### daze

A state of stunned confusion or bewilderment.

*He was walking around in a **daze**.*

### **grogginess**

A dazed and staggering state caused by alcohol.

*His **grogginess** was caused as much by exhaustion as by the blows.*

### **semiconsciousness**

Marginal consciousness.

### **shock**

A disturbance causing instability in an economy.

*Electricians get accustomed to occasional **shocks**.*

### **state of senselessness**

A state of depression or agitation.

### **state of stupefaction**

The way something is with respect to its main attributes.

### **state of unconsciousness**

The territory occupied by one of the constituent administrative districts of a nation.

**stupefaction**

The state of being stupefied.  
*Salesmen stood in bored **stupefaction**.*



**Usage Examples of "Stupor" as a noun**

- *Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken stupor.*
- *A drunken stupor.*

- alcoholic** Characteristic of or containing alcohol.  
*Alcoholic liquor.*
- amaze** Affect with wonder.  
*Your ability to speak six languages **amazes** me.*
- bacchanal** A priest, worshipper, or follower of Bacchus.  
*A night of **bacchanalian** revelry.*
- bacchanalian** Characterized by or given to drunken revelry.  
*A **bacchanalian** orgy.*
- beer** A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops.  
*A pint of **beer**.*

<b>bibulous</b>	Excessively fond of drinking alcohol. <i>A <b>bibulous</b> evening.</i>
<b>carousal</b>	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
<b>carouse</b>	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>Corporate <b>carouses</b>.</i>
<b><u>coma</u></b>	The luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed. <i>After the film I settled into a <b>coma</b>.</i>
<b><u>daze</u></b>	Confusion characterized by lack of clarity. <i>His mother's death left him in a <b>daze</b>.</i>
<b>drunken</b>	Caused by or showing the effects of drink. <i>A <b>drunken</b> binge.</i>
<b>inebriate</b>	Make (someone) drunk; intoxicate. <i><b>Inebriate</b> times by the Bay.</i>
<b><u>inebriated</u></b>	Drunk; intoxicated. <i>Helplessly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b>inebriety</b>	A temporary state resulting from excessive consumption of alcohol. <i>The ravages of <b>inebriety</b>.</i>
<b><u>intoxicated</u></b>	As if under the influence of alcohol. <i>A noisy crowd of <b>intoxicated</b> sailors.</i>
<b>oaf</b>	An awkward stupid person. <i>They are just big clumsy <b>oafs</b>.</i>
<b>plastered</b>	Covered with a coat of plaster. <i>I went out and got totally <b>plastered</b>.</i>
<b><u>revel</u></b>	Enjoy oneself in a lively and noisy way, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>Bill said he was secretly <b>revelling</b> in his new found fame.</i>
<b>reveler</b>	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract <b>revelers</b> as young as thirteen.</i>
<b><u>revelry</u></b>	Unrestrained merrymaking. <i>Sounds of <b>revelry</b> issued into the night.</i>
<b><u>sober</u></b>	Become sober after excessive alcohol consumption. <i>I ought to <b>sober</b> up a bit.</i>
<b>spree</b>	Take part in a spree. <i>A shopping <b>spree</b>.</i>
<b>stun</b>	Knock unconscious or into a dazed or semi-conscious state. <i>The community was <b>stunned</b> by the tragedy.</i>

<b>surprise</b>	Cause to be surprised. <i>He <b>surprised</b> an interesting scene.</i>
<b>tipple</b>	Drink alcohol, especially habitually. <i>Those who liked to <b>tipple</b> and gamble.</i>
<b><u>tipsy</u></b>	Slightly drunk. <i><b>Tipsy</b> revellers.</i>
<b><u>vertigo</u></b>	A sensation of whirling and loss of balance, associated particularly with looking down from a great height, or caused by disease affecting the inner ear or the vestibular nerve; giddiness.
