The practice of hanging condemned people as a form of capital punishment.

Bind or connect with a ligature.

He **ligature** the duodenum below the pylorus.

muffle A kiln with an inner chamber for firing things at a low temperature.

Muffle one s anger.

neck

The length of a horse s head and neck as a measure of its lead in a race.

obstruct Deliberately make (something) difficult.

The appellants were arrested and later convicted of **obstruct**ing the police.

Full of small openings or gaps.

overawe Impress (someone) so much that they are silent or inhibited.
