Definitions of "Stranded" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stranded” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a boat, sailor, or sea creature) left aground on a shore.*
- *Left without the means to move from somewhere.*
- *Cut off or left behind.*



Synonyms of "Stranded" as an adjective (8 Words)

- beached** Hauled up or stranded on a beach.
*A **beached** whale.*
- grounded** Well balanced and sensible.
*For someone so young Chris is extremely **grounded**.*
- helpless** Unable to function; without help.
*Lying ill and **helpless**.*
- high and dry** Happy and excited and energetic.
- in difficulties** Directed or bound inward.
- isolated** Marked by separation of or from usually contiguous elements.
*Tiny **isolated** villages remote from centers of civilization.*
- marooned** Cut off or left behind.
*Travelers **marooned** by the blizzard.*
- stuck** Caught or fixed.
*This problem has me completely **stuck**.*



Usage Examples of "Stranded" as an adjective

- *Several stranded fish in a tide pool.*
- *A stranded whale.*
- *She offers a lift to a stranded commuter.*



Associations of "Stranded" (30 Words)

- braided** (of hair) formed into a braid or braids.
*A **braided** river carries an enormous burden of sand and gravel.*
- cable** Fasten with a cable.
*Nearly all urban areas are **cabled** so viewers can choose from up to 20 channels.*
- cashmere** Woollen material made from or resembling cashmere.
*A **cashmere** jumper.*
- cocoon** Wrap in or as if in a cocoon as for protection.
*The moth emerged from its pale yellow papery **cocoon**.*
- cord** A length of cord.
*The baby was still attached to its mother by the **cord**.*
- cotton** Thread made of cotton fibers.
*A white **cotton** blouse.*

crochet	Make a garment or piece of fabric using crochet. <i>Crochet a bedspread.</i>
doff	Remove (an item of clothing). <i>The manager doffed his hat to her.</i>
fibre	A substance formed of fibres. <i>A weak person with no moral fibre.</i>
fibrosis	The thickening and scarring of connective tissue, usually as a result of injury.
fleece	A jacket or other garment made from a fleece fabric. <i>The sky was half blue half fleeced with white clouds.</i>
floss	Clean between one's teeth with dental floss. <i>Floss your teeth after every meal.</i>
fur	Animal skin with fur on it or fabric resembling this used in making or trimming garments. <i>Fur or scale not just in kettles but in other hidden parts of the hot water system.</i>
hair	Cloth woven from horsehair or camelhair used for upholstery or stiffening in garments. <i>Thick black hairs on his huge arms.</i>
hank	A coil or skein of wool, hair, or other material. <i>A thick hank of her blonde hair.</i>
hawser	A thick rope or cable for mooring or towing a ship.
knitting	The craft or action of knitting. <i>I put down my knitting.</i>
mohair	A yarn or fabric made from mohair typically mixed with wool. <i>A mohair sweater.</i>
needle	Prick with a needle. <i>A darning needle.</i>
ply	One of several layers of cloth or paper or wood as in plywood. <i>Ply an axe.</i>
rope	Fasten with a rope. <i>Coils of rope.</i>
silk	Thread or fabric made from the fibre produced by the silkworm. <i>Some were dressed in racing silks.</i>
string	The stringed instruments in an orchestra. <i>She wore a string of agates round her throat.</i>
tapestry	Something that resembles a tapestry in its complex pictorial designs. <i>Motifs and compositions used in Indian tapestry.</i>

- thread** Pass a thread through the eye of a needle or through the needle and guides of a sewing machine.
***Thread** the buttons on to a length of cotton.*
- twine** Wind or cause to wind round something.
***Twine** a rope.*
- weave** Include an element in (a story or pattern).
*Trailers show him with dyed blond hair and in one scene a flowing blond **weave**.*
- wire** Provide fasten or reinforce with wires.
*An undercover police informer who was wearing a **wire**.*
- wool** Yarn or textile fibre made from wool.
*Carpets made of 80 per cent **wool** and 20 per cent nylon.*
- yarn** Tell or spin a yarn.
*He never let reality get in the way of a good **yarn**.*
