accent	Distinctive manner of oral expression. <i>The room was decorated in shades of grey with distinctive red accents.</i>
emphasis	Special importance or significance. <i>They placed great emphasis on the individual's freedom.</i>
focus	The concentration of attention or energy on something. <i>Out of focus.</i>
strain	(physics) deformation of a physical body under the action of applied forces. <i>The usual type of chair puts an enormous strain on the spine.</i>
tenseness	The physical condition of being stretched or strained. <i>He could feel the tenseness of her body.</i>
tension	Electromotive force. <i>It places great tension on the leg muscles.</i>

Synonyms of "Stresses" as a verb (7 Words)

- accent** Put stress on utter with an accent.
*Fabrics which **accent** the background colours in the room.*
- accentuate** Make more noticeable or prominent.
*His jacket unfortunately **accentuated** his paunch.*
- emphasise** To stress, single out as important.
- emphasize** Make (something) more clearly defined.
*Dr Jones **emphasizes** exercise in addition to a change in diet.*
- punctuate** Interrupt periodically.
*The country's history has been **punctuated** by coups.*
- strain** Separate by passing through a sieve or other straining device to separate out coarser elements.
***Strain** off the surplus fat.*
- try** Examine or hear (evidence or a case) by judicial process.
*You are **trying** my patience.*

<u>emphatic</u>	An emphatic consonant. <i>The document contained a particularly emphatic guarantee of religious liberty.</i>
<u>emphatically</u>	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>No way he said emphatically.</i>
floodlight	Illuminate with floodlights. <i>We are floodlighting the building to highlight the structure.</i>
foreground	Move into the foreground to make more visible or prominent. <i>Issues which have occupied the political foreground in recent years.</i>
highlight	Create highlights in hair. <i>Gary Lineker presents the highlights of today's semi final.</i>
illuminate	Help to clarify or explain. <i>Placing the events of the 1930s in a broader historical context helps to illuminate their significance.</i>
importance	A prominent status. <i>A person of importance.</i>
<u>imprint</u>	A distinctive influence. <i>Goslings will imprint themselves on inanimate objects such as a cardboard box.</i>
intension	Resolution or determination.
lilt	Speak sing or sound with a lilt. <i>He spoke with a faint but recognizable Irish lilt.</i>
limelight	The focus of public attention. <i>He enjoyed being in the limelight.</i>
overburden	The surface soil that must be moved away to get at coal seams and mineral deposits. <i>An overburden of costs.</i>
perpetuation	The act of prolonging something. <i>Perpetuation of the species is our purpose.</i>
prolongation	Extension of the spatial length of something. <i>An agreement on further prolongation of the boundary proved difficult.</i>
significance	A meaning that is not expressly stated but can be inferred. <i>Do not underestimate the significance of nuclear power.</i>
<u>spotlight</u>	Illuminate with a spotlight. <i>The knife flashed in the spotlight.</i>
strain	Rub through a strainer or process in an electric blender. <i>A new strain of microorganisms.</i>

stressed	Strengthened by the application of stress during manufacture prestressed. <i>Elision after a stressed syllable.</i>
<u>tend</u>	Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something be inclined. <i>She tends to the children.</i>
tension	The state of having the muscles stretched tight, especially as causing strain or discomfort. <i>It places great tension on the leg muscles.</i>
<u>underline</u>	The line of the lower part of an animal's body. <i>Certain phrases had been underlined.</i>
<u>underscore</u>	Draw a line or lines underneath to call attention to. <i>The company underscored the progress made with fuel cells.</i>
