serviceable	Fulfilling its function adequately; usable. <i>An ageing but still serviceable water supply system.</i>
solid	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>Based on solid facts.</i>
sound	Financially secure and safe. <i>A sound timber.</i>
stable	Firm and dependable; subject to little fluctuation. <i>Specially designed dinghies that are very stable.</i>
stalwart	Dependable. <i>He remained a stalwart supporter of the cause.</i>
steadfast	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. Steadfast loyalty.
steady	Regular, even, and continuous in development, frequency, or intensity. <i>A steady job.</i>
stout	(of a person) rather fat or of heavy build. Stout walking boots.
strong	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>The government were urged to take strong measures against the perpetrators of violence.</i>
substantial	Of or relating to the real nature or essential elements of something. <i>Breakfast is a substantial buffet.</i>
trusty	Worthy of trust or belief. <i>Their trusty steeds.</i>
unfaltering	Not faltering; steady; resolute. <i>Her unfaltering energy and determination.</i>
unhesitating	Without doubt or hesitation; immediate. <i>Unequivocal and unhesitating condemnation.</i>

unswerving	Not changing or becoming weaker; steady or constant. <i>Unswerving devotion.</i>
unwavering	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i>Unwavering loyalty.</i>
vigorous	Strong, healthy, and full of energy. <i>Gave her skirt a vigorous shake.</i>
well built	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
well made	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.

loyalty	A strong feeling of support or allegiance. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
monotheism	Belief in a single God.
pagan	Relating to pagans or their beliefs. <i>A Muslim majority had to live in close proximity to large communities of Christians and pagans.</i>
proselytize	Convert to another faith or religion. <i>Davis wanted to share his concept and proselytize his ideas.</i>
<u>resolute</u>	Admirably purposeful, determined, and unwavering. <i>A resolute and unshakeable faith.</i>
robust	Sturdy and strong in form, constitution, or construction. <i>The robust flavor of fresh brewed coffee.</i>
<u>solid</u>	A substance or object that is solid rather than liquid or fluid. <i>Based on solid facts.</i>
<u>stalwart</u>	Having rugged physical strength; inured to fatigue or hardships. <i>A stalwart supporter of the UN.</i>
steadfast	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i>Steadfast loyalty.</i>
<u>steady</u>	Make steady. <i>The lighter the camera the harder it is to hold steady.</i>
<u>stiff</u>	In a stiff manner. <i>A stiff increase in taxes.</i>
theism	Belief in the existence of a god or gods, specifically of a creator who intervenes in the universe. <i>There are many different forms of theism.</i>
<u>uncompromising</u>	Harsh or relentless. <i>Uncompromising honesty.</i>
<u>undeterred</u>	Persevering with something despite setbacks. <i>He was undeterred by these disasters.</i>

undismayed	Unshaken in purpose. <i>Wholly undismayed by the commercial failure of the three movies he had made.</i>
unshaken	Unshaken in purpose. <i>Their trust in him remained unshaken.</i>
unswerving	Not changing or becoming weaker; steady or constant. <i>A straight and narrow tree lined road unswerving across the lowlands.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Not showing abrupt variations- Louis Auchincloss. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering stare.</i>
