained stationary with the engine running.*
- *A car collided with a stationary vehicle.*
- *Stationary machinery.*
- *A stationary population.*



Associations of "Stationary" (30 Words)

- already** Used after a word or phrase to express impatience.
*Anna has suffered a great deal **already**.*
- complacency** A feeling of smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements.
*The figures are better but there are no grounds for **complacency**.*
- constancy** (psychology) the tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation.
*Early mariners relied on the **constancy** of the trade winds.*
- dormancy** Temporary inactivity in a volcano.
*The volcano erupted after centuries of **dormancy**.*

fixed	Fixed and unmoving. <i>With eyes set in a fixed glassy stare.</i>
idleness	A state of inaction; inactivity. <i>We suffered a period of enforced idleness.</i>
immobile	Not capable of movement or of being moved. <i>An immobile workforce.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	Immovable property. <i>All immovable objects have graffiti sprayed on them.</i>
<u>inaction</u>	Lack of action where some is expected or appropriate. <i>Future generations will condemn us for inaction.</i>
inactive	Not involved in military operations. <i>Inactive accounts.</i>
inactivity	The state of being inactive. <i>People are frustrated with government inactivity.</i>
<u>inert</u>	Lacking the ability or strength to move. <i>She lay inert in her bed.</i>
lull	Calm by deception. <i>For two days there had been a lull in the fighting.</i>
<u>motionless</u>	Not in physical motion. <i>An eagle hung almost motionless close to the ground.</i>
<u>nonetheless</u>	In spite of that; nevertheless. <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was nonetheless attended by some 6 000.</i>
preside	Act as president. <i>The prime minister will preside at an emergency cabinet meeting.</i>
quiescence	Quiet and inactive restfulness. <i>This method has been shown to induce sleep like quiescence in adult animals.</i>
quiescent	Not active or activated. <i>Strikes were headed by groups of workers who had previously been quiescent.</i>
recumbent	Lying down; in a position of comfort or rest. <i>Recumbent statues.</i>
<u>sedentary</u>	(of a position) sitting; seated. <i>He spoke from a sedentary position.</i>
settled	Not changeable. <i>Nomads absorbed among the settled people.</i>

sitting	The act of assuming a certain position (as for a photograph or portrait). <i>The resignation of the sitting member.</i>
standing	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. <i>A man of high social standing.</i>
static	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>A static population.</i>
statics	The branch of mechanics concerned with bodies at rest and forces in equilibrium.
steadfast	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i>Steadfast loyalty.</i>
stiff	In a stiff manner. <i>Add wheat until the mixture is quite stiff.</i>
still	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. <i>Scarcely a ripple on the still water.</i>
tranquilize	Make calm or still.
unmoving	Not in motion. <i>Claudia sat unmoving behind her desk.</i>
