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brigand An armed thief who is (usually) a member of a band.

burglar A person who commits burglary.

burglary

Illegal entry of a building with intent to commit a crime, especially theft.

A two year sentence for **burglary**.

burgle Enter (a building) illegally with intent to commit a crime, especially theft.

Our house in London has been **burgle**d.

Take or seize (someone's property) with authority.

The guards **confiscate**d his camera.

deprive Keep from having, keeping, or obtaining.

The Archbishop **deprive**d a considerable number of puritan clergymen.

Steal goods; take as spoils.

despoilThe church was **despoil**ed of its marble wall covering.

Make off with belongings of others.

They **filch**ed milk off morning doorsteps.

A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not

interloper wanted or are considered not to belong.

To her I was always an outsider an **interloper**.

larceny

Theft of personal property In English law larceny was replaced as a

statutory crime by theft in 1968.

Steal (goods) in a war, riot, etc.

loot During the earthquake people **loot**ed the stores that were deserted by their

owners.

pillage Goods or money obtained illegally.

Rebellious peasants intent on **pillage**.

. A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking.

piracy Software piracy.



Plunder a town after capture.

We shall **plunder** related sciences to assist our research.

rapine The act of despoiling a country in warfare.

Industrial **rapine**.

recidivist Relating to recidivists.

The third lowest **recidivist** rate in the country.

rob Rip off; ask an unreasonable price.

Poor health has **rob**bed her of a normal social life.

robber A person who commits robbery.

Plundering during riots or in wartime.

robbery

An armed robbery.

A person who rounds up and steals cattle, horses, or sheep.

Police have so far arrested 649 rustlers countrywide.

shoplift Steal goods from a shop while pretending to be a customer.

He was spotted **shoplift**ing at the supermarket near his home.

shopliftingThe act of stealing goods that are on display in a store.

Shrinkage is the retail trade s euphemism for **shoplifting**.

theft The action or crime of stealing.

The latest **theft** happened at a garage.

A criminal who takes property belonging to someone else with the intention

thief of keeping it or selling it.

The **thief** stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.

thieve Be a thief; steal something.

The students have been thieving my favourite art books.

thieveryThe action of stealing another person's property.

Petty **thievery**.

The spreading of the sea over land as evidenced by the deposition of

Encroach or infringe upon (someone's rights.
