## Stitch as a Noun

### Definitions of "Stitch" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stitch” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A method of sewing, knitting, or crocheting producing a particular pattern or design.*
- *A loop of thread or yarn resulting from a single pass or movement of the needle in sewing, knitting, or crocheting.*
- *A sharp spasm of pain in the side resulting from running.*
- *A sudden sharp pain in the side of the body, caused by strenuous exercise.*
- *A loop of thread used to join the edges of a wound or surgical incision.*
- *A link or loop or knot made by an implement in knitting, crocheting, embroidery, or sewing.*
- *The smallest item of clothing.*



## Synonyms of "Stitch" as a noun (7 Words)

- pang** A sudden sharp pain or painful emotion.  
*A **pang** of conscience.*
- sharp pain** A long thin sewing needle with a sharp point.
- shooting pain** Killing someone by gunfire.
- spasm** (pathology) sudden constriction of a hollow organ (as a blood vessel).  
*Shifting heavy loads without help brought on muscular back **spasms**.*
- stab of pain** A strong blow with a knife or other sharp pointed instrument.
- stabbing pain** A strong blow with a knife or other sharp pointed instrument.
- twinge** A sharp stab of pain.  
*He felt a **twinge** in his knee.*



### **Usage Examples of "Stitch" as a noun**

- *He had to have sixteen stitches to his head.*
- *Nymphs with come-hither looks and not a stitch on.*
- *He was panting and had a stitch.*
- *Basic embroidery stitches.*





## Stitch as a Verb

### Definitions of "Stitch" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "stitch" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Fasten by sewing; do needlework.*
- *Make, mend, or join (something) with stitches.*



## Synonyms of "Stitch" as a verb (7 Words)

<b>baste</b>	Pour fat or juices over (meat) during cooking in order to keep it moist. <b><i>Baste</i></b> a hem.
<b>hem</b>	Utter hem or ahem. <b><i>Hem</i></b> my skirt.
<b>run up</b>	Cause something to pass or lead somewhere.
<b>seam</b>	Sew the seam of or join with a seam. <b><i>Seam</i></b> a dress.
<b>sew</b>	Attach something to something else by sewing. She could <b><i>sew</i></b> the veil on properly in the morning.
<b>sew together</b>	Create (clothes) with cloth.
<b>tack</b>	Fasten with tacks. Their boat was now downwind and they had to <b><i>tack</i></b> .





## Usage Examples of "Stitch" as a verb

- *Hand-stitched dresses.*
- *They stitched the cut on her face.*
- *Stitch a plain seam with right sides together.*



## Associations of "Stitch" (30 Words)

### **bend**

Bend one s back forward from the waist on down.  
*A refusal to **bend** to mob rule.*

### **blanket**

Cover as if with a blanket.  
*The double glazing **blankets** the noise a bit.*

### **blouse**

A loose linen or cotton garment formerly worn by peasants and manual workers, typically belted at the waist.  
*I **bloused** my trousers over my boots.*

### **clothes**

Bedclothes.  
*A **clothes** shop.*

### **cotton**

Thread made of cotton fibers.  
*A white **cotton** blouse.*



<b>crease</b>	Make wrinkles or creases on a smooth surface make a pressed folded or wrinkled line in. <i><b>Crease</b> the paper like this to make a crane.</i>
<b>crochet</b>	Crocheted fabric or items. <i>She sat there <b>crocheting</b> all day.</i>
<b>crumple</b>	Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>She <b>crumpled</b> to the floor in a dead faint.</i>
<b>embroidery</b>	Elaboration of an interpretation by the use of decorative (sometimes fictitious) detail. <i>The bazaars stock a wide variety of <b>embroidery</b>.</i>
<b>garment</b>	An item of clothing. <i>Fashion <b>garments</b>.</i>
<b>hem</b>	Utter hem or ahem. <i>He stitched weights into the curtain s <b>hem</b>.</i>
<b>hoop</b>	Bind or encircle with or as with hoops. <i>Spin the <b>hoop</b> around your waist or around your hips.</i>
<b>knit</b>	Knit with a knit stitch. <i>A machine washable <b>knit</b>.</i>
<b>needle</b>	Prick with a needle. <i>The meter <b>needle</b> barely moved.</i>
<b>needlepoint</b>	Embroider in needlepoint.
<b>needlework</b>	Work (such as sewing or embroidery) that is done with a needle. <i>Exhibits include Eastern <b>needlework</b>.</i>
<b>pillow</b>	Serve as a pillow for. <i>His head was <b>pillowed</b> on his arm.</i>
<b>pleat</b>	Fold into pleats. <i>She was absently <b>pleating</b> her skirt between her fingers.</i>
<b>pucker</b>	Draw together into folds or puckers. <i>The child s face <b>puckered</b> ready to cry.</i>
<b>quilt</b>	A layer of padding used for insulation. <i><b>Quilt</b> the skirt.</i>
<b>rumple</b>	Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>She left her clothes in a <b>rumple</b> on the floor.</i>
<b>sampler</b>	A representative collection or example of something. <i>A candy <b>sampler</b>.</i>
<b>seam</b>	Put together with a seam. <i>Our stockings are <b>seamed</b> by hand.</i>



<b>sew</b>	Fasten by sewing do needlework. <i>I don t even <b>sew</b> very well.</i>
<b>skirt</b>	(Fungi) a remnant of the partial veil that in mature mushrooms surrounds the stem like a collar. <i>Bits of beef <b>skirt</b>.</i>
<b>thimble</b>	As much as a thimble will hold.
<b><u>thread</u></b>	Thread on or as if on a string. <i><b>Thread</b> tape.</i>
<b>tuck</b>	Make a tuck or several folds in. <i>Lenzi nailed a reverse 3 1 2 somersault <b>tuck</b> on his final dive.</i>
<b>wrinkle</b>	Become wrinkled or crumpled or creased. <i>She smoothed out the <b>wrinkles</b> from her skirt.</i>
