- *A sum of money allotted on a regular basis; usually for some specific purpose.*

<b>earnings</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>He claimed damages for loss of <b>earnings</b>.</i>
<b>fee</b>	Money regularly paid to a school or similar institution for continuing services. <i>They were faced with legal <b>fees</b> of 3000.</i>
<b>fees</b>	A fixed charge for a privilege or for professional services.
<b>gross pay</b>	Twelve dozen.
<b>net pay</b>	A trap made of netting to catch fish or birds or insects.
<b>pay</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>An entitlement to sickness <b>pay</b>.</i>

<b>remuneration</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<u>salary</u>	A fixed regular payment, typically paid on a monthly basis but often expressed as an annual sum, made by an employer to an employee, especially a professional or white-collar worker. <i>He received a <b>salary</b> of 24 000.</i>
<b>take-home pay</b>	Something that remunerates.
<b>wage</b>	Something that remunerates. <i><b>Wages</b> were paid by check.</i>
<u>wages</u>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The <b>wages</b> of sin is death.</i>

<u>allowance</u>	Give someone a sum of money as an allowance. <i>He objected to the <b>allowance</b> of smoking in the dining room.</i>
<b>almanac</b>	An annual publication including weather forecasts and other miscellaneous information arranged according to the calendar of a given year.
<u>annual</u>	An annual plant. <i>Trade journals <b>annuals</b> and directories.</i>
<b>annually</b>	Without missing a year. <i>Sales are increasing by about 17 <b>annually</b>.</i>
<u>audit</u>	A systematic review or assessment of something. <i>Unlimited companies must also have their accounts <b>audited</b>.</i>
<u>biannual</u>	Occurring twice a year. <i>The <b>biannual</b> meeting of the planning committee.</i>
<b>biennial</b>	A biennial plant. <i>They met at <b>biennial</b> conventions.</i>
<b>bimonthly</b>	Occurring every two months. <i>A <b>bimonthly</b> newsletter.</i>
<b>biweekly</b>	Every two weeks or twice a week. <i>She followed her doctor's instructions to undergo health checks <b>biweekly</b>.</i>
<u>calendar</u>	Enter into a calendar. <i>I have you on my <b>calendar</b> for next Monday.</i>
<u>cash</u>	Exchange for cash. <i>A discount for <b>cash</b>.</i>

<b><u>commute</u></b>	Reduce (a judicial sentence, especially a sentence of death) to another less severe one. <i>The governor <b>commuted</b> the sentence to fifteen years imprisonment.</i>
<b>deductible</b>	(taxes) an amount that can be deducted (especially for the purposes of calculating income tax. <i>Childcare vouchers will be <b>deductible</b> expenses for employers.</i>
<b>diurnal</b>	Having a daily cycle or occurring every day. <i><b>Diurnal</b> rotation of the heavens.</i>
<b><u>earn</u></b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>The dollars can be placed on deposit and <b>earn</b> interest.</i>
<b><u>income</u></b>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>Figures showed an overall increase in <b>income</b> this year.</i>
<b><u>loan</u></b>	An act of lending something to someone. <i><b>Loan</b> me some money.</i>
<b>monthly</b>	Of or occurring or payable every month. <i>The Council held <b>monthly</b> meetings.</i>
<b>overpayment</b>	A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit <b>overpayments</b>.</i>
<b><u>periodic</u></b>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The <b>periodic</b> visits she made to her father.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	(of a magazine or newspaper) published at regular intervals. <i>She took <b>periodical</b> gulps of her tea.</i>
<b>property</b>	Shares or investments in property. <i>He s expanding now buying <b>property</b>.</i>
<b><u>publication</u></b>	The act of issuing printed materials. <i>Scientific <b>publications</b>.</i>
<b>quarterly</b>	A periodical that is published every quarter (or four issues per year). <i>A <b>quarterly</b> newsletter is distributed to members.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<b><u>regularly</u></b>	At uniform intervals of time. <i>A <b>regularly</b> updated news page.</i>
<b>semiannual</b>	Occurring or payable twice each year.
<b><u>tax</u></b>	Levy a tax on. <i>An officer <b>taxing</b> a bill of costs.</i>
<b>triennial</b>	The 300th anniversary (or the celebration of it). <i>The <b>triennial</b> meeting of the Association.</i>
