
### Streak as a Noun

run	The act of running traveling on foot at a fast pace. The play had a long <b>run</b> in the West End.
<u>slash</u>	A punctuation mark (/) used to separate related items of information. This years sleeper hit is a faithful screen adaptation of Star Trek <b>slash</b> fiction.
smear	A blemish made by dirt. Soon you re eyeballing the top just one <b>smear</b> away.
smudge	An indistinct or blurred view or image. The low <b>smudge</b> of hills on the horizon.
<u>spell</u>	A period of indeterminate length (usually short) marked by some action or condition. A <b>spell</b> of good weather.
stain	The state of being covered with unclean things. <i>The wine left a dark <b>stain</b>.</i>
strain	A special variety of domesticated animals within a species. <i>The telltale signs of nervous <b>strain</b></i> .
stretch	The capacity of a material or garment to stretch or be stretched elasticity. <i>Stretch jeans</i> .
stripe	A type or category. Entrepreneurs of all <b>stripe</b> s are joining in the offensive.
time	The length of time taken to run a race or complete an event or journey. <i>If called out at the weekend they are paid <b>time</b> and a half.</i>
touch	An act of touching someone or something. <i>He got in <b>touch</b> with his colleagues.</i>
<u>trace</u>	Either of two lines that connect a horse's harness to a wagon or other vehicle or to a whiffletree. Remove all <b>trace</b> s of the old adhesive.
vein	(in plants) a slender rib running through a leaf or bract, typically dividing or branching, and containing a vascular bundle. <i>Gold bearing quartz veins.</i>

- Run naked in a public place so as to shock or amuse others.

- Mark with spots or blotches of different color or shades of color as if stained.
- Smear (a needle, swab, etc.) over the surface of a solid culture medium to initiate a culture.
- Run naked in a public place.

bound	Of an object rebound from a surface. The horse <b>bound</b> ed across the meadow.
<u>career</u>	Move headlong at high speed. The mob <b>career</b> ed through the streets.
<u>charge</u>	File a formal charge against. The tragedy was <b>charge</b> d to her inexperience.

fleck	Mark or dot with small patches of colour or particles of something. The minarets are <b>fleck</b> ed with gold leaf.
fly	Release a bird to fly especially a hawk for hunting or a pigeon for racing. Lindbergh was the first to <b>fly</b> the Atlantic.
gallop	Cause to move at full gallop. His life <b>gallop</b> s headlong towards disaster.

raco	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. I <b>race</b> d into the house.
riin	Cover by running run a certain distance. <i>Run</i> rogue.
ruch	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. As soon as the campaign started they <b>rush</b> ed into action.
scamner	To move about or proceed hurriedly. He <b>scamper</b> ed in like an overgrown puppy.
scramble	Make (a broadcast transmission or telephone conversation) unintelligible unless received by an appropriate decoding device. <b>Scramble</b> the message so that nobody can understand it.
scurry	(of a person or small animal) move hurriedly with short quick steps. <i>Pedestrians scurried for cover.</i>
scuttle	To move about or proceed hurriedly.

smoar	Cover a surface by smearing a substance over it. <i>His face was <b>smear</b>ed with dirt.</i>
smudge	Make a smudge on soil by smudging. The photograph had been <b>smudge</b> d by the photocopier and was by no means as clear as the original.
<u>speed</u>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>Humps are to be used to reduce <b>speed</b>ing.</i>
enrint	Run at full speed over a short distance. I saw Charlie <b>sprint</b> ing through the traffic towards me.
stain	Be marked or be liable to be marked with a stain. <i>Red wine <b>stain</b>s the table cloth.</i>
SITING	Mark with stripes. Her body was <b>stripe</b> d with bands of sunlight.
<u>whisk</u>	Whip with or as if with a wire whisk. <i>Whisk</i> the eggs.

<u>consecutive</u>	In a consecutive manner. A <b>consecutive</b> pattern of what the film would be like.
constant	Remaining the same over a period of time. A man <b>constant</b> in adherence to his ideals.
<u>continual</u>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>The continual banging of the shutters.</i>
<u>continuation</u>	The act of continuing an activity without interruption. Once a separate village it is now a <b>continuation</b> of the suburbs.
continuity	A state of stability and the absence of disruption. <i>They have provided the country with a measure of <b>continuity</b>.</i>



continuous	Continuing in time or space without interruption. A <i>continuous</i> row of warehouses.
fusillade	Attack with fusillade. Our <b>fusillade</b> from the left flank caught them by surprise.
homologous	(of a series of chemical compounds) having the same functional group but differing in composition by a fixed group of atoms. <i>A seal s flipper is <b>homologous</b> with the human arm.</i>
incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The <b>incessant</b> beat of the music.</i>
mottle	A spot or patch forming part of a mottled arrangement. The ship was not dull grey as distance had suggested but a <b>mottle</b> of khaki and black and olive green.
<u>nonstop</u>	Occurring without stops. How many <b>nonstop</b> s are there to Dallas.
perpetual	Denoting or having a position, job, or trophy held for life. <i>He grows <b>perpetual</b> flowering carnations</i> .
persistent	Never-ceasing. An attempt to stop <b>persistent</b> drink drivers.
<u>recurrence</u>	Happening again (especially at regular intervals. Fifty two patients had <b>recurrence</b> s of intestinal problems.
<u>recurrent</u>	Occurring often or repeatedly. She had a <b>recurrent</b> dream about falling.
<u>sequence</u>	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. We have undertaken to isolate and <b>sequence</b> the rat retinoblastoma cDNA.
sequential	Performed or used in sequence. <b>Sequential</b> processing of data files.
serial	A serialized set of programs. A <b>serial</b> publication.
seriatim	Taking one subject after another in regular order; point by point. It is proposed to deal with these matters <b>seriatim</b> .
stripe	Mark with stripes. Her body was <b>stripe</b> d with bands of sunlight.
succession	(ecology) the gradual and orderly process of change in an ecosystem brought about by the progressive replacement of one community by another until a stable climax is established. <i>The succession to the Crown was disputed.</i>



<u>successive</u>	In regular succession without gaps. They were looking for their fifth <b>successive</b> win.
successively	Immediately one after another. Three letters of <b>successively</b> decreasing length.
<u>tendency</u>	A general direction in which something tends to move. For students there is a <b>tendency</b> to socialize in the evenings.
<u>unbroken</u>	Not violated or disregarded. <b>Unbroken</b> land.
unceasing	Continuing forever or indefinitely. The <b>unceasing</b> efforts of the staff.
<u>unchanging</u>	Showing little if any change. The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.
uninterrupted	Having undisturbed continuity. The window gives an <b>uninterrupted</b> view of the mountains.
<u>unremitting</u>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. <b>Unremitting</b> drizzle.
