- *Capable of arousing enthusiasm or excitement.*

<b>dramatic</b>	Exciting or impressive. <i>The <b>dramatic</b> arts.</i>
<b>electrifying</b>	Arousing a sudden sense of great excitement; thrilling. <i>The atmosphere in the stadium was <b>electrifying</b>.</i>
<b>emotional</b>	Determined or actuated by emotion rather than reason. <i>Gaining <b>emotional</b> support from relatives.</i>
<b>emotive</b>	Characterized by emotion. <i>The comparisons are <b>emotive</b> rather than analytic.</i>
<b>exciting</b>	Causing great enthusiasm and eagerness. <i>An <b>exciting</b> account of her trip.</i>

<b>heady</b>	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences-Macaulay. <i>Several bottles of <b>heady</b> local wine.</i>

<b><u>impassioned</u></b>	Characterized by intense emotion. An <b><i>impassioned</i></b> appeal.
<b>inspirational</b>	Imparting a divine influence on the mind and soul. The team's <b><i>inspirational</i></b> captain.
<b><u>inspiring</u></b>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. He was an <b><i>inspiring</i></b> teacher.
<b>moving</b>	Producing strong emotion, especially sadness or sympathy. A constantly <b><i>moving</i></b> crowd.
<b>passionate</b>	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. A <b><i>passionate</i></b> kiss.
<b><u>riveting</u></b>	Capable of arousing and holding the attention. The book is a <b><i>riveting</i></b> account of the legendary freedom fighter.
<b>rousing</b>	Rousing to activity or heightened action as by spurring or goading. Tossed a <b><i>rousing</i></b> political comment into the conversation.
<b>soul-stirring</b>	Exciting strong but not unpleasant emotions.
<b><u>spirited</u></b>	Made lively or spirited. A <b><i>spirited</i></b> campaigner for women's rights.
<b>stimulating</b>	Rousing or quickening activity or the senses. A <b><i>stimulating</i></b> discussion.
<b><u>thrilling</u></b>	Causing quivering or shivering as by cold or fear or electric shock. A <b><i>thrilling</i></b> adventure.

<b>agitative</b>	Tending to agitate or move (something); involving agitation.
<b>begin</b>	Have a beginning of a temporal event. <i>This economic measure doesn't even <b>begin</b> to deal with the problem of inflation.</i>
<b>beginning</b>	The first part or section of something. <i>He left at the <b>beginning</b> of February.</i>
<b>challenging</b>	Inviting competition; provocative. <i>The current <b>challenging</b> economic environment.</i>
<b>charged</b>	Having an electric charge. <i>A <b>charged</b> battery.</i>
<b>colonist</b>	A person who settles in a new colony or moves into new country.
<u><b>commence</b></u>	Take the first step or steps in carrying out an action. <i>His design team <b>commenced</b> work.</i>
<u><b>commencement</b></u>	The time at which something is supposed to begin. <i>The date of <b>commencement</b>.</i>
<u><b>effervescent</b></u>	(of a liquid) giving off bubbles; fizzy. <i>An <b>effervescent</b> mixture of cheap wine fruit flavours sugar and carbon dioxide.</i>
<b>germinal</b>	Relating to or of the nature of a germ cell or embryo. <i>De Beauvoir's <b>germinal</b> book <i>The Second Sex</i>.</i>
<b>iconoclast</b>	A Puritan of the 16th or 17th century.
<b>inaugurate</b>	Admit (someone) formally to office. <i>The museum was <b>inaugurated</b> on September 12.</i>
<b>incendiary</b>	An incendiary bomb or device. <i><b>Incendiary</b> rhetoric.</i>
<u><b>incipient</b></u>	Only partly in existence; imperfectly formed. <i>An <b>incipient</b> tumor.</i>
<b>inflammatory</b>	Characterized or caused by inflammation. <i><b>Inflammatory</b> remarks.</i>
<b>initiate</b>	A person who has been initiated into an organization or activity. <i>She had been formally <b>initiated</b> into the movement.</i>
<u><b>inspiring</b></u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>He was an <b>inspiring</b> teacher.</i>
<b>launch</b>	An act or instance of launching something. <i>He <b>launched</b> a biting attack on BBC chiefs.</i>

<b>moving</b>	Arousing or capable of arousing deep emotion. <i>The <b>moving</b> parts of the machine.</i>
<b><u>originate</u></b>	Come into existence; take on form or shape. <i>A new religious movement <b>originated</b> in that country.</i>
<b>outset</b>	The start or beginning of something. <i>A field of which he had known nothing at the <b>outset</b> and learned on the job.</i>
<b>pep</b>	Liveliness and energy. <i>Measures to <b>pep</b> up the economy.</i>
<b><u>pioneer</u></b>	Open up a road or terrain as a pioneer. <i>The technique was <b>pioneered</b> by a Swiss doctor in the 1930s.</i>
<b><u>provocative</u></b>	Causing anger or another strong reaction, especially deliberately. <i>A <b>provocative</b> article.</i>
<b>rousing</b>	Rousing to activity or heightened action as by spurring or goading. <i>A fine <b>rousing</b> fire that will soon warm you.</i>
<b>seditious</b>	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>The letter was declared <b>seditious</b>.</i>
<b>start</b>	Give a signal to competitors to start in a race. <i>I <b>start</b> my day with a good breakfast.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Act as a stimulant. <i>The courses <b>stimulate</b> a passion for learning.</i>
<b>stimulating</b>	Encouraging or arousing interest or enthusiasm. <i>A rich and <b>stimulating</b> working environment.</i>
<b>trailblazer</b>	A person who is the first to do something; an innovator. <i>He was a <b>trailblazer</b> for many ideas that are now standard fare.</i>
