
## **Stationary as an Adjective**

- Not capable of being moved.
- Not changing in quantity or condition.






# Synonyms of "Stationary" as an adjective (21 Words)

changeless	Remaining the same. Changeless truths.
<u>consistent</u>	In agreement or consistent or reliable. I have decided that the course of conduct which I am following is <b>consistent</b> with my sense of responsibility as president in time of war.
constant	Steadfast in purpose or devotion or affection. The <b>constant</b> background noise of the city.
fixed	Fixed and unmoving Connor Cruise O Brien. A <b>fixed</b> resistor.
halted	Disabled in the feet or legs.



immobile	Not moving; motionless. <i>An <b>immobile</b> workforce</i> .
invariable	(of a noun in an inflected language) having the same form in both the singular and the plural, as does relais in French. An <b>invariable</b> rule.
<u>motionless</u>	Not in physical motion. An eagle hung almost <b>motionless</b> close to the ground.
not moving	Arousing or capable of arousing deep emotion- N. Hawthorne.
<u>stable</u>	Not likely to change or fail; firmly established. A <b>stable</b> relationship.
<u>static</u>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. Demand has grown in what was a fairly <b>static</b> market.
<u>steady</u>	(of a person) sensible, reliable, and self-restrained. <i>She tried to keep her voice <b>steady</b></i> .
still	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>He lay <b>still</b> unable to move.</i>
stock-still	Absolutely still.
stopped	(of a nose) blocked. A <b>stopped</b> or <b>stopped</b> up nose.
<u>unchanged</u>	Not changed; unaltered. The causes that produced them have remained <b>unchanged</b> .
<u>unchanging</u>	Conforming to the same principles or course of action over time. <i>The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.</i>
undeviating	Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. The <b>undeviating</b> loyalty of his wife.
<u>uniform</u>	Denoting a garment forming part of a person s uniform. <i>At regular or <b>uniform</b> intervals.</i>
unmoving	Not moving; still. Claudia sat <b>unmoving</b> behind her desk.
unvarying	Unvarying in nature. The <b>unvarying</b> routine of parsonage life.






### Usage Examples of "Stationary" as an adjective

# Associations of "Stationary" (30 Words)

already	Used after a word or phrase to express impatience. Anna has suffered a great deal <b>already</b> .
	A feeling of smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements. The figures are better but there are no grounds for <b>complacency</b> .
constancy	(psychology) the tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation. <i>Early mariners relied on the constancy of the trade winds.</i>
dormancy	Temporary inactivity in a volcano. The volcano erupted after centuries of <b>dormancy</b> .



fixed	Fixed and unmoving. With eyes set in a <b>fixed</b> glassy stare.
idleness	A state of inaction; inactivity. We suffered a period of enforced <b>idleness</b> .
immobile	Not capable of movement or of being moved. An <b>immobile</b> workforce.
<u>immovable</u>	Immovable property. All <b>immovable</b> objects have graffiti sprayed on them.
<u>inaction</u>	Lack of action where some is expected or appropriate. <i>Future generations will condemn us for inaction</i> .
inactive	Not involved in military operations. <i>Inactive</i> accounts.
inactivity	The state of being inactive. People are frustrated with government <b>inactivity</b> .
<u>inert</u>	Lacking the ability or strength to move. <i>She lay <b>inert</b> in her bed.</i>
lull	Calm by deception. For two days there had been a <b>lull</b> in the fighting.
<u>motionless</u>	Not in physical motion. An eagle hung almost <b>motionless</b> close to the ground.
<u>nonetheless</u>	In spite of that; nevertheless. The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.
preside	Act as president. The prime minister will <b>preside</b> at an emergency cabinet meeting.
quiescence	Quiet and inactive restfulness. This method has been shown to induce sleep like <b>quiescence</b> in adult animals.
quiescent	Not active or activated. Strikes were headed by groups of workers who had previously been <b>quiescent</b> .
recumbent	Lying down; in a position of comfort or rest. <i>Recumbent statues.</i>
<u>sedentary</u>	(of a position) sitting; seated. <i>He spoke from a <b>sedentary</b> position.</i>
settled	Not changeable. Nomads absorbed among the <b>settled</b> people.



sitting	The act of assuming a certain position (as for a photograph or portrait. <i>The resignation of the sitting member.</i>
standing	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. A man of high social <b>standing</b> .
<u>static</u>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. A <b>static</b> population.
statics	The branch of mechanics concerned with bodies at rest and forces in equilibrium.
steadfast	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i>Steadfast</i> loyalty.
<u>stiff</u>	In a stiff manner. Add wheat until the mixture is quite <b>stiff</b> .
still	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. Scarcely a ripple on the <b>still</b> water.
tranquilize	Make calm or still.
unmoving	Not in motion. Claudia sat <b>unmoving</b> behind her desk.
