Synonyms of "Stroll" as a noun (9 Words)

- airing** Travel via aircraft.
*Somebody had given the place a thorough **airing**.*
- amble** A walk at a slow, relaxed pace, especially for pleasure.
*A peaceful riverside **amble**.*
- breather** A vent or valve to release pressure or to allow air to move freely around something.
*A **breather** pipe.*
- perambulation** A walk around a territory (a parish or manor or forest etc.) in order to officially assert and record its boundaries.
- promenade** A leisurely walk (usually in some public place).
*An evening **promenade**.*
- saunter** A leisurely walk (usually in some public place).
*He walked with a kind of **saunter** as if he hadn't a care in the world.*

turn	Turning or twisting around in place. <i>Malton s comedy turn Mark Poole takes to the stage tonight in Cinderella.</i>
walk	A person s manner of walking. <i>He had a funny walk.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>She d go on wanders like that in her nightgown.</i>

Synonyms of "Stroll" as a verb (17 Words)

amble	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. <i>They ambled along the riverbank.</i>
dawdle	Hang (back) or fall (behind) in movement, progress, development, etc. <i>She mustn't dawdle she had to make the call now.</i>
get some air	Irritate.
get some exercise	Earn or achieve a base by being walked by the pitcher.
go for a walk	Stop operating or functioning.
meander	(of language, thought, etc.) proceed aimlessly or with little purpose. <i>A stylish offbeat thriller which occasionally meanders.</i>
potter	Move or go in a casual, unhurried way. <i>I might potter into Nice for the day.</i>
promenade	Take a promenade through a place. <i>The ladies promenaded along the beach.</i>
ramble	Continue talking or writing in a desultory manner. <i>This novel rambles on and jogs.</i>

roam	(of a person's mind or thoughts) drift along without dwelling on anything in particular. <i>Tigers once roamed over most of Asia.</i>
saunter	Walk in a slow, relaxed manner. <i>Adam sauntered into the room.</i>
stretch one's legs	Extend the scope or meaning of; often unduly.
take a walk	Be designed to hold or take.
take the air	Take somebody somewhere.
traipse	Walk or move wearily or reluctantly. <i>Students had to traipse all over London to attend lectures.</i>
walk	Walk at a pace. <i>We must walk with our dispossessed brothers and sisters.</i>
wander	Walk or move in a leisurely or aimless way. <i>He had married her and he was not going to be allowed to wander.</i>



Usage Examples of "Stroll" as a verb

- *The horse strolled home by 12 lengths.*
- *I strolled around the city.*



Associations of "Stroll" (30 Words)

amble	Walk leisurely. <i>A peaceful riverside amble.</i>
ambulate	Walk; move about. <i>People who make use of crutches to ambulate.</i>
canter	Of a horse move at a canter in a particular direction. <i>The men cantered away.</i>
crossroad	A junction where one street or road crosses another.
drift	(especially of snow or leaves) be blown into heaps by the wind. <i>The sailboat was adrift on the open sea.</i>
gad	Go from place to place in the pursuit of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>
gait	The pattern of steps of a horse or dog at a particular speed. <i>The easy gait of an athlete.</i>
gallivant	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>She quit her job to go gallivanting around the globe.</i>
hike	The amount a salary is increased. <i>She enjoys a hike in her spare time.</i>
jog	A spell of jogging. <i>He began to jog along the road.</i>
jogger	A person who jogs as a form of physical exercise. <i>Sporty types in joggers.</i>
jogging	Denoting a garment designed to be worn while jogging. <i>Jogging bottoms.</i>
lope	Run easily. <i>They set off at a fast lope.</i>
mincing	Affectedly dainty in manner or gait; effeminate (typically used of a man). <i>I don't have to go through the rest of my life with that mincing voice of yours.</i>
pace	Go at a pace. <i>Her eyes could size up a lad's wallet at fifty paces.</i>
plod	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>We plodded back up the hill.</i>
promenade	Take a promenade through a place. <i>They promenaded along the waterfront.</i>
ramble	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside. <i>This novel rambles on and jogs.</i>

<u>rambling</u>	(of e.g. speech and writing) tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>A rambling speech about this and that.</i>
roam	Travel unsystematically over, through, or about (a place). <i>The cattle roam across the prairie.</i>
rove	Wander over or through (a place) without a fixed destination. <i>The policeman s eyes roved around the pub.</i>
<u>saunter</u>	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>Adam sauntered into the room.</i>
<u>stray</u>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>He pushed a few stray hairs from her face.</i>
stride	Bestride. <i>The horse shortened its stride.</i>
stroller	A young urban vagrant; a street child. <i>A little stroller taps on the window and cups his hands in a begging gesture.</i>
trudge	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>I trudged up the stairs.</i>
walk	Move in a similar way to walking but using one s hands or a support such as stilts. <i>We walked instead of driving.</i>
walker	A frame used by disabled or infirm people for support while walking, typically made of metal tubing with small wheels or rubber-tipped feet; a walking frame. <i>A fell walker.</i>
walking	The act of traveling by foot. <i>Walking is a healthy form of exercise.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>Her mind wanders.</i>
