## Stationary as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Stationary" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stationary” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a planet) having no apparent motion in longitude.*
- *Standing still.*
- *Not moving or not intended to be moved.*
- *Not capable of being moved.*
- *Not changing in quantity or condition.*



## Synonyms of "Stationary" as an adjective (21 Words)

- changeless** Remaining the same.  
***Changeless** truths.*
- consistent** In agreement or consistent or reliable.  
*I have decided that the course of conduct which I am following is **consistent** with my sense of responsibility as president in time of war.*
- constant** Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection.  
*The **constant** background noise of the city.*
- fixed** Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O'Brien.  
*A **fixed** resistor.*
- halted** Disabled in the feet or legs.

<b>immobile</b>	Not moving; motionless. <i>An <b>immobile</b> workforce.</i>
<b>invariable</b>	(of a noun in an inflected language) having the same form in both the singular and the plural, as does <i>relais</i> in French. <i>An <b>invariable</b> rule.</i>
<b><u>motionless</u></b>	Not in physical motion. <i>An eagle hung almost <b>motionless</b> close to the ground.</i>
<b>not moving</b>	Arousing or capable of arousing deep emotion- N. Hawthorne.
<b><u>stable</u></b>	Not likely to change or fail; firmly established. <i>A <b>stable</b> relationship.</i>
<b><u>static</u></b>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>Demand has grown in what was a fairly <b>static</b> market.</i>
<b><u>steady</u></b>	(of a person) sensible, reliable, and self-restrained. <i>She tried to keep her voice <b>steady</b>.</i>
<b>still</b>	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>He lay <b>still</b> unable to move.</i>
<b>stock-still</b>	Absolutely still.
<b>stopped</b>	(of a nose) blocked. <i>A <b>stopped</b> or <b>stopped</b> up nose.</i>
<b><u>unchanged</u></b>	Not changed; unaltered. <i>The causes that produced them have remained <b>unchanged</b>.</i>
<b><u>unchanging</u></b>	Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.</i>
<b>undeviating</b>	Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. <i>The <b>undeviating</b> loyalty of his wife.</i>
<b><u>uniform</u></b>	Denoting a garment forming part of a person's uniform. <i>At regular or <b>uniform</b> intervals.</i>
<b>unmoving</b>	Not moving; still. <i>Claudia sat <b>unmoving</b> behind her desk.</i>
<b>unvarying</b>	Unvarying in nature. <i>The <b>unvarying</b> routine of parsonage life.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Stationary" as an adjective

- *The car remained stationary with the engine running.*
- *A car collided with a stationary vehicle.*
- *Stationary machinery.*
- *A stationary population.*



## Associations of "Stationary" (30 Words)

- already** Used after a word or phrase to express impatience.  
*Anna has suffered a great deal **already**.*
- complacency** A feeling of smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements.  
*The figures are better but there are no grounds for **complacency**.*
- constancy** (psychology) the tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation.  
*Early mariners relied on the **constancy** of the trade winds.*
- dormancy** Temporary inactivity in a volcano.  
*The volcano erupted after centuries of **dormancy**.*

<b>fixed</b>	Fixed and unmoving. <i>With eyes set in a <b>fixed</b> glassy stare.</i>
<b>idleness</b>	A state of inaction; inactivity. <i>We suffered a period of enforced <b>idleness</b>.</i>
<b>immobile</b>	Not capable of movement or of being moved. <i>An <b>immobile</b> workforce.</i>
<b><u>immovable</u></b>	Immovable property. <i>All <b>immovable</b> objects have graffiti sprayed on them.</i>
<b><u>inaction</u></b>	Lack of action where some is expected or appropriate. <i>Future generations will condemn us for <b>inaction</b>.</i>
<b>inactive</b>	Not involved in military operations. <i><b>Inactive</b> accounts.</i>
<b>inactivity</b>	The state of being inactive. <i>People are frustrated with government <b>inactivity</b>.</i>
<b><u>inert</u></b>	Lacking the ability or strength to move. <i>She lay <b>inert</b> in her bed.</i>
<b>lull</b>	Calm by deception. <i>For two days there had been a <b>lull</b> in the fighting.</i>
<b><u>motionless</u></b>	Not in physical motion. <i>An eagle hung almost <b>motionless</b> close to the ground.</i>
<b><u>nonetheless</u></b>	In spite of that; nevertheless. <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.</i>
<b>preside</b>	Act as president. <i>The prime minister will <b>preside</b> at an emergency cabinet meeting.</i>
<b>quiescence</b>	Quiet and inactive restfulness. <i>This method has been shown to induce sleep like <b>quiescence</b> in adult animals.</i>
<b>quiescent</b>	Not active or activated. <i>Strikes were headed by groups of workers who had previously been <b>quiescent</b>.</i>
<b>recumbent</b>	Lying down; in a position of comfort or rest. <i><b>Recumbent</b> statues.</i>
<b><u>sedentary</u></b>	(of a position) sitting; seated. <i>He spoke from a <b>sedentary</b> position.</i>
<b>settled</b>	Not changeable. <i>Nomads absorbed among the <b>settled</b> people.</i>

<b>sitting</b>	The act of assuming a certain position (as for a photograph or portrait). <i>The resignation of the <b>sitting</b> member.</i>
<b>standing</b>	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. <i>A man of high social <b>standing</b>.</i>
<b>static</b>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>A <b>static</b> population.</i>
<b>statics</b>	The branch of mechanics concerned with bodies at rest and forces in equilibrium.
<b>steadfast</b>	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i><b>Steadfast</b> loyalty.</i>
<b>stiff</b>	In a stiff manner. <i>Add wheat until the mixture is quite <b>stiff</b>.</i>
<b>still</b>	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. <i>Scarcely a ripple on the <b>still</b> water.</i>
<b>tranquilize</b>	Make calm or still.
<b>unmoving</b>	Not in motion. <i>Claudia sat <b>unmoving</b> behind her desk.</i>
