Associations of "Strolled" (30 Words)

amble	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. <i>They ambled along the riverbank.</i>
ambulate	Walk about; not be bedridden or incapable of walking. <i>People who make use of crutches to ambulate.</i>
canter	Ride at a canter. <i>They cantered down into the village.</i>
crossroad	A junction where one street or road crosses another.
<u>drift</u>	Cause to be carried by a current. <i>Excited voices drifted down the hall.</i>
gad	Go from place to place in the pursuit of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>
gait	A person's manner of walking. <i>The easy gait of an athlete.</i>
gallivant	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>She quit her job to go gallivanting around the globe.</i>
<u>hike</u>	A long walk or walking tour. <i>Roy hiked up his trousers to reveal his socks.</i>
jog	A spell of jogging. <i>Jog along the canal.</i>
jogger	A person who jogs as a form of physical exercise. <i>Sporty types in joggers.</i>
jogging	Denoting a garment designed to be worn while jogging. <i>Jogging bottoms.</i>
lope	A smooth three-beat gait; between a trot and a gallop. <i>They set off at a fast lope.</i>
mincing	Affectedly dainty in manner or gait; effeminate (typically used of a man). <i>I don't have to go through the rest of my life with that mincing voice of yours.</i>

pace	Regulate or set the pace of. <i>The story rips along at a cracking pace.</i>
plod	Work slowly and perseveringly at a dull task. <i>Mules plodded in a circle around a grindstone.</i>
promenade	Take a promenade through a place. <i>People began to promenade the streets.</i>
ramble	An aimless amble on a winding course. <i>Willy rambled on about Norman archways.</i>
<u>rambling</u>	(of e.g. speech and writing) tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>Scott's letter was long and rambling.</i>
roam	(of a person's eyes or hands) pass lightly over something without stopping. <i>Did you get to explore the city or have a roam around Bath.</i>
rove	Travel constantly without a fixed destination; wander. <i>A new exhibit will electrify campuses on its national rove.</i>
<u>saunter</u>	A leisurely walk (usually in some public place). <i>Adam sauntered into the room.</i>
<u>stray</u>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>She was killed by a stray bullet.</i>
stride	Bestride. <i>Great strides have been made towards equality.</i>
stroller	Someone who walks at a leisurely pace. <i>A little stroller taps on the window and cups his hands in a begging gesture.</i>
trudge	Walk slowly and with heavy steps, typically because of exhaustion or harsh conditions. <i>She trudged through blinding snow.</i>
walk	A person's manner of walking. <i>You can walk in 21 000 acres of moorland.</i>
walker	A shoe designed for comfortable walking. <i>A fell walker.</i>
walking	Close enough to be walked to. <i>Walking distance.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>I wandered through the narrow streets.</i>
