## Synonyms of "Stillness" as a noun (5 Words)

<b><u><a href="#">hush</a></u></b>	Tranquil silence. <i>A <b>hush</b> descended over the crowd.</i>
<b>lifelessness</b>	Not having life.
<b>motionlessness</b>	The state or condition of being motionless, lack of motion; inactivity, inertness. <i>The utter <b>motionlessness</b> of a marble statue.</i>
<b>still</b>	A plant and works where alcoholic drinks are made by distillation. <i>He wanted some <b>stills</b> for a magazine ad.</i>
<b>windlessness</b>	An opening in a wall or screen that admits light and air and through which customers can be served.



## Usage Examples of "Stillness" as a noun

- *An eerie stillness engulfed the camp.*
- *Absolute stillness greeted our gaze.*



## Associations of "Stillness" (30 Words)

<b>acquiesce</b>	Accept something reluctantly but without protest. <i>Sara <b>acquiesced</b> in his decision.</i>
<b>acquiescence</b>	Acceptance without protest. <i>A murmur of <b>acquiescence</b> from the assembly.</i>
<b>calm</b>	Become quiet or calm especially after a state of agitation. <i><b>Calm</b> seas.</i>
<b>calming</b>	The act of appeasing (as by acceding to the demands of.
<b><u>calmness</u></b>	The state or condition of being free from disturbance or violent activity. <i>This relative <b>calmness</b> ended at around 7 a m when the wind picked up speed.</i>
<b>composure</b>	Steadiness of mind under stress. <i>She was struggling to regain her <b>composure</b>.</i>
<b>equanimity</b>	Calmness and composure, especially in a difficult situation. <i>He accepted their problems with composure and she with <b>equanimity</b>.</i>

<b>halcyon</b>	Denoting a period of time in the past that was idyllically happy and peaceful. <i>The <b>halcyon</b> days of the mid 1980s when profits were soaring.</i>
<b><u>hush</u></b>	Make (someone) be quiet or stop talking. <i>Management took steps to <b>hush</b> up the dangers.</i>
<b>meditation</b>	The action or practice of meditating. <i>A life of <b>meditation</b>.</i>
<b>nonviolence</b>	Peaceful resistance to a government by fasting or refusing to cooperate.
<b>pacific</b>	Peaceful in character or intent. <i>The result of this <b>pacific</b> policy was that no troops were called up.</i>
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i><b>Peace</b> came on November 11th.</i>
<b>peaceful</b>	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>They settle their disputes by <b>peaceful</b> means.</i>
<b><u>placid</u></b>	Not easily upset or excited. <i>A ribbon of sand between the angry sea and the <b>placid</b> bay.</i>
<b>quiescent</b>	(pathology) causing no symptoms. <i>A <b>quiescent</b> tumor.</i>
<b>quiet</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>The street below was <b>quiet</b> little traffic braving the snow.</i>
<b>quietness</b>	The fact or state of abstaining from speech. <i>Grandpa s sudden <b>quietness</b> was disconcerting.</i>
<b>quietude</b>	A state of peace and quiet. <i>It highlights her <b>quietude</b> and wise passivity.</i>
<b>repose</b>	Put or confide something in a person or thing. <i>He had lost none of his grace or his <b>repose</b>.</i>
<b><u>restful</u></b>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The rooms were cool and <b>restful</b>.</i>
<b>reticence</b>	The trait of being uncommunicative; not volunteering anything more than necessary. <i>The traditional emotional <b>reticence</b> of the British.</i>
<b>secretiveness</b>	The trait of keeping things secret.
<b><u>serene</u></b>	Calm, peaceful, and untroubled; tranquil. <i><b>Serene</b> certainty.</i>
<b><u>serenity</u></b>	The state of being calm, peaceful, and untroubled. <i>An oasis of <b>serenity</b> amidst the bustling city.</i>

<b>silence</b>	Cause to be quiet or not talk. <i>She was <b>silenced</b> by the officer's stern look.</i>
<b><u>tranquil</u></b>	Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>Her <b>tranquil</b> gaze.</i>
<b><u>tranquility</u></b>	A disposition free from stress or emotion.
<b>tranquelize</b>	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
<b>tranquillity</b>	An untroubled state; free from disturbances. <i>Passing cars are the only noise that disturbs the <b>tranquillity</b> of rural life.</i>
