Definitions of "Stunned" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “stunned” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock.*
- *Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock.*
- *Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.*
- *So shocked that one is temporarily unable to react; astonished.*



Synonyms of "Stunned" as an adjective (10 Words)

- amazed** Greatly surprised; astonished.
*She shook her head in **amazed** disbelief.*
- astonied** Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock.
- astonished** Greatly surprised or impressed; amazed.
*He was **astonished** at the change in him.*
- astounded** Filled with the emotional impact of overwhelming surprise or shock.
***Astounded** viewers wept at the pictures from the Oklahoma City bombing.*
- dazed** Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion).
*A **dazed** expression.*
- kayoed** Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.
- ko'd** Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.
- out** Being out or having grown cold.
*The book should be **out** before the end of the month.*

stupefied As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.
*Lay semiconscious stunned or **stupefied** by the blow.*



Usage Examples of "Stunned" as an adjective

- *Stood in stunned silence.*
- *A silent, stunned crowd.*
- *She stared at him in stunned disbelief.*
- *Lay semiconscious, stunned (or stupefied) by the blow.*
- *Stunned scientists found not one but at least three viruses.*

- amaze** Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment.
*Your ability to speak six languages **amazes** me.*
- astonish** Affect with wonder.
*It **astonished** her that he was so anxious.*
- astound** Affect with wonder.
*Her bluntness **astounded** him.*
- astounding** Surprisingly impressive or notable.
*The summit offers **astounding** views.*
- bewilder** Be a mystery or bewildering to.
*His reaction had **bewildered** her.*
- blank** A blank gap or missing part.
*When I called her name she gave me a **blank** look as though she didn't know me.*
- coma** A state of extreme lethargy or sleepiness.
*She went into a **coma**.*

daunt	Make (someone) feel intimidated or apprehensive. <i>Some people are daunted by technology.</i>
daze	The feeling of distress and disbelief that you have when something bad happens accidentally. <i>He was walking around in a daze.</i>
disconcert	Disturb the composure of; unsettle. <i>The abrupt change of subject disconcerted her.</i>
distract	Having the attention diverted especially because of anxiety. <i>He seemed oddly distract.</i>
dumbfound	Greatly astonish or amaze. <i>I was dumbfound by the low prices there.</i>
embarrass	Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self conscious. <i>He would be embarrassed by estate duty.</i>
faze	Disturb or disconcert (someone). <i>She was not fazed by his show of anger.</i>
impact	A forceful consequence; a strong effect. <i>An asteroid impacted the earth some 60 million years ago.</i>
intimidate	Make timid or fearful. <i>Her boss intimidates her.</i>
limbo	A state of neglect or oblivion. <i>These prisoners are in limbo no one is responsible for their welfare.</i>
mystify	Make mysterious. <i>Lawyers who mystify the legal system so that laymen find it unintelligible.</i>
paralyze	Cause to be paralyzed and immobile. <i>Fear paralyzed her.</i>
perplex	Be a mystery or bewildering to. <i>They were perplexing a subject plain in itself.</i>
shock	Affect with physiological shock or with an electric shock. <i>Electricians get accustomed to occasional shocks.</i>
skittish	Unpredictably excitable (especially of horses). <i>A skittish chestnut mare.</i>
smitten	Marked by foolish or unreasoning fondness. <i>Conscience smitten.</i>
staggering	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>Suffered a staggering defeat.</i>
startle	Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm. <i>The loud noise startled him awake.</i>

stupefy Make (someone) unable to think or feel properly.
*The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to **stupefy** her.*

stupor A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility.
*Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken **stupor**.*

surprise Cause to be surprised.
*He **surprised** an interesting scene.*

surprised Feeling or showing surprise.
***Surprised** that he remembered my name.*

unnerve Disturb the composure of.
*The journey over the bridge had **unnerved** me.*
