<u>impassioned</u>	Characterized by intense emotion. An <i>impassioned</i> appeal.
inspirational	Imparting a divine influence on the mind and soul. The team's <i>inspirational</i> captain.
<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. He was an <i>inspiring</i> teacher.
moving	Producing strong emotion, especially sadness or sympathy. A constantly <i>moving</i> crowd.
passionate	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. A <i>passionate</i> kiss.
<u>riveting</u>	Capable of arousing and holding the attention. The book is a <i>riveting</i> account of the legendary freedom fighter.
rousing	Rousing to activity or heightened action as by spurring or goading. Tossed a <i>rousing</i> political comment into the conversation.
soul-stirring	Exciting strong but not unpleasant emotions.
<u>spirited</u>	Made lively or spirited. A <i>spirited</i> campaigner for women's rights.
stimulating	Rousing or quickening activity or the senses. A <i>stimulating</i> discussion.
<u>thrilling</u>	Causing quivering or shivering as by cold or fear or electric shock. A <i>thrilling</i> adventure.

incendiary	An incendiary bomb or device. <i>Incendiary rhetoric.</i>
<u>incipient</u>	Only partly in existence; imperfectly formed. <i>An incipient tumor.</i>
inflammatory	Characterized or caused by inflammation. <i>Inflammatory remarks.</i>
initiate	A person who has been initiated into an organization or activity. <i>She had been formally initiated into the movement.</i>
<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>He was an inspiring teacher.</i>
launch	An act or instance of launching something. <i>He launched a biting attack on BBC chiefs.</i>

moving	Arousing or capable of arousing deep emotion. <i>The moving parts of the machine.</i>
<u>originate</u>	Come into existence; take on form or shape. <i>A new religious movement originated in that country.</i>
outset	The start or beginning of something. <i>A field of which he had known nothing at the outset and learned on the job.</i>
pep	Liveliness and energy. <i>Measures to pep up the economy.</i>
<u>pioneer</u>	Open up a road or terrain as a pioneer. <i>The technique was pioneered by a Swiss doctor in the 1930s.</i>
<u>provocative</u>	Causing anger or another strong reaction, especially deliberately. <i>A provocative article.</i>
rousing	Rousing to activity or heightened action as by spurring or goading. <i>A fine rousing fire that will soon warm you.</i>
seditious	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>The letter was declared seditious.</i>
start	Give a signal to competitors to start in a race. <i>I start my day with a good breakfast.</i>
stimulate	Act as a stimulant. <i>The courses stimulate a passion for learning.</i>
stimulating	Encouraging or arousing interest or enthusiasm. <i>A rich and stimulating working environment.</i>
trailblazer	A person who is the first to do something; an innovator. <i>He was a trailblazer for many ideas that are now standard fare.</i>
