Definitions of "Struck" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “struck” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(used in combination) affected by something overwhelming.*



Synonyms of "Struck" as an adjective (2 Words)

smitten Affected by something overwhelming.
Conscience ***smitten***.

stricken (of a person's face or appearance) showing great distress.
Raymond was ***stricken*** with grief.

Associations of "Struck" (30 Words)

<u>admonish</u>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>He admonished the child for his bad behavior.</i>
angrily	With anger. <i>Workers reacted angrily to the announcement.</i>
bang	Leap jerk bang. <i>I banged my head on the low beams.</i>
belabor	Attack verbally with harsh criticism. <i>She was belabored by her fellow students.</i>
<u>chide</u>	Censure severely or angrily. <i>Now now he chided.</i>
clap	Clap one's hands together. <i>The hawk shook itself and clapped its wings.</i>
dab	A light touch or stroke. <i>He dabbed his mouth with his napkin.</i>
expostulation	An exclamation of protest or remonstrance or reproof.
fumble	Move clumsily in various directions using the hands to find one's way. <i>He fumbled towards the door.</i>
hit	Hit against come into sudden contact with. <i>He hit her hard in the face.</i>
incrimination	An accusation that you are responsible for some lapse or misdeed. <i>His incrimination was based on my testimony.</i>
knock	Knock against with force or violence. <i>She knocked her knee painfully on the table.</i>
lambaste	Censure severely or angrily.
<u>lightning</u>	A flash or discharge of lightning. <i>A tremendous flash of lightning.</i>
opprobrium	A state of extreme dishonor. <i>The name was a by word of scorn and opprobrium throughout the city.</i>
pat	Pat or squeeze fondly or playfully especially under the chin. <i>A pat reply.</i>
rap	Strike a hard surface with a series of rapid audible blows especially in order to attract attention. <i>He raps under the name of Mr T.</i>
<u>rebuke</u>	An act or expression of criticism and censure. <i>He had to take the rebuke with a smile on his face.</i>

recrimination	Mutual accusations. <i>There was a period of bitter recrimination.</i>
remonstrate	Make a forcefully reproachful protest. <i>He turned angrily to remonstrate with Tommy.</i>
reprimand	Address a reprimand to. <i>Officials were reprimanded for poor work.</i>
reproach	In the Roman Catholic Church a set of antiphons and responses for Good Friday representing the reproaches of Christ to his people. <i>The president reproached the general for his irresponsible behavior.</i>
reproof	Censure severely or angrily. <i>She welcomed him with a mild reproof for leaving her alone.</i>
reprove	Reprimand (someone). <i>Don't be childish Hilary he reproved mildly.</i>
revile	Criticize in an abusive or angrily insulting manner. <i>He was now reviled by the party that he had helped to lead.</i>
scold	Someone (especially a woman) who annoys people by constantly finding fault. <i>His mother was the village scold.</i>
scolding	Rebuking a person harshly. <i>She'd get a scolding from Victoria.</i>
tap	Walk with a tapping sound. <i>Tap a maple tree for its syrup.</i>
upbraid	Express criticism towards. <i>He was upbraided for his slovenly appearance.</i>
vilify	Speak or write about in an abusively disparaging manner. <i>He has been vilified in the press.</i>
