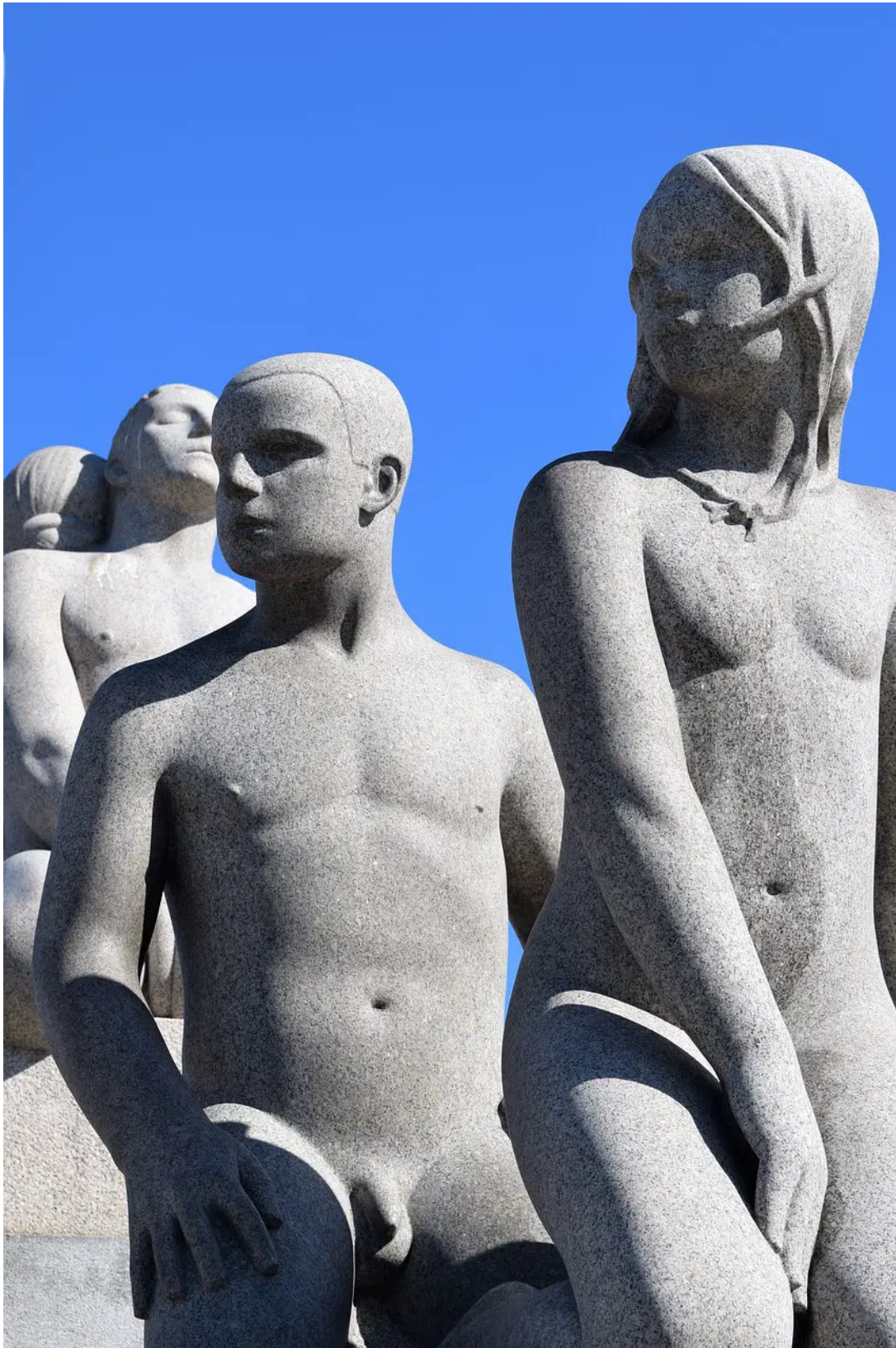


Stoic as an Adjective

- *Of or belonging to the Stoics or their school of philosophy.*
- *Seeming unaffected by pleasure or pain; impassive.*



Synonyms of "Stoic" as an adjective (1 Word)

stoical Seeming unaffected by pleasure or pain; impassive.
A *stoical* sufferer.

Associations of "Stoic" (30 Words)

<u>apathetic</u>	Showing or feeling no interest, enthusiasm, or concern. An <i>apathetic</i> electorate.
asceticism	The doctrine that through renunciation of worldly pleasures it is possible to achieve a high spiritual or intellectual state. <i>Acts of physical asceticism.</i>
<u>blase</u>	Nonchalantly unconcerned. His <i>blase</i> indifference.
bored	Feeling weary and impatient because one is unoccupied or lacks interest in one's current activity. <i>Strolled through the museum with a bored air.</i>
callous	Make insensitive or callous deaden feelings or morals. <i>With a workman s callous hands.</i>
<u>crass</u>	(of persons) so unrefined as to be lacking in discrimination and sensibility. <i>The crass assumptions that men make about women.</i>
<u>disinterest</u>	Lack of interest in something. <i>He chided Dennis for his disinterest in anything that is not his own idea.</i>
<u>dismissive</u>	Showing indifference or disregard. <i>A dismissive shrug.</i>
dispirited	Marked by low spirits; showing no enthusiasm. <i>A dispirited and divided Party.</i>
emotionless	Unmoved by feeling. <i>Her voice was flat and emotionless.</i>

exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>Exhausted oil wells.</i>
impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>He remained impassive showing neither interest in nor concern for our plight.</i>
inattention	Failure to attend to one's responsibilities; negligence. <i>A moment of inattention which could have cost lives.</i>
indifference	Unbiased impartial unconcern. <i>It cannot be regarded as a matter of indifference.</i>
indifferent	Fairly poor to not very good. <i>The universe is neither hostile nor friendly it is simply indifferent.</i>
<u>insensitive</u>	Showing or feeling no concern for others' feelings. <i>She was remarkably insensitive to pain.</i>
insouciant	Showing a casual lack of concern. <i>An insouciant shrug.</i>
<u>lackadaisical</u>	Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. <i>A lackadaisical defence left Spurs adrift in the second half.</i>
<u>listless</u>	Lacking zest or vivacity. <i>He was listless and bored.</i>
<u>philosopher</u>	A specialist in philosophy.
<u>regardless</u>	In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks. <i>He carried on regardless of the difficulties.</i>
<u>sleepy</u>	Inducing sleep; soporific. <i>Sleepyheaded students.</i>
stolid	Having or revealing little emotion or sensibility; not easily aroused or excited. <i>Her face showed nothing but stolid indifference.</i>
tired	(of a thing) no longer fresh or in good condition. <i>I have to look after these animals when you get tired of them.</i>
unconcern	A lack of worry or interest, especially when surprising or callous. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent unconcern about his actions.</i>
<u>unconcerned</u>	Not occupied or engaged with. <i>The prisoner seems entirely unconcerned as to the outcome of the examination.</i>
<u>unimportant</u>	Not important. <i>The question seems unimportant.</i>

- uninterested** Not having or showing interest.
*An **uninterested** spectator.*
- unmolested** Not interfered with, disturbed, or harmed.
*They allowed him to pass **unmolested**.*
- untroubled** Not feeling, showing, or affected by anxiety or problems.
*A kind **untroubled** face.*
