<b>inventory</b>	A complete list of items such as property, goods in stock, or the contents of a building. <i>An <b>inventory</b> may be necessary to see if anything is missing.</i>
<b>keep</b>	Look after be the keeper of have charge of. <i>Rice will <b>keep</b> almost indefinitely without spoiling.</i>
<b>objective</b>	The objective case. <i>An <b>objective</b> appraisal.</i>
<b>overload</b>	Become overloaded. <i>An <b>overload</b> of stress.</i>
<b>produce</b>	Cultivate by growing, often involving improvements by means of agricultural techniques. <i>These chemicals <b>produce</b> a noxious vapor.</i>
<b>profitability</b>	The quality of affording gain or benefit or profit. <i><b>Profitability</b> may not improve until well into next year.</i>
<b>shopworn</b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>He brought out some <b>shopworn</b> lettuce.</i>
<b>stack</b>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i>He spent most of the time <b>stacking</b> shelves.</i>

<b>stockpile</b>	Accumulate a large stock of (goods or materials). <i>A <b>stockpile</b> of sandbags was being prepared.</i>
<b><u>storage</u></b>	A depository for goods. <i>My car is in <b>storage</b>.</i>
<b><u>store</u></b>	A mercantile establishment for the retail sale of goods or services. <i>The squirrel has a <b>store</b> of food.</i>
<b>storehouse</b>	A building used for storing goods. <i><b>Storehouses</b> were built close to the docks.</i>
<b>stuff</b>	Fill with a stuffing while cooking. <i><b>Stuff</b> and nonsense.</i>
<b><u>threadbare</u></b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i><b>Threadbare</b> rugs.</i>
<b>timeworn</b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>Parroting some <b>timeworn</b> axiom.</i>
<b><u>trite</u></b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>The <b>trite</b> metaphor hard as nails.</i>
<b>warehouse</b>	Store in a warehouse. <i>Our objective is not to <b>warehouse</b> prisoners but to help inmates build new lives.</i>
<b>watering</b>	Wetting with water. <i>The lawn needs a great deal of <b>watering</b>.</i>
