unemotional person A grammatical category used in the classification of pronouns, possessive determiners, and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker, the addressee, or a third party.






Stoic as an Adjective

Definitions of "Stoic" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "stoic" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Pertaining to Stoicism or its followers.
- Of or belonging to the Stoics or their school of philosophy.
- Seeming unaffected by pleasure or pain; impassive.







Synonyms of "Stoic" as an adjective (1 Word)

stoical Seeming unaffected by pleasure or pain; impassive. *A stoical* sufferer.

Usage Examples of "Stoic" as an adjective

- Stoic patience.
- A stoical sufferer.
- A look of stoic resignation.
- Stoic courage.
- Seneca preached Stoic abstinence.
- The Stoic philosophers.

Associations of "Stoic" (30 Words)

<u>apathetic</u>	Showing or feeling no interest, enthusiasm, or concern. An apathetic electorate.
asceticism	The doctrine that through renunciation of worldly pleasures it is possible to achieve a high spiritual or intellectual state. <i>Acts of physical asceticism</i> .
<u>blase</u>	Nonchalantly unconcerned. His blase indifference.
bored	Feeling weary and impatient because one is unoccupied or lacks interest in one's current activity. Strolled through the museum with a bored air.
callous	Make insensitive or callous deaden feelings or morals. With a workman s callous hands.
<u>crass</u>	(of persons) so unrefined as to be lacking in discrimination and sensibility. The crass assumptions that men make about women.
<u>disinterest</u>	Lack of interest in something. <i>He chided Dennis for his disinterest in anything that is not his own idea.</i>
<u>dismissive</u>	Showing indifference or disregard. A dismissive shrug.
dispirited	Marked by low spirits; showing no enthusiasm. A dispirited and divided Party.
emotionless	Unmoved by feeling. <i>Her voice was flat and emotionless.</i>



exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>Exhausted</i> oil wells.
impassive	Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>He remained impassive showing neither interest in nor concern for our plight.</i>
inattention	Failure to attend to one's responsibilities; negligence. A moment of inattention which could have cost lives.
indifference	Unbiased impartial unconcern. It cannot be regarded as a matter of indifference .
indifferent	Fairly poor to not very good. The universe is neither hostile nor friendly it is simply indifferent .
<u>insensitive</u>	Showing or feeling no concern for others' feelings. She was remarkably insensitive to pain.
insouciant	Showing a casual lack of concern. An insouciant shrug.
<u>lackadaisical</u>	Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. A lackadaisical defence left Spurs adrift in the second half.
<u>listless</u>	Lacking zest or vivacity. <i>He was listless and bored.</i>
<u>philosopher</u>	A specialist in philosophy.
<u>regardless</u>	In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks. <i>He carried on regardless of the difficulties.</i>
<u>sleepy</u>	Inducing sleep; soporific. <i>Sleepy</i> headed students.
stolid	Having or revealing little emotion or sensibility; not easily aroused or excited. Her face showed nothing but stolid indifference.
tired	(of a thing) no longer fresh or in good condition. I have to look after these animals when you get tired of them.
unconcern	A lack of worry or interest, especially when surprising or callous. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent</i> unconcern <i>about his actions.</i>
<u>unconcerned</u>	Not occupied or engaged with. The prisoner seems entirely unconcerned as to the outcome of the examination.
<u>unimportant</u>	Not important. The question seems unimportant .



uninterested	Not having or showing interest. An uninterested spectator.
unmolested	Not interfered with, disturbed, or harmed. <i>They allowed him to pass unmolested</i> .
untroubled	Not feeling, showing, or affected by anxiety or problems. <i>A kind untroubled face.</i>
