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Associations of "Struck down" (30 Words)

curtail	Reduce in extent or quantity; impose a restriction on. <i>Civil liberties were further curtailed.</i>
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The King was forced to debase the coinage.</i>
declension	A condition of decline or moral deterioration. <i>The first declension in Latin.</i>
declivity	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. <i>A decrease in births.</i>
demoralize	Confuse or put into disorder. <i>The General Strike had demoralized the trade unions.</i>
descend	Make an unexpected visit to. <i>Three hotels were granted the prestigious five star status whilst others descended in quality or maintained their ranking.</i>
descending	Moving down a scale of quality. <i>A rocky descending path.</i>
descent	The descendants of one individual. <i>The settlers were of Cornish descent.</i>
disparagement	A communication that belittles somebody or something.
downgrade	The property possessed by a slope or surface that descends. <i>A steep downgrade for which he had to put the car in second.</i>
downturn	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>A downturn in the housing market.</i>
downward	Spatially or metaphorically from a higher to a lower level or position. <i>The downward course of the stream.</i>

drop	A section of theatrical scenery lowered from the flies a drop cloth or drop curtain. <i>The first drops of rain splashed on the ground.</i>
fall	Come as if by falling. <i>At the corner of the massif this fall is interrupted by other heights of considerable stature.</i>
<u>falling</u>	Decreasing in amount or degree. <i>Falling rain.</i>
flop	With a flopping sound. <i>The show flopped in London.</i>
<u>low</u>	In a low voice or at a low pitch. <i>Low clouds.</i>
<u>lower</u>	In or into a lower position. <i>Lower a rating.</i>
reduction	An arrangement of an orchestral score for piano or for a smaller group of performers. <i>The reaction is limited to reduction to the hydrocarbon.</i>
retrench	Reduce (something) in extent or quantity. <i>As a result of the recession the company retrenched.</i>
<u>rundown</u>	(especially of a building or area) in a poor or neglected state after having been prosperous. <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i>
shrinkage	The amount by which something shrinks. <i>Give long curtains good hems to allow for shrinkage.</i>
sink	Cause to sink. <i>The ocean is a sink for carbon dioxide.</i>
<u>sit</u>	Sit and travel on the back of animal usually while controlling its motions. <i>When does the court of law sit.</i>
submergence	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
<u>substrate</u>	A surface on which an organism grows or is attached. <i>The Celtic languages of Britain are a substrate for English.</i>
<u>under</u>	Under water. <i>The under parts of a machine.</i>
vertically	In a way that involves different levels or stages of a hierarchy or process. <i>Vertically stacked books.</i>

Make or become weaker in power, resolve, or physical strength.
*His resistance had **weakened**.*
