## Synonyms of "Stroll" as a noun (9 Words)

<b>airing</b>	Travel via aircraft. <i>Somebody had given the place a thorough <b>airing</b>.</i>
<b>amble</b>	A walk at a slow, relaxed pace, especially for pleasure. <i>A peaceful riverside <b>amble</b>.</i>
<b>breather</b>	A vent or valve to release pressure or to allow air to move freely around something. <i>A <b>breather</b> pipe.</i>
<b>perambulation</b>	A walk around a territory (a parish or manor or forest etc.) in order to officially assert and record its boundaries.
<b>promenade</b>	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>An evening <b>promenade</b>.</i>
<b><u>saunter</u></b>	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>He walked with a kind of <b>saunter</b> as if he hadn't a care in the world.</i>

**turn**

Turning or twisting around in place.

*Malton s comedy **turn** Mark Poole takes to the stage tonight in Cinderella.*

**walk**

A person s manner of walking.

*He had a funny **walk**.*

**wander**

An act or instance of wandering.

*She d go on **wanders** like that in her nightgown.*

### Definitions of "Stroll" as a verb

- *Walk in a leisurely way.*
- *Achieve a sporting victory without effort.*
- *Walk leisurely and with no apparent aim.*





## Synonyms of "Stroll" as a verb (17 Words)

<b>amble</b>	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. <i>They <b>ambled</b> along the riverbank.</i>
<b>dawdle</b>	Hang (back) or fall (behind) in movement, progress, development, etc. <i>She mustn't <b>dawdle</b> she had to make the call now.</i>
<b>get some air</b>	Irritate.
<b>get some exercise</b>	Earn or achieve a base by being walked by the pitcher.
<b>go for a walk</b>	Stop operating or functioning.
<b>meander</b>	(of language, thought, etc.) proceed aimlessly or with little purpose. <i>A stylish offbeat thriller which occasionally <b>meanders</b>.</i>
<b>potter</b>	Move or go in a casual, unhurried way. <i>I might <b>potter</b> into Nice for the day.</i>
<b>promenade</b>	Take a promenade through a place. <i>The ladies <b>promenaded</b> along the beach.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	Continue talking or writing in a desultory manner. <i>This novel <b>rambles</b> on and jogs.</i>

<b>roam</b>	(of a person's mind or thoughts) drift along without dwelling on anything in particular. <i>Tigers once <b>roamed</b> over most of Asia.</i>
<b>saunter</b>	Walk in a slow, relaxed manner. <i>Adam <b>sauntered</b> into the room.</i>
<b>stretch one's legs</b>	Extend the scope or meaning of; often unduly.
<b>take a walk</b>	Be designed to hold or take.
<b>take the air</b>	Take somebody somewhere.
<b>traipse</b>	Walk or move wearily or reluctantly. <i>Students had to <b>traipse</b> all over London to attend lectures.</i>
<b>walk</b>	Walk at a pace. <i>We must <b>walk</b> with our dispossessed brothers and sisters.</i>
<b>wander</b>	Walk or move in a leisurely or aimless way. <i>He had married her and he was not going to be allowed to <b>wander</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Stroll" as a verb

- *The horse strolled home by 12 lengths.*
- *I strolled around the city.*







## Associations of "Stroll" (30 Words)

<b>amble</b>	Walk leisurely. <i>A peaceful riverside <b>amble</b>.</i>
<b>ambulate</b>	Walk; move about. <i>People who make use of crutches to <b>ambulate</b>.</i>
<b>canter</b>	Of a horse move at a canter in a particular direction. <i>The men <b>cantered</b> away.</i>
<b>crossroad</b>	A junction where one street or road crosses another.
<b>drift</b>	(especially of snow or leaves) be blown into heaps by the wind. <i>The sailboat was <b>adrift</b> on the open sea.</i>
<b>gad</b>	Go from place to place in the pursuit of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was <b>gadding</b> about with an airline stewardess.</i>
<b>gait</b>	The pattern of steps of a horse or dog at a particular speed. <i>The easy <b>gait</b> of an athlete.</i>
<b>gallivant</b>	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>She quit her job to go <b>gallivanting</b> around the globe.</i>
<b>hike</b>	The amount a salary is increased. <i>She enjoys a <b>hike</b> in her spare time.</i>
<b>jog</b>	A spell of jogging. <i>He began to <b>jog</b> along the road.</i>
<b>jogger</b>	A person who jogs as a form of physical exercise. <i>Sporty types in <b>joggers</b>.</i>
<b>jogging</b>	Denoting a garment designed to be worn while jogging. <i><b>Jogging</b> bottoms.</i>
<b>lope</b>	Run easily. <i>They set off at a fast <b>lope</b>.</i>
<b>mincing</b>	Affectedly dainty in manner or gait; effeminate (typically used of a man). <i>I don't have to go through the rest of my life with that <b>mincing</b> voice of yours.</i>
<b>pace</b>	Go at a pace. <i>Her eyes could size up a lad's wallet at fifty <b>paces</b>.</i>
<b>plod</b>	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>We <b>plodded</b> back up the hill.</i>
<b>promenade</b>	Take a promenade through a place. <i>They <b>promenaded</b> along the waterfront.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside. <i>This novel <b>rambles</b> on and jogs.</i>

<b><u>rambling</u></b>	(of e.g. speech and writing) tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>A <b>rambling</b> speech about this and that.</i>
<b>roam</b>	Travel unsystematically over, through, or about (a place). <i>The cattle <b>roam</b> across the prairie.</i>
<b>rove</b>	Wander over or through (a place) without a fixed destination. <i>The policeman s eyes <b>roved</b> around the pub.</i>
<b><u>saunter</u></b>	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>Adam <b>sauntered</b> into the room.</i>
<b><u>stray</u></b>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>He pushed a few <b>stray</b> hairs from her face.</i>
<b>stride</b>	Bestride. <i>The horse shortened its <b>stride</b>.</i>
<b>stroller</b>	A young urban vagrant; a street child. <i>A little <b>stroller</b> taps on the window and cups his hands in a begging gesture.</i>
<b>trudge</b>	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>I <b>trudged</b> up the stairs.</i>
<b>walk</b>	Move in a similar way to walking but using one s hands or a support such as stilts. <i>We <b>walked</b> instead of driving.</i>
<b>walker</b>	A frame used by disabled or infirm people for support while walking, typically made of metal tubing with small wheels or rubber-tipped feet; a walking frame. <i>A fell <b>walker</b>.</i>
<b>walking</b>	The act of traveling by foot. <i><b>Walking</b> is a healthy form of exercise.</i>
<b><u>wander</u></b>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>Her mind <b>wanders</b>.</i>
