### **Definitions of "Stratified" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stratified” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a society) divided into levels or classes based on social status, education, or income.*
- *Arranged in a sequence of grades or ranks.*
- *Deposited or arranged in horizontal layers.*
- *Socially hierarchical.*
- *(of seeds) placed close together in layers in moist sand or peat to preserve them or to help them germinate.*
- *(used of society) socially hierarchical.*
- *Formed or arranged into strata or layers.*



## Synonyms of "Stratified" as an adjective (4 Words)

- bedded** (of rock) deposited in layers of strata.  
*A twin **bedded** room.*
- class-conscious** Socially hierarchical.
- graded** Arranged in a sequence of grades or ranks.
- ranked** Growing profusely.

<b>civilian</b>	Relating to civilians. <i>Terrorists and soldiers have killed tens of thousands of <b>civilians</b>.</i>
<b>class</b>	Arrange or order by classes or categories. <i>Flirting is not unknown in college <b>classes</b>.</i>
<b>classification</b>	The action or process of classifying something. <i>Diagnostic features in reptilian <b>classification</b>.</i>
<b>echelon</b>	Arrange in an echelon formation. <i>The rear <b>echelon</b>.</i>
<b>grade</b>	A relative position or degree of value in a graded group. <i><b>Grade</b> A milk.</i>
<b>hierarchic</b>	Classified according to various criteria into successive levels or layers. <i>In her <b>hierarchic</b> set of values honesty comes first.</i>
<b>hierarchical</b>	Of the nature of a hierarchy; arranged in order of rank. <i>It has been said that only a <b>hierarchical</b> society with a leisure class at the top can produce works of art.</i>
<b>layer</b>	Cut hair in overlapping layers. <i><b>Layer</b> the different colored sands.</i>
<b>level</b>	Become level or even. <i>Women do better at degree <b>level</b>.</i>
<b>miscellany</b>	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>A <b>miscellany</b> of houses.</i>
<b>noble</b>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>Severe looking policemen sat astride <b>noble</b> horses.</i>
<b>nomenclature</b>	The term or terms applied to someone or something. <i>Biological <b>nomenclature</b>.</i>
<b>order</b>	A thing made supplied or served as a result of an order. <i>She tried to put her shattered thoughts into some semblance of <b>order</b>.</i>
<b>pentavalent</b>	Having a valency of five.
<b>phase</b>	Each of the electrical windings or connections of a polyphase machine or circuit. <i>Most of your fans are going through a <b>phase</b>.</i>
<b>rank</b>	Take precedence or surpass others in rank. <i>Conifer plantations growing in serried <b>ranks</b>.</i>

<b>rarefied</b>	Distant from the lives and concerns of ordinary people; esoteric. <i>Every ounce carried counts triple when you re trudging uphill in <b>rarefied</b> air.</i>
<b>society</b>	A specified section of society. <i>Drugs crime and other dangers to <b>society</b>.</i>
<b>sort</b>	A letter or piece in a font of type. <i>The problem with the engine was soon <b>sorted</b>.</i>
<b>sorting</b>	An operation that segregates items into groups according to a specified criterion. <i>The bottleneck in mail delivery is the process of <b>sorting</b>.</i>
<b>stage</b>	A stagecoach. <i>I was in the early <b>stages</b> of pregnancy.</i>
<b>step</b>	Step aerobics. <i>Claudia tried to <b>step</b> back.</i>
<b>stratum</b>	An abstract place usually conceived as having depth. <i>A <b>stratum</b> of flint.</i>
<b>system</b>	A procedure or process for obtaining an objective. <i>He bought a new stereo <b>system</b>.</i>
<b>systematize</b>	Arrange according to a system or reduce to a system. <i><b>Systematize</b> our scientific knowledge.</i>
<b>taxonomy</b>	A classification of organisms into groups based on similarities of structure or origin etc. <i>A <b>taxonomy</b> of smells.</i>
<b>tier</b>	(in Tasmania and South Australia) a forested mountain range, especially one of a series. <i>Companies have taken out a <b>tier</b> of management to save money.</i>
<b>variety</b>	A collection containing a variety of sorts of things. <i>The range and <b>variety</b> of his work is amazing.</i>
