- *Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.*
- *So shocked that one is temporarily unable to react; astonished.*

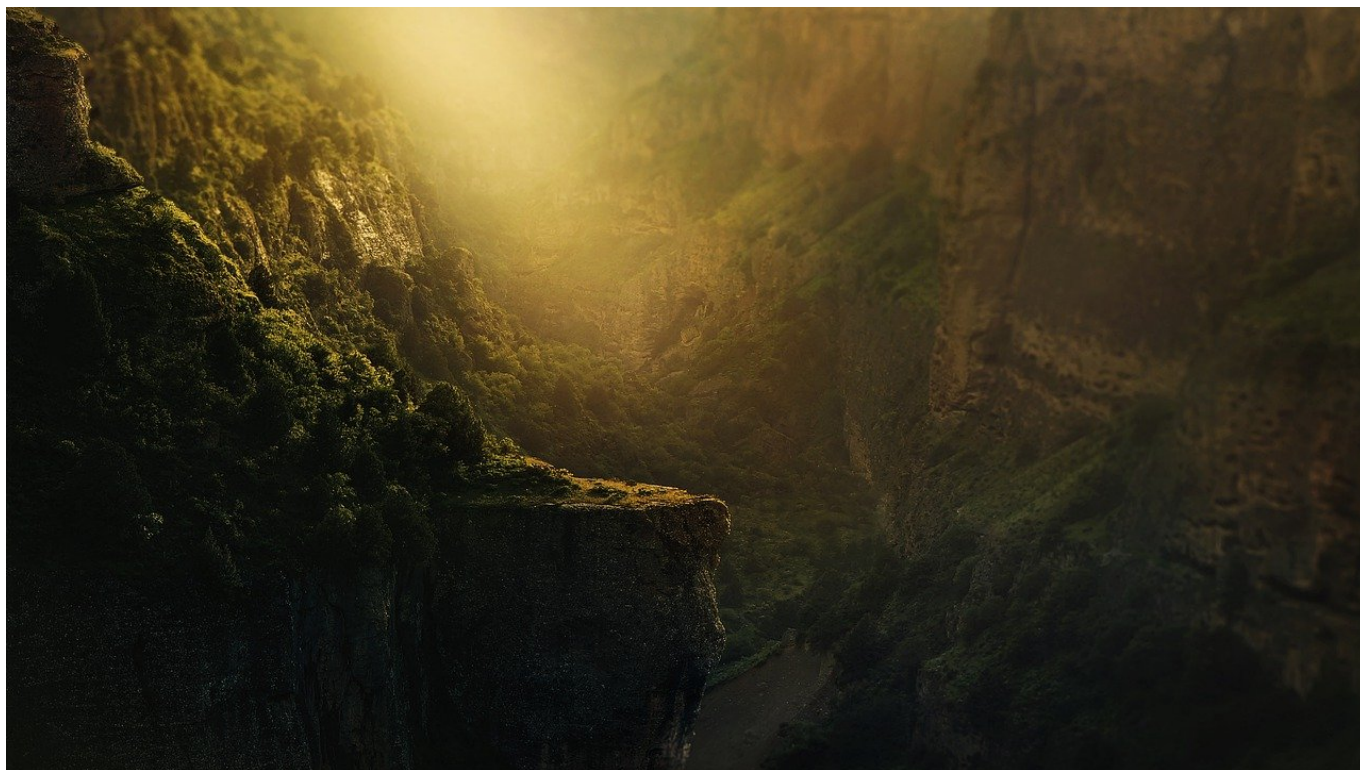
**stupefied** As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.  
*Lay semiconscious stunned or **stupefied** by the blow.*



### Usage Examples of "Stunned" as an adjective

- *Stood in stunned silence.*
- *A silent, stunned crowd.*
- *She stared at him in stunned disbelief.*
- *Lay semiconscious, stunned (or stupefied) by the blow.*
- *Stunned scientists found not one but at least three viruses.*

| <b>daze</b>       | The feeling of distress and disbelief that you have when something bad happens accidentally.<br><i>He was walking around in a <b>daze</b>.</i> |
| <b>disconcert</b> | Disturb the composure of; unsettle.<br><i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>  |
| <b>distract</b>   | Having the attention diverted especially because of anxiety.<br><i>He seemed oddly <b>distract</b>.</i>  |
| <b>dumbfound</b>  | Greatly astonish or amaze.<br><i>I was <b>dumbfounded</b> by the low prices there.</i>   |
| <b>embarrass</b>  | Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self conscious.<br><i>He would be <b>embarrassed</b> by estate duty.</i>                                 |
| <b>faze</b>       | Disturb or disconcert (someone).<br><i>She was not <b>fazed</b> by his show of anger.</i>  |
| <b>impact</b>     | A forceful consequence; a strong effect.<br><i>An asteroid <b>impacted</b> the earth some 60 million years ago.</i>                            |
| <b>intimidate</b> | Make timid or fearful.<br><i>Her boss <b>intimidates</b> her.</i>  |
| <b>limbo</b>      | A state of neglect or oblivion.<br><i>These prisoners are in <b>limbo</b> no one is responsible for their welfare.</i>                         |
| <b>mystify</b>    | Make mysterious.<br><i>Lawyers who <b>mystify</b> the legal system so that laymen find it unintelligible.</i>                                  |
| <b>paralyze</b>   | Cause to be paralyzed and immobile.<br><i>Fear <b>paralyzed</b> her.</i>   |
| <b>perplex</b>    | Be a mystery or bewildering to.<br><i>They were <b>perplexing</b> a subject plain in itself.</i>   |
