Associations of "Stolen" (30 Words)

brigand	An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.
burglar	A person who commits burglary.
burglary	Illegal entry of a building with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>A two year sentence for burglary.</i>
burgle	Enter (a building) illegally with intent to commit a crime, especially theft. <i>Our house in London has been burgled.</i>
confiscate	Take or seize (someone’s property) with authority. <i>The guards confiscated his camera.</i>
deprive	Keep from having, keeping, or obtaining. <i>The Archbishop deprived a considerable number of puritan clergymen.</i>
despoil	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>The church was despoiled of its marble wall covering.</i>
filch	Make off with belongings of others. <i>They filched milk off morning doorsteps.</i>
interloper	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>To her I was always an outsider an interloper.</i>
larceny	Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a statutory crime by theft in 1968.
loot	Steal (goods) in a war, riot, etc. <i>During the earthquake people looted the stores that were deserted by their owners.</i>
pillage	Goods or money obtained illegally. <i>Rebellious peasants intent on pillage.</i>
piracy	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Software piracy.</i>

plunder	Plunder a town after capture. <i>We shall plunder related sciences to assist our research.</i>
rapine	The act of despoiling a country in warfare. <i>Industrial rapine.</i>
recidivist	Relating to recidivists. <i>The third lowest recidivist rate in the country.</i>
rob	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>Poor health has robbed her of a normal social life.</i>
robber	A person who commits robbery.
robbery	Plundering during riots or in wartime. <i>An armed robbery.</i>
rustler	A person who rounds up and steals cattle, horses, or sheep. <i>Police have so far arrested 649 rustlers countrywide.</i>
shoplift	Steal goods from a shop while pretending to be a customer. <i>He was spotted shoplifting at the supermarket near his home.</i>
shoplifting	The act of stealing goods that are on display in a store. <i>Shrinkage is the retail trade s euphemism for shoplifting.</i>
theft	The action or crime of stealing. <i>The latest theft happened at a garage.</i>
thief	A criminal who takes property belonging to someone else with the intention of keeping it or selling it. <i>The thief stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.</i>
thieve	Be a thief; steal something. <i>The students have been thieving my favourite art books.</i>
thievery	The action of stealing another person's property. <i>Petty thievery.</i>
transgression	The spreading of the sea over land as evidenced by the deposition of marine strata over terrestrial strata. <i>I ll be keeping an eye out for further transgressions.</i>
usurp	Encroach or infringe upon (someone's rights). <i>The Hanoverian dynasty had usurped the Stuarts.</i>
vagrancy	The state of wandering from place to place; having no permanent home or means of livelihood. <i>A descent into vagrancy and drug abuse.</i>
waylay	Stop or interrupt (someone) and detain them in conversation or trouble them in some other way. <i>He waylaid me on the stairs.</i>
