in difficulties Directed or bound inward.

isolated Marked by separation of or from usually contiguous elements.

Tiny **isolated** villages remote from centers of civilization.

marooned Cut off or left behind.

Travelers **marooned** by the blizzard.

stuck Caught or fixed.

This problem has me completely **stuck**.
