An agent that produces coagulation. An injection of blood <b>coagulant</b> .

Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. His voice was <b>drown</b> ed out by the approaching engine noise.
Arising from or used in an emergency. <i>He never knew what to do in an <b>emergency</b>.</i>
Sign in the presence of witnesses. In some states criminals are <b>execute</b> d.
An instrument of execution for execution by strangulation.
The practice of hanging condemned people as a form of capital punishment. <i>Controversial cross party issues such as abortion and hanging</i> .
Bind or connect with a ligature. He <b>ligature</b> d the duodenum below the pylorus.
A kiln with an inner chamber for firing things at a low temperature. <i>Muffle</i> one s anger.
The length of a horse s head and neck as a measure of its lead in a race. We started <b>neck</b> ing on the sofa.
Deliberately make (something) difficult. The appellants were arrested and later convicted of <b>obstruct</b> ing the police.
Full of small openings or gaps. An <b>open</b> shop employs nonunion workers.



<u>oppress</u>	Cause to suffer. A system which <b>oppress</b> ed working people.
overawe	Impress (someone) so much that they are silent or inhibited. The eleven year old was <b>overawe</b> d by the atmosphere.
<u>smother</u>	Make (someone) feel trapped and oppressed by acting in an overly protective manner towards them. <i>Smother fires.</i>
strangle	Die from strangulation. They allowed bureaucracy to <b>strangle</b> initiative.
strung	That is on a string.
<u>suffocate</u>	Feel or cause to feel trapped and oppressed. The child <b>suffocate</b> d herself with a plastic bag that the parents had left on the floor.
suffocation	Difficulty in breathing. The country s slow <b>suffocation</b> under the ever increasing weight of red tape.
<u>throttle</u>	Control an engine or vehicle with a throttle. The pitch of the engine fell as the driver <b>throttle</b> d back.
valve	Each of the halves of the hinged shell of a bivalve mollusc or brachiopod or of the parts of the compound shell of a barnacle. <i>The aortic valve</i> .
welter	A state of general disorder. The attack petered out in a <b>welter</b> of bloody confused fighting.
