Definitions of "Stripped" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stripped” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having everything extraneous removed including contents.*
- *Having only essential or minimal features.*
- *With clothing stripped off.*



Synonyms of "Stripped" as an adjective (2 Words)

bare

Just barely adequate or within a lower limit.
Bare floorboards.

stripped-down Having only essential or minimal features.



Usage Examples of "Stripped" as an adjective

- *A stripped new car.*
- *A stripped-down budget.*

bald	Grow bald lose hair on one s head. <i>A bald pate.</i>
bare	Lay bare. <i>You are bare lazy.</i>
belt	A conveyor belt. <i>She belted him over the head with her racquet.</i>
decompression	A gradual reduction of air pressure on a person who has been experiencing high pressure while diving. <i>This disk contains a number of utilities which require decompression.</i>
denudation	The removal of covering.
denude	Lay bare. <i>Almost overnight the Arctic was denuded of animals.</i>
deprive	Take away possessions from someone. <i>The city was deprived of its water supplies.</i>
diffusion	The spread of social institutions (and myths and skills) from one society to another. <i>The rate of diffusion of a gas.</i>
disenfranchise	Deprive (someone) of the rights and privileges of a free inhabitant of a borough, city, or country. <i>The law disenfranchised some 3 000 voters on the basis of a residence qualification.</i>
disrobe	Take off official vestments or regalia. <i>Kate remembers being disrobed.</i>
divest	Rid oneself of (a business interest or investment). <i>The board of trustees divested 20 million in real estate property.</i>
expose	Expose while ridiculing especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas. <i>At low tide the sands are exposed.</i>
exposed	With no protection or shield. <i>Equity investors are perhaps the most exposed.</i>
impoverish	Exhaust the strength or vitality of. <i>The wars had impoverished him.</i>
leach	The process of leaching. <i>Ash is readily leached.</i>
loosen	Make less severe or strict. <i>He wanted to strengthen rather than loosen union links.</i>

peel	Remove (the outer covering or skin) from a fruit or vegetable. <i>Pieces of potato peel.</i>
percolate	Spread gradually. <i>Percolate coffee.</i>
<u>permeate</u>	Pass through. <i>His personality has begun to permeate through the whole organization.</i>
rob	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>Hughes robbed Vonk yards inside the City half.</i>
unaided	Needing or having no assistance; without help. <i>His first unaided walk through the park.</i>
<u>undo</u>	Deprive of certain characteristics. <i>Iago's hatred of women undoes him.</i>
undress	Get undressed. <i>Women in various states of undress.</i>
unfasten	Open the fastening of; undo (something). <i>Unfasten your belt.</i>
unpainted	Not painted. <i>An unpainted house.</i>
untie	Cause to become loose. <i>They untied the prisoner.</i>
unwrap	Remove the wrapping from (a package). <i>Unwrap the evidence in the murder case.</i>
<u>usurp</u>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force; take as one's right or possession. <i>The Church had usurped upon the domain of the state.</i>
