### **Definitions of "Stripped" as an adjective**

- *Having everything extraneous removed including contents.*
- *Having only essential or minimal features.*
- *With clothing stripped off.*



## Synonyms of "Stripped" as an adjective (2 Words)

**bare** Just barely adequate or within a lower limit.  
***Bare** floorboards.*

**stripped-down** Having only essential or minimal features.

- *A stripped new car.*
- *A stripped-down budget.*

<b>bald</b>	Grow bald lose hair on one s head. <i>A <b>bald</b> pate.</i>
<b>bare</b>	Lay bare. <i>You are <b>bare</b> lazy.</i>
<b>belt</b>	A conveyor belt. <i>She <b>belted</b> him over the head with her racquet.</i>
<b>decompression</b>	A gradual reduction of air pressure on a person who has been experiencing high pressure while diving. <i>This disk contains a number of utilities which require <b>decompression</b>.</i>
<b>denudation</b>	The removal of covering.
<b>denude</b>	Lay bare. <i>Almost overnight the Arctic was <b>denuded</b> of animals.</i>
<b>deprive</b>	Take away possessions from someone. <i>The city was <b>deprived</b> of its water supplies.</i>
<b>diffusion</b>	The spread of social institutions (and myths and skills) from one society to another. <i>The rate of <b>diffusion</b> of a gas.</i>
<b>disenfranchise</b>	Deprive (someone) of the rights and privileges of a free inhabitant of a borough, city, or country. <i>The law <b>disenfranchised</b> some 3 000 voters on the basis of a residence qualification.</i>
<b>disrobe</b>	Take off official vestments or regalia. <i>Kate remembers being <b>disrobed</b>.</i>
<b>divest</b>	Rid oneself of (a business interest or investment). <i>The board of trustees <b>divested</b> 20 million in real estate property.</i>
<b>expose</b>	Expose while ridiculing especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas. <i>At low tide the sands are <b>exposed</b>.</i>
<b>exposed</b>	With no protection or shield. <i>Equity investors are perhaps the most <b>exposed</b>.</i>
<b>impoverish</b>	Exhaust the strength or vitality of. <i>The wars had <b>impoverished</b> him.</i>
<b>leach</b>	The process of leaching. <i>Ash is readily <b>leached</b>.</i>
<b>loosen</b>	Make less severe or strict. <i>He wanted to strengthen rather than <b>loosen</b> union links.</i>

<b>peel</b>	Remove (the outer covering or skin) from a fruit or vegetable. <i>Pieces of potato <b>peel</b>.</i>
<b>percolate</b>	Spread gradually. <i><b>Percolate</b> coffee.</i>
<b><u>permeate</u></b>	Pass through. <i>His personality has begun to <b>permeate</b> through the whole organization.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>Hughes <b>robbed</b> Vonk yards inside the City half.</i>
<b>unaided</b>	Needing or having no assistance; without help. <i>His first <b>unaided</b> walk through the park.</i>
<b><u>undo</u></b>	Deprive of certain characteristics. <i>Iago's hatred of women <b>undoes</b> him.</i>
<b>undress</b>	Get undressed. <i>Women in various states of <b>undress</b>.</i>
<b>unfasten</b>	Open the fastening of; undo (something). <i><b>Unfasten</b> your belt.</i>
<b>unpainted</b>	Not painted. <i>An <b>unpainted</b> house.</i>
<b>untie</b>	Cause to become loose. <i>They <b>untied</b> the prisoner.</i>
<b>unwrap</b>	Remove the wrapping from (a package). <i><b>Unwrap</b> the evidence in the murder case.</i>
<b><u>usurp</u></b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force; take as one's right or possession. <i>The Church had <b>usurped</b> upon the domain of the state.</i>
