<b>painless</b>	Requiring little hard work or exertion. <i>A <b>painless</b> death.</i>
<b>simple</b>	Having few parts; not complex or complicated or involved. <i>The house is furnished in a <b>simple</b> country style.</i>
<u><b>sincere</b></u>	Free from pretence or deceit; proceeding from genuine feelings. <i>She d sounded <b>sincere</b> enough.</i>
<u><b>square</b></u>	Having an outline resembling two corners of a square. <i>A <b>square</b> peg in a round hole.</i>
<u><b>straight</b></u>	Simple straightforward. <i><b>Straight</b> dealing.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	(of artistic or literary representation) characterized by accuracy or realism; true to life. <i>I want a <b>truthful</b> answer.</i>
<b>uncomplicated</b>	Simple or straightforward. <i>Small and <b>uncomplicated</b> cars for those really interested in motoring.</i>
<b>undemanding</b>	(especially of a task) not demanding. <i>Simple <b>undemanding</b> affection.</i>
<b>unexacting</b>	Not rigorous. <i>Relaxed and <b>unexacting</b> standards.</i>

- candor** Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty.

- certainty** A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place.  
*There is a bewildering lack of **certainty** and clarity in the law.*
- clarity** The quality of transparency or purity.  
*When she awoke the **clarity** was back in her eyes.*
- clear** Clear and distinct to the senses easily perceptible.  
*There were open fields **clear** to the horizon.*
- clearly** Clear to the mind; with distinct mental discernment.  
*Her ability to write **clearly**.*
- conciseness** Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.

<b><u>definite</u></b>	Having exact and discernible physical limits or form. <i>I want a <b>definite</b> answer.</i>
<b>determinate</b>	Having exact and discernible limits or form. <i><b>Determinate</b> variations in animals.</i>
<b>directness</b>	The quality of being plain and straightforward. <i>Despite the <b>directness</b> of the route the old road was terribly difficult.</i>
<b>distinct</b>	Physically separate. <i>A <b>distinct</b> flavor.</i>
<b><u>explicit</u></b>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i><b>Explicit</b> sexual scenes.</i>
<b>generality</b>	A statement or principle having general rather than specific validity or force. <i>His service was better than that offered by the <b>generality</b> of doctors.</i>
<b>limpid</b>	(of language) transparently clear; easily understandable. <i>The <b>limpid</b> waters of the Caribbean.</i>
<b><u>lucid</u></b>	Bright or luminous. <i>A <b>lucid</b> account.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>It was an <b>obvious</b> remark to make.</i>
<b>pellucid</b>	Translucently clear. <i>Mountains reflected in the <b>pellucid</b> waters.</i>
<b>perspicuous</b>	(of language) transparently clear; easily understandable. <i>It provides simpler and more <b>perspicuous</b> explanations than its rivals.</i>
<b>plain</b>	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Everyone dined at a <b>plain</b> wooden table.</i>
<b><u>pushover</u></b>	A person who is easy to overcome or influence. <i>This is going to be a <b>pushover</b>.</i>
<b>simple</b>	Lacking mental capacity and subtlety. <i>Her black dress <b>simple</b> to austerity.</i>
<b>simplicity</b>	A lack of penetration or subtlety. <i>The <b>simplicity</b> of a crystal.</i>
<b>simplification</b>	Elimination of superfluous details. <i>He is proposing <b>simplification</b> of the planning system.</i>
<b><u>simplify</u></b>	Make simpler or easier or reduce in complexity or extent. <i>This move will <b>simplify</b> our lives.</i>
<b><u>transparent</u></b>	Easy to perceive or detect. <i>Fine <b>transparent</b> fabrics.</i>

- unambiguous** Having or exhibiting a single clearly defined meaning- Mario Vargas Llosa.  
*Instructions should be **unambiguous**.*
- unequivocal** Leaving no doubt; unambiguous.  
*The plain and **unequivocal** language of the laws.*
- univocal** Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion.  
*A **univocal** set of instructions.*
- unmistakable** Not able to be mistaken for anything else; very distinctive.  
*His opposition to slavery was **unmistakable**.*
