**spell** A verbal formula believed to have magical force.

<b>term</b>	A statue or a human bust or an animal carved out of the top of a square pillar; originally used as a boundary marker in ancient Rome. <i>A prison <b>term</b>.</i>
<b>time</b>	Time as allotted available or used. <i>He is doing <b>time</b> in the county jail.</i>
<b>turn</b>	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>He was asked to do a <b>turn</b> at a children s party.</i>

- *Her stint as a lifeguard exhausted her.*
- *A collector with an eye for quality and the means to indulge it without stint.*







## Stint as a Verb

### Definitions of "Stint" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "stint" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities.*
- *Supply a very ungenerous or inadequate amount of (something).*
- *Restrict (someone) in the amount of something, especially money, given or permitted.*
- *Subsist on a meager allowance.*
- *Be very economical or mean about spending or providing something.*

<b>skimp</b>	Limit in quality or quantity. <i>Don't <b>skimp</b> on insurance when you book your holidays.</i>
<b>skimp on</b>	Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities.

## Associations of "Stint" (30 Words)

<b>cheaply</b>	With little expenditure of money. <i><b>Cheaply</b> priced designer furniture.</i>
<b>depositor</b>	A person who keeps money in a bank or building society account.
<b>economical</b>	(of a person or lifestyle) careful not to waste money or resources. <i>An <b>economical</b> meal.</i>
<b>frugal</b>	Sparing or economical as regards money or food. <i>I m a bit too <b>frugal</b> to splash out on designer clothes.</i>
<b>frugality</b>	The quality of being economical with money or food; thriftiness. <i>He scorned the finer things in life and valued <b>frugality</b> and simplicity.</i>
<b>limit</b>	Restrict or confine within limits. <i><b>Limit</b> the time you can spend with your friends.</i>
<b>meagerly</b>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>These voices are <b>meagerly</b> represented at the conference.</i>
<b>miser</b>	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical <b>miser</b> he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
<b>niggard</b>	Ungenerous niggardly.

<b>parsimonious</b>	Excessively unwilling to spend. <i>Even the <b>parsimonious</b> Joe paid for drinks all round.</i>
<b>parsimony</b>	Extreme unwillingness to spend money or use resources. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government <b>parsimony</b>.</i>
<b>redemptive</b>	Of or relating to or resulting in redemption- E.K.Brown. <i>A <b>redemptive</b> theory about life.</i>
<b><u>refrain</u></b>	Choose not to consume. <i>She <b>refrained</b> from comment.</i>
<b>restrain</b>	To close within bounds, limit or hold back from movement. <i>All front seats must be equipped with seat belts which <b>restrain</b> the upper part of the body.</i>
<b>restrict</b>	Place under restrictions limit access to. <i>At first the Americans tried to <b>restrict</b> news of their involvement in Vietnam.</i>
<b>restriction</b>	The limitation or control of someone or something, or the state of being restricted. <i>Planning <b>restrictions</b> on commercial development.</i>
<b><u>save</u></b>	Save from ruin destruction or harm. <i>This approach <b>saves</b> wear and tear on the books.</i>
<b>saving</b>	Characterized by thriftiness- Ellen Glasgow. <i><b>Saving</b> faith.</i>
<b><u>savings</u></b>	A fund of money put by as a reserve.
<b>schlock</b>	Cheap or inferior goods or material; trash. <i>Mass produced <b>schlock</b>.</i>
<b>scrimp</b>	Subsist on a meager allowance. <i>I have <b>scrumped</b> and saved to give you a good education.</i>
<b>skimp</b>	Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities. <i>Don t <b>skimp</b> on insurance when you book your holidays.</i>
<b>sparing</b>	Moderate; economical. <i>Physicians advised <b>sparing</b> use of the ointment.</i>
<b><u>sparingly</u></b>	In a restricted or infrequent manner; in small quantities. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used <b>sparingly</b>.</i>
<b>stinginess</b>	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
<b>stingy</b>	Mean; ungenerous. <i>His boss is <b>stingy</b> and idle.</i>



**thrift** Extreme care in spending money; reluctance to spend money unnecessarily.  
*The values of **thrift** and self reliance.*

**thrifty** Prosperous.  
*He had been brought up to be **thrifty** and careful.*

**tightwad** A mean or miserly person.  
*He is a notorious **tightwad**.*

**underestimate** Make a deliberately low estimate.  
*He had **underestimated** the new President.*
