session A period of recording music in a studio especially by a session musician.
*The governor called this week s special **session** to reconsider the decision.*

spell A verbal formula believed to have magical force.
*A **spell** of work.*

stretch	A stretch limo. <i>A four year stretch for tax fraud.</i>
term	A statue or a human bust or an animal carved out of the top of a square pillar; originally used as a boundary marker in ancient Rome. <i>A prison term.</i>
time	Time as allotted available or used. <i>He is doing time in the county jail.</i>
turn	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>He was asked to do a turn at a children s party.</i>

- *His varied career included a stint as a magician.*
- *Her stint as a lifeguard exhausted her.*
- *A collector with an eye for quality and the means to indulge it without stint.*



Stint as a Verb

Definitions of "Stint" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "stint" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities.*
- *Supply a very ungenerous or inadequate amount of (something).*
- *Restrict (someone) in the amount of something, especially money, given or permitted.*
- *Subsist on a meager allowance.*
- *Be very economical or mean about spending or providing something.*

scant	Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities. <i>He does not scant his attention to the later writings.</i>
scrimp	Be thrifty or parsimonious; economize. <i>Scratch and scrimp.</i>
scrimp on	Subsist on a meager allowance.
skimp	Limit in quality or quantity. <i>Don't skimp on insurance when you book your holidays.</i>
skimp on	Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities.

- *Stowage room hasn't been stinted.*
- *He doesn't stint on wining and dining.*
- *To avoid having to stint yourself, budget in advance.*
- *Stint with the allowance.*



Associations of "Stint" (30 Words)

cheaply	With little expenditure of money. <i>Cheaply priced designer furniture.</i>
depositor	A person who keeps money in a bank or building society account.
economical	(of a person or lifestyle) careful not to waste money or resources. <i>An economical meal.</i>
frugal	Sparing or economical as regards money or food. <i>I m a bit too frugal to splash out on designer clothes.</i>
frugality	The quality of being economical with money or food; thriftiness. <i>He scorned the finer things in life and valued frugality and simplicity.</i>
limit	Restrict or confine within limits. <i>Limit the time you can spend with your friends.</i>
meagerly	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>These voices are meagerly represented at the conference.</i>
miser	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical miser he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
niggard	Ungenerous niggardly.

parsimonious	Excessively unwilling to spend. <i>Even the parsimonious Joe paid for drinks all round.</i>
parsimony	Extreme unwillingness to spend money or use resources. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government parsimony.</i>
redemptive	Of or relating to or resulting in redemption- E.K.Brown. <i>A redemptive theory about life.</i>
refrain	Choose not to consume. <i>She refrained from comment.</i>
restrain	To close within bounds, limit or hold back from movement. <i>All front seats must be equipped with seat belts which restrain the upper part of the body.</i>
restrict	Place under restrictions limit access to. <i>At first the Americans tried to restrict news of their involvement in Vietnam.</i>
restriction	The limitation or control of someone or something, or the state of being restricted. <i>Planning restrictions on commercial development.</i>
save	Save from ruin destruction or harm. <i>This approach saves wear and tear on the books.</i>
saving	Characterized by thriftiness- Ellen Glasgow. <i>Saving faith.</i>
savings	A fund of money put by as a reserve.
schlock	Cheap or inferior goods or material; trash. <i>Mass produced schlock.</i>
scrimp	Subsist on a meager allowance. <i>I have scrumped and saved to give you a good education.</i>
skimp	Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities. <i>Don t skimp on insurance when you book your holidays.</i>
sparing	Moderate; economical. <i>Physicians advised sparing use of the ointment.</i>
sparingly	In a restricted or infrequent manner; in small quantities. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used sparingly.</i>
stinginess	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
stingy	Mean; ungenerous. <i>His boss is stingy and idle.</i>

thrift Extreme care in spending money; reluctance to spend money unnecessarily.
*The values of **thrift** and self reliance.*

thrifty Prosperous.
*He had been brought up to be **thrifty** and careful.*

tightwad A mean or miserly person.
*He is a notorious **tightwad**.*

underestimate Make a deliberately low estimate.
*He had **underestimated** the new President.*
