- *A fixed regular sum paid as a salary or as expenses to a clergyman, teacher, or public official.*
- *A sum of money allotted on a regular basis; usually for some specific purpose.*

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| earnings | Something that remunerates. <i>He claimed damages for loss of earnings.</i> |
| fee | Money regularly paid to a school or similar institution for continuing services. <i>They were faced with legal fees of 3000.</i> |
| fees | A fixed charge for a privilege or for professional services. |
| gross pay | Twelve dozen. |
| net pay | A trap made of netting to catch fish or birds or insects. |
| pay | Something that remunerates. <i>An entitlement to sickness pay.</i> |

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| remuneration | Something that remunerates. <i>Adequate remuneration for his work.</i> |
| <u>salary</u> | A fixed regular payment, typically paid on a monthly basis but often expressed as an annual sum, made by an employer to an employee, especially a professional or white-collar worker. <i>He received a salary of 24 000.</i> |
| take-home pay | Something that remunerates. |
| wage | Something that remunerates. <i>Wages were paid by check.</i> |
| <u>wages</u> | A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The wages of sin is death.</i> |

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| <u>allowance</u> | Give someone a sum of money as an allowance. <i>He objected to the allowance of smoking in the dining room.</i> |
| almanac | An annual publication including weather forecasts and other miscellaneous information arranged according to the calendar of a given year. |
| <u>annual</u> | An annual plant. <i>Trade journals annuals and directories.</i> |
| annually | Without missing a year. <i>Sales are increasing by about 17 annually.</i> |
| <u>audit</u> | A systematic review or assessment of something. <i>Unlimited companies must also have their accounts audited.</i> |
| <u>biannual</u> | Occurring twice a year. <i>The biannual meeting of the planning committee.</i> |
| biennial | A biennial plant. <i>They met at biennial conventions.</i> |
| bimonthly | Occurring every two months. <i>A bimonthly newsletter.</i> |
| biweekly | Every two weeks or twice a week. <i>She followed her doctor's instructions to undergo health checks biweekly.</i> |
| <u>calendar</u> | Enter into a calendar. <i>I have you on my calendar for next Monday.</i> |
| <u>cash</u> | Exchange for cash. <i>A discount for cash.</i> |

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| commute | Reduce (a judicial sentence, especially a sentence of death) to another less severe one. <i>The governor commuted the sentence to fifteen years imprisonment.</i> |
| deductible | (taxes) an amount that can be deducted (especially for the purposes of calculating income tax. <i>Childcare vouchers will be deductible expenses for employers.</i> |
| diurnal | Having a daily cycle or occurring every day. <i>Diurnal rotation of the heavens.</i> |
| earn | Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>The dollars can be placed on deposit and earn interest.</i> |
| income | The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>Figures showed an overall increase in income this year.</i> |
| loan | An act of lending something to someone. <i>Loan me some money.</i> |
| monthly | Of or occurring or payable every month. <i>The Council held monthly meetings.</i> |
| overpayment | A payment larger than needed or expected. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit overpayments.</i> |
| periodic | Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic visits she made to her father.</i> |
| periodical | (of a magazine or newspaper) published at regular intervals. <i>She took periodical gulps of her tea.</i> |
| property | Shares or investments in property. <i>He s expanding now buying property.</i> |
| publication | The act of issuing printed materials. <i>Scientific publications.</i> |
| quarterly | A periodical that is published every quarter (or four issues per year). <i>A quarterly newsletter is distributed to members.</i> |
| rates | A local tax on property (usually used in the plural). |
| regularly | At uniform intervals of time. <i>A regularly updated news page.</i> |
| semiannual | Occurring or payable twice each year. |
| tax | Levy a tax on. <i>An officer taxing a bill of costs.</i> |
| triennial | The 300th anniversary (or the celebration of it). <i>The triennial meeting of the Association.</i> |

weekly

A newspaper or periodical issued every week.
*The difference in **weekly** income is 29 10.*
